And his Majesty doth strictly charge and command, that no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but with this Amendment, and that in the mean time, till Copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates, within this Realm, do (for the preventing of Mistakes) with the Pen, correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church Books, according to the aforegoing Direction; and for the better Notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several Parishes, and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care that Obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

Our last Accounts from the Army in Silesia, are, That his Prussian Majesty having ordered his Troops to cross the River Neils, General Brown, with about 2000 Men, attempted to dispute the Pallage, and in this Dispute several Men were killed on both Sides; the Prussians lost about 70 Men killed or wounded, and the Austrians 13. General Brown however was at last obliged to retire, and the Prussians came before the Town of Neiss, where they made Dispositions as if they intended to give a general Assault; but the Garrison having made a very brisk Fire with their Cannon and Small Arms, by which several of the Prussians were killed, his Prussian Majesty thought proper to do by that Town as he had done by Glogow, which is to block it up; after which his Prussian Majesty left the Command of the Army in Silesia to Felt-Marshal Count Schwerin, and fet out on the 24th Infrant on his Return to this Place, where he arrived on Sunday the 29th at Noon, accompanied by Prince William his Brother, and leveral Officers of Distinction.
