Petersbourg, January 16.

WE have an Account of the Death of the greatest Part of the Swedish Prisoners on the Road to Moscow.

All the Senators, the Generality, and the Synod, were assembled the 14th, to the Number of 35 Persons, to assist at the Report of the Trial of the Prisoners, and to pronounce Judgment on them; and as the Czarina came very late to the Drawing Room that Evening, it is not doubted but their Sentence was laid before her Majesty. The Felt Marshal Lacy is out of Danger, but has not recovered his Strength.

Petersbourg, Jan. 19. Count Osterman, the Felt Marshal Munich, Count Golofkin, President Mengden, the Grand Marshal, Count Löwenwolde, and a Secretary, were Yesterday brought from the Citadel to the Place before the Colleges, where a Scaffold was erected, upon which, about Ten of the Clock, Count Osterman was carried in a Chair, when the Enumeration of the Crimes laid to his Charge, containing five Sheets of Paper, was read to him by a Secretary, his Excellency all that time bare headed, and with an attentive but firm Countenance listening to it; at last his Sentence was pronounced, which was to be broke on the Wheel; however no Preparations for so terrible an Execution were there, instead of them there were two Blocks with Axes by them, and he was immediately drawn forward out of his Chair by the Soldiers, and his Head laid on one of the Blocks, when the Executioner approached and unbutton'd the Collar of his Shirt and Night-Gown he had on, and laid bare his Neck; this Ceremony took up about a Minute, when it was declared to him that his capital Punishment was, by her Majesty, changed into a perpetual Banishment, upon this he was lifted up by the Soldiers and replaced on his Chair, and went thro' the whole without any Change of Countenance. The Sentences of the other Five, who stood below round the Scaffold, were afterwards read to them in the Order before-mentioned; that of the Felt Marshal was to be quarter'd; of the other four to be beheaded, but the Change into Banishment was as soon declared to each; the four had all long Beards, but the Felt Marshal was shaved, well dress'd, and with an erect, intrepid, and unconcern'd a Countenance, as if he had been at the Head of an Army. It is said, that Count Osterman set out last Night, and the others will soon follow, if not gone. He is to be transported to Borefowa; the Felt Marshal Munich to Pelim in Siberia: Cnez Menzikoff was formerly at the first Place, and the late Duke of Courland

is actually at the last; the others are to be carried to different Places, where the two Brothers Carl and Gustave Biron, and General Bismarc were, so that the Biron Family will be removed, but to what Place is uncertain. All their Estates real and personal are confiscated. Those of their Wives however are not subject to Confiscation, by an Ordonnance of Peter the First, and they are allow'd, by her Majesty, to follow their Husbands if they please. Young Count Munich is to be sent to one of his Father's Estates in the Ukraine, (his own in Livonia being confiscated) after having engaged by Oath and in Writing that he will not go out of the Country. His Order of the White Eagle, as well as his Father's, and that of President Mengden have been delivered to the Saxon Secretary to be return'd to the King of Poland, but it is said, that Count Löwenwolde's Order of the Black Eagle has not been yet sent to M. Mardefeldt. Yesterday Morning between Eight and Nine, her Majesty went to Czarskoi Meuse, from whence she will return To-morrow. The late Senator Strefchnoff, Countess Osterman's Brother, has been made Waywode of the District where all the unfortunate Exiles are to remain, and he is to have the Care and Inspection of them. The Commissary of War Lapokin, who was under Arrest ever since the Change, has been made Governor of Archangel, and M. Nepluef of Samara on the Wolga. It is just now said, that Count and Countess Osterman set out this Morning about Two, both their Sons, who were Captains of the Guards, are to have Companies in matching Regiments, and her Majesty has promised to provide a Match for the Daughter: They were all three allow'd to take Leave of their Father. Prince Lewis is still here.

Vienna, Jan. 27, N. S. Königseck's and Daun's Regiments of Foot, with 14 Companies of Tyrolians, and as many Waradiners, and People of the Neighbourhood of Carlstadt as with the others amount to the Number of 14,000 in all, are supposed to be entered by Kufftain into Bavaria. Brunau is summoned, and the Austrians are already Masters of the Town of Passau. The Garrison, to the Number of 1200 Men, is said to be retired into the Castle.

Vienna, Jan. 31, N. S. Marshal Khevenhuller is at Passau with the best Part of the Cavalry, while the rest of the Army is marched by Wels towards Brunau. The 14,000 Men entered into Bavaria by Kufftain, will come down the Inntz while the others proceed up that River, so that they will meet; it is supposed, at or about Burkhausen, from whence there is but a small Cut to Munich. When upon the Isser, the Austrians



frians are Masters of all Bavaria. Nothing can be equal to the Consternation spread over that whole Electorate. The Peasants and Militia within the Reach of the Austrians have for the most Part given up their Arms and Accoutrements, and great Quantities of Provisions of all Sorts have been found every where.

