WHereas in the Act of Uniformity which •• eftablishes the Liturgy of the Church of England, Provision is made for such Alterations in the Prayers for the Royal Family, as from time to time shall become necessary and be directed by lawful Authority : It is thereupon this Day ordered by his Majesty in Council, That in the Morning and Evening 1989-ers, in the Litany, and in all other Parts of the publick Service, as well in the Occasional Offices, as in the Book of Common Prayer,

where the Royal Family is appointed to be particularly prayed for, the following Form and Order shall be observed, viz. Their Royal Highneffes Frederick Prince of Wales, the Princefs of Wales, the Duke, the Princeffes, the Ifue of the Prince and Princefs of Wales, and all the Early Family Royal Family.

And his Majefty doth ftrictly charge and command, that no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but with this Amendment, and that in the mean time, till Copies of fuch Edition may be had, all Parfons, Vicars, and Curates, within this Realm, do (for the preventing of Miftakes) with the Pen, correct and amend all fuch Prayers in their Church Books, according to the aforegoing Direction; and for the better Notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several Parishes, and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care that Obedience be paid to the fame accordingly.
