Naples, September 12.

THE warlike Preparations which have been for some Time carrying on here, are at present suspended.

On the 31st past a Minister from the Grand Signor to his Sicilian Majesty landed here from on board the St. Phillip; he was immediately conducted to the Palace prepared by the Court for his Reception, and a Present of Eatables sent to him. On the 9th Instant he went to Court, in order to settle the Formality of his publick Audience, which is fixed for the 13th Instant. The King 'tis thought will receive him dressed in the Robes of the Order of St. Gennaro, attended by the Knights of that Order. This Ambassador brings very rich Presents from the Grand Signor to their Sicilian Majesties.

Rome, Sept. 16. The Pope has ordered several Warehouses to be built at Civita Vecchia, which he has lately declared a Free Port, for the Use of such Merchants as are willing to settle there.

Leghorn, Sept. 22. On the 6th Instant in the Evening General Walseck arrived here from Florence, and was complimented by M. de Braitewitz and all the military Officers. The next Day he was presented, with the usual military Formality, to the Austrian Troops, as their Commander in chief, in the room of the late M. de Wachtendonck. They write from Tripoly, that M. Vosek, Minister from the King of Naples, had concluded a Treaty of Peace and Commerce with that Regency on the same Footing as the other Christian Powers. His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Dursley, Captain Hughes Commander, came in this Day from Cruizing.

Dublin Castle, September 23.

This Evening arrived his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom: He was received at his landing by the Lords Justices, and several of the Nobility, as also by the Lord Mayor and Sheriffs of Dublin. The Forces in Garrison here, and the Militia of the City lined the Streets through which his Grace, attended by a Regiment of Horse, the Battle-Axe Guards and other Officers attending the State, proceeded to the Castle, where there was a numerous Appearance to compliment him on his safe Arrival.