Vienna, Feb. 7. The Garrison at Brunau, consisting of 2000 Men, though mostly Militia, evacuated that Place upon the Approach of the Austrians. Straubing continues blocked only, it having been impossible for Count Khevenhuller, who is still at Passau, to get up his Artillery, on account of the bad Roads occasioned by the late Thaw.

Genoa, Jan. 31, N. S. Two Days ago arrived here an English Ship from Gibraltar, the Master whereof reports, that on the 26th Instant he was about 17 Leagues to the Eastward of Mahone, when he saw nine Sail of large Ships, who were plying to the Westward with the Wind at S. W. and to the best of his Judgment, he thinks it was Commodore Lestock; one of the largest Ships had lost her Bowsprit and Foremast. Just now is arrived an Estafette from Porto Spetia to this Republick, with Advice of the Arrival there Yesterday of the Spanish and French Fleets. It is said they intend to fortify the Place in the strongest Manner, to prevent any Ships from entering into the Harbour; for which Purpose, Batteries are to be raised at the Entrance of the Port, as also upon a little Island within the Mouth of the Harbour. This Republick has sent away about 200 Men to reinforce the Garrison there.

Genoa, Feb. 7. The combined Fleets are at Porto Spetia, making Dispositions to secure themselves, as well as they can, from any Attack. They have four Ships out on the Cruize, one French Frigate is off Cape Corse, and three Spanish Men of War between Porto Spetia and Cape dell Mell; so that this Port is in a Manner blocked up. Several Transports with Troops are arrived.

Dresden, Feb. 11. It was reported Yesterday, that a Detachment from Kevenhuller's Army had blockaded Munich, and summon'd the Governor to surrender the Town in 24 Hours, and to pay 300,000 Florins for its Redemption from Pillage. M. Rees arrived here the 8th Instant as Envoy Extraordinary from his Prussian Majesty to this Court; and M. Bestuchef left it the same Day for Petersbourg, having received three Estafettes in two Days to press his Return. M. Sechelle has sent to Marshal Broglio from Prague, all the pontoons that were there.

Dresden, Feb. 14, N. S. It is assured that General Stentz, at the Head of 10,000 Men, has entered into Bavaria from the Side of the Tiro, and that the Capital is under Contribution. The King of Poland has been pleased to make Count Bruhl the Minister, General of Foot, and to give him the Command of 1200 Men his Polish Majesty is allowed to have in Poland, independent of the Republick.

Hambourg, Feb. 13, N. S. There are Letters of the 30th of January, N. S. which bring Advice, that the young Duke of Holstein was then arrived at Libaw, in the Dutchy of Courland, from whence that Prince was to proceed the Day following, and that the remaining Part

of his Route was laid out in such a Manner, that it was hoped his Highness would reach Petersbourg the 11th or 12th Instant; and that the Prince and Princess of Brunswick were detained at Riga till such Time only as the young Duke shall have safely reached the Russian Territories. The new Empress of Russia has settled an annual Pension of 15000 Rubles upon the Dutchess of Holstein, Dowager of the late Administrator. Count Sparr, Captain of a Man of War in the Service of Sweden, arrived here some Days since, charged with a Letter from the King his Master, for the Magistrates of this City to obtain Leave to enlist Seamen here for the Service of that Crown: He was accompanied by his Brother, who is since gone for Lubeck upon the same Errand. It is said that his Danish Majesty intends to have a Body of his Troops encamped, early in the Spring, in the Holstein Country, where they are getting together large Provisions of Forage, &c. for the Supply of their Magazines.

Berlin, Feb. 14, N. S. The King of Prussia was on the 7th with the Army at Jedovitz, two German Miles to the Left of Brunn. He was to march from thence on the 9th to join the Saxons, and march together to Znaim on the Frontiers of Austria. Count Podewils set out from hence on the 12th for Dresden, and from thence is to pass by Prague, in order to join the King his Master. The King has sent for all his Aid de Camps and his Field Equipage. The Dutchess of Wirtemberg arrived here on the 5th.

Hague, Feb. 16, N. S. All the Letters from the Side of the Meuse are full of the Preparations making for the Passage of a new Body of French Troops by Givet, through the Bishoprick of Liege into Westphalia, to replace those which France is said to be drawing out of that Country to reinforce Marshal Broglio in Bohemia.

Hague, Feb. 20, N. S. The Reports we had lately current here of an Action in Bohemia are not confirmed.
