Constantinople, February 17.

THE Captain Pashaw will make his Voyage this Spring into the Archipelago; the Fleet under his Command is to consist of ten Men of War, besides some Gallies: Two Ships lately launched are to make Part of it, one is of about 50 Guns, the other of 70. The French Ambassador having complained of the Depredations made by the Tunisens upon his Master's Subjects, not only in the Seas of the Sultan's Dominions, but upon his Coasts, and even in his Ports, and that by the Connivance of his Governors and Officers, and the Assistance of the People; the Vizier has let that Minister know, that the Sultan disapproves all such Conduct in his Officers; and that it is his Purpose to put to Sea in the Spring such a Naval Force as shall be sufficient to maintain the Tranquility of these Seas. The Resident of the Queen of Hungary having communicated to the Grand Vizier the Accounts he had received of the late Successes of his Court, the Vizier congratulated him thereupon, telling him, that he had also received all these Informations, and would have communicated them to him, but that he had been prevented by the necessary Observance of the Feast; adding, that the World would upon this Occasion be a Witness of the sincere and candid Dealings of the Porte, and the Queen see who were her real Friends. Our Accounts, of what passes on the Side of Persia are still full of Uncertainties.

Genoa, March 21. Letters from Spain advise the Arrival of Don Phillip on the 10th at Barcelona, and that 3400 Horse had begun their March from thence the 15th Instant for France, and were to be followed by 21 Battalions of Foot, and that their Route was so ordered, that they could not reach Antibes till the latter End of April. That Count Fuenclara had been appointed Vice-Roy of the Kingdom of Peru; and that three French Register Ships, richly laden, were sailed from Cadiz for America. They write from Turin, that the Spanish Ambassador left that Place the 18th, and went for Lyons; and the Neapolitan Ambassador was to depart from thence as Yesterday, and is hourly expected here. This Morning arrived a Person from Toulon in four Days, who reports, that the French Fleet was disarming, and the Spanish Ships careening.

Ratisbon, March 27, N. S. Our Letters from the Rhine of the 13th Instant, bring the following Account of the actual March of the French Troops to the Relief of Bavaria. Twelve Battalions and three Companies of Dragoons are now passing, through the Dutchy of Wurtemberg, divided into six Divisions, that follow each other at two Days Distance; the first, consisting of two Battalions of Picardy, and one Company of Dragoons, took up its Quarters on the 11th at Radstadt, and last Night at Etlingen; to Day it is at Elmendingen, and to Morrow will advance to Pfortzheim; halt on the 15th, and the following Night be at Weisfach; the 17th at Weilendorf, and Canstadt; the 18th at Zell and Alpach, and the 19th at Usingen, where they will again halt for the 20th; on the 21st it is to arrive at Kuchten, and on the 22d at Urspringen; the 23d at Langenau; the 24th at Brentz, and halt there on the 25th; the 26th it comes to Hochstadt, and on the 27th to Donawerth. The second Division, consisting of the third Battallion of Picardy, one of Vivares, likewise of a Company of Dragoons, will arrive the 13th at Rastadt, as will the third on the 15th, the fourth on the 17th, the fifth on the 19th, and the sixth on the 21st; and will severally be at Donawerth on the 6th of April. During their March, each Division must daily have between 360 and 370 Portions of Forage, each Portion of 18 Pounds of Hay, and two Thirds of a Bushel of Corn. Several considerable Parties of her Hungarian Majesty's Troops have, within these few Days, passed the Danube at Stadt-am-Hoff and other Places in this Neighbourhood.

Berlin, March 31, N. S. Letters from Breslau say, that the Hungarian Troops have taken Possession of the Dutchy and Town of Ratisbon in Upper Silesia.

Brussels, March 31. The new Levies lately raised in the Austrian Netherlands being compleat, her Hungarian Majesty's Troops in those Provinces amount to 24000 effective Men, and the Fortifications of Mons, Ath, and Charleroy have been lately repaired, and put into a good State of Defence. Letters from Francfort of the 27th and 29th Instant say, that an Imperial Decree had been published there, bearing Date the 9th of this Month, for transferring the Diet of the Empire from Ratisbon to Francfort, without Prejudice to the Privileges of the Town

of Ratisbon; in Consequence of which, and of circular Letters from the Emperor to the several Princes and States of the Empire, they expect that the Diet will be opened at Francfort on the 27th of April.

Dresden, April 1. The Blockade of Brunn was actually formed on the 25th past, the Prussians being posted at Slapanitz, Lesch, on the Zwittawa, and at Oberzon; and the Saxons from this last Place to Medertitz by Carthaus, and along the Schwartza. The Duke of Weisfels is arrived here, and is to take upon him the Command of the Saxon Troops.

Han-bourg, April 3. Count Sparre, who has been here some time with a Commission to enlist Sailors for the Swedish Fleet, and may have engaged 60 or 70, has received Orders from his Court last Week, not to proceed any farther. We hear, that the Empress of Russia is not only fixed in a Resolution of not taking any more Strangers into her Service, but has a Design of dismissing those, who are actually engaged in it. This has been intimated to several Holstein Gentlemen who might otherwise have been inclined to have followed the young Duke their Master.

Hague, April 6. By Advices from the Austrian Army in Bavaria, we learn, that upon the Approach of General Berenclau, Marshal Törring had retired from Ingolstadt, under the Cannon of Donawerth; and that the Austrians had formed the Blockade of the former Place, and repulsed a vigorous Sally that had been made on them by the Garrison of it.
