WHEREAS in the Act of Uniformity which establishes the Liturgy of the Church of England, Provision is made for such Alterations in the Prayers for the Royal Family, as from time to time shall become necessary and be directed by lawful Authority: It is thereupon this Day ordered by his Majesty in Council, That in the Morning and Evening Prayers, in the Litany, and in all other Parts of the publick Service, as well in the Occasional Offices, as in the Book of Common Prayer, where the Royal Family is appointed to be particularly prayed for, the following Form and Order shall be observed, viz.

*Their Royal Highnesses Frederick Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, the Duke, the Princesses, the Issue of the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all the Royal Family.*

And his Majesty doth strictly charge and command, that no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but with this Amendment, and that in the mean time, till Copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates, within this Realm, do (for the preventing of Mistakes) with the Pen, correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church Books, according to the foregoing Direction; and for the better Notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several Parishes, and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care that Obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

*From his Royal Highneſs's Council Chamber at Somerſet Houſe, the 27th Day of January, 1740.*

This Day his Royal Highneſs the Prince of Wales was pleaſed to appoint John Forteſcue of Penwarne, in the County of Cornwall, Eſq; to be Sheriff of the ſaid County.

*Berlin, Jan. 28, N. S.* Orders are come from the King, for the Regiments of Glaſenap, Prince Leopold, and Kalkenſtein, Foot, and the Gens d'Armes, to be in Readineſs to march on the 12th of next Month. Advice being come that the Pruſſian Miniſters have

left the Court of Vienna, the Imperial Miniſter here, M. Demeradt, propoſes alſo to ſet out in a few Days on his Return to that Court.

*Berlin, Jan. 31, N. S.* Our laſt Accounts from the Army in Sileſia, are, That his Pruſſian Majeſty having ordered his Troops to croſs the River Neiſ, General Brown, with about 2000 Men, attempted to diſpute the Paſſage, and in this Diſpute ſeveral Men were killed on both Sides; the Pruſſians loſt about 70 Men killed or wounded, and the Auſtrians 13. General Brown however was at laſt obliged to retire, and the Pruſſians came before the Town of Neiſ, where they made Diſpoſitions as if they intended to give a general Aſſault; but the Garriſon having made a very brisk Fire with their Cannon and Small Arms, by which ſeveral of the Pruſſians were killed, his Pruſſian Majeſty thought proper to do by that Town as he had done by Glogow, which is to block it up; after which his Pruſſian Majeſty left the Command of the Army in Sileſia to Felt-Marſhal Count Schwerin, and ſet out on the 24th Inſtant on his Return to this Place, where he arrived on Sunday the 29th at Noon, accompanied by Prince William his Brother, and ſeveral Officers of Diſtinction.
