This Day his Grace Peregrine Duke of Ancaster, Lord Great Chamberlain, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

This Day the Right Honourable William Pulteney, Esq; was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

*Petersbourg, Jan. 23.* Countess Osterman, Munich, Goloffkin, and Madame Mengden, have all accepted the Czarina's Permission of following their Husbands into Banishment. Count Osterman set forward the 19th; his two Sons and Daughter were allowed to go and take Leave of him at the Jemzskoi, about five Wersts off. Every one of the Exiles, as well as their Wives, have had Leave to take with them four Suits of Cloaths, and two Dozen of Shirts, &c. in Proportion; and they will each of them be allowed a Rouble per Day, and the tenth Part of one for every Servant, of which they have had Leave to take as many as they pleased. They are to be defrayed on the Road, and the Felt Marshal having express'd a Desire of taking his Domestick Chaplain with him, if he could have born the Expence of his Salary and Journey, her Majesty immediately ordered him to be sent at her's, and he accordingly followed the next Evening. It is assured that Expresses have been dispatched to bring back the late Regent and all his Family, his Brothers Carl and Gustave, and his Brother in Law General Bismarck and his Wife; and it is said that upon their Arrival at Moscow, they will all be dismissed out of this Service, and be allowed to retire out of the Country. On the 21st, News came here of the Arrival of the Duke of Holstein on the 11th at Dantzick, and that he was to proceed on his Journey thither the next Day; so that he is supposed to be already at Riga. Immediately after the Arrival of the Post, M. Lilliefelt went to acquaint Prince Lewis, that he might prepare for his Journey, and returned again the same Evening to let him know, that every thing would be ready for his setting out the next Afternoon, which he did last Night

about Seven o'Clock, accompanied with the Chambellan M. Lilliefelt, and escorted by a Lieutenant and 18 Soldiers. The Prince made the Chambellan Puskin, who had served him from his first coming, to the Change, a Present of a very handsome Diamond Ring. Her Majesty was Yesterday to see the late Grand Marshal Count Lowenwolde's House, as she had been some Weeks ago to see that of the Felt Marshal Munich. She has given that in which she lived herself to the Chambellan Voranzoff, who is to be married to Mademoiselle Shovrunski, a Relation of hers, and one of her Maids of Honour. The Felt Marshal Lacy is so well recovered, that he was out this Morning to make his Court to her Majesty. Abraham Petrovitz Araboff, a Negro, who was made a Present of to Peter the First, by a Captain of an English Ship, when his Majesty commanded the combined Fleet in the Sound, and whom he left at Paris in the Year 1717, to apply himself to Engineering and Mathematicks, and afterwards made, first, a Lieutenant in his Guards, and then a Captain of Bombardiers, being some Weeks ago returned by the Grand Dutches's Favour from the Banishment he was sent into in Peter the Second's Time, has been made by her present Majesty a Major General, Commandant at Revel, and receiv'd a Present of 600 Boors about Pleskow.

*From the Head Quarters of Marshal Khevenbulla's Army at Braunau in Bavaria, Feb. 8.* We have found a great Quantity of Artillery, Provisions and Ammunition in this Town, that of Burghausen, and the other Places we have taken. By Expresses arrived this Day from General Bernklau and Colonel Mentzel, we are informed that Landshout has likewise surrendered.

*From the Head Quarters of the Queen of Hungary's Troops at Budweis, Feb. 10.* The 4th Instant we had an Account of the Saxon Troops having marched out of Quarters, and being to join at Przebislau, two Leagues from Polna. The Town of Iglau has been put by the Austrians in a State of Defence, and the four Regiments which are in Garrison there continue their new Levies with Success. The abovementioned Saxon Troops have pursued their March to Great Meferitz; so that Teutschbrod and its Neighbourhood are once more clear of the Enemy's Troops. The Prince of Lobkowitz is come to Day from Neuhaus to Iglau.

*Vienna, Feb. 10, N. S.* We have no regular Journal from either of the Armies, since the taking of Lintz; that in Bavaria is divided, and spreads itself all over the Country, from whence they draw very considerable Contributions,

tions, and such Quantities of all Sorts of Provisions, that Count Khevenhuller has offer'd to supply the Army in Bohemia. As that General is said to have now above 36000 Men, a Body of 15000 will be, or is actually, detached for Bohemia or Moravia.

*We have here the following Particulars relating to the Surrender and Capitulation of Passau.*

The News of the taking of Lintz, the Capital of Upper Austria, having been received at Passau, the Garrison of the Citadel there surrendered on the 25th inst, without making the least Resistance, and were allowed by their Capitulation, to march out with all military Honours, with their Baggage, and with twelve Charges for each Soldier. They were to be escorted toward Straubing, and it was agreed that the Artillery, with all the Ammunition, Provender and Forage belonging to his Electoral Highness of Bavaria should be faithfully declared, but as it was pretended that Part of the Artillery belonged to the Chapter of Passau, and Part to the City, and that his Eminence the Cardinal Bishop had reserved it to himself, that Point was left to the Decision of Marshal Khevenhuller. The Garrison was allowed to remain in the City of Passau and the Town called Newmark till the Day following, the 26th, and to take with them Bread for four Days from the Electoral Magazine. All the Soldiers actually found in the Citadel, were to be comprehended under the Name of the Garrison, and the Sick to be permitted to stay, till they should be in a Condition to remove themselves to any Place in the Possession of the French or Bavarians. By the Surrender of Passau, we became Masters of the magnificent Bridge over the Danube which belonged to the French, and cost them very great Sums.

*St. James's, February 17.*
