THE following Address having been transmitted by his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretary's, of State, has, by him been presented to his Majesty, who was pleased to receive it very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin.

May it please your Majesty,

WH your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, most humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your happy Return to your British Dominions.

When the urgent Affairs of State demand your Majesty's Presence Abroad, our Anxiety for your Majesty's Welfare is equal to the Duty which the most grateful People owe the best of Princes, and can only be compensated by the joy we feel on your Majesty's safe Arrival.

May Heaven crown your Majesty's Arms with Success in the just and necessary War, undertaken for the Protection of the Trade of your Majesty's Dominions; and may an honourable and lasting Peace ensue.

But if an unforeseen Event should occasion any Disturbance, we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we are ready to hazard even our Lives in Support of your Majesty, and of the Protestant Succession in your illustrious House.

In Testimony whereof, we have caused the common Seal of the said City to be hereunto affixed the Tenth Day of November, in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and forty one.

Westminster, December 1.

This Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman Usher of the

Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers: The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty's Pleasure was signified to them by the Lord Chancellor, that they should return to their House and chuse a Speaker, and present him to His Majesty on Friday the 4th Instant. They returned accordingly, and unanimously chose the Right Honourable Arthur Onslow, Esq; to be their Speaker.

Messina, October 30, N. S. On the 24th Instant arrived here from Naples, in seven Days, a Maltese Ship under Neapolitan Colours, and a Neapolitan one, both hired by his Sicilian Majesty, to carry back to Constantinople the Turkish Ambassador, who, with his Retinue, is on board the Maltese; and on the other the Chevalier Majo, his Sicilian Majesty's Ambassador to the Grand Signior. These Ships, after having taken in here what Merchandize offered for Constantinople on Freight, departed this Morning; but the Wind changing, are put back again. This Ambassador, whose Name is Hassen Effendi, on his landing was saluted from the Cittadel with Fifteen Guns, and again at his embarking Yesterday in the Afternoon, with the like Number; and, during his Stay here, was lodged and entertained by the Prince of Villafranca.

Naples, Nov. 2, N. S. Upon the Arrival of the Weekly Spanish Courier to this Court, a Report was spread, that an Expedition of about 15000 Men, under Direction of M. de Montemar, was sailed from Barcelona. This Expedition, 'tis said, is to be followed by another Body of 10000 Men likewise from Barcelona, and joined by a Body of Neapolitan Troops, viz. Ten Battallions out of the Foot Regiments, the Queen, Enaut, Anvers, and Guigi; eight Companies of the Italian and Swiss Guards, some Companies of Gunners, and some Squadrons of Cuirassiers and Dragoons. This Day the King of the Two Sicilies review'd Part of his Army, being about 4000 Men, quartered in and near this City. They are to march To-morrow, and will be join'd by 6000 more Horse and Foot from Capua, Gaeta, and other Places. These Troops
