The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint his Grace Peregrine Duke of Ancafter and Kesteven, Lord Great Chamberlain of England, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Lincoln, and City of Lincoln and County of the same, his Grace this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

His Majesty having been likewise pleased to appoint Edward Earl of Derby to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Lancaster, his Lordship this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Naples, March 13. On the 26th past Notice came here from Messina, of the Arrival in that Port, on their Return from Constantinople, of the two Merchant Ships hired by the Court to conduct thither the Turkish Minister, and the Chevalier Majo the King's Minister. On the 1st Instant the Queen appeared abroad for the first Time after her lying-in, accompanied by the King in great Formality, and followed by the two young Princesses. They proceeded to the Cathedral Church, and assisted at the Te Deum which was sung on that Occasion, and in the Evening the Cannon of the Castles were discharged, and Illuminations made throughout the City, by the Foreign Ministers, &c. On the 4th a Train of 12 small Brass Field Cannon were sent from this Arsenal on Mules to the King's Army in the Ecclesiastical State, and are to be followed by such another Train. On the 8th Notice came to Court, that the two Ships of War St. Philip and Parthenope, with the Transports under their Convoy, were arrived at Manfredonia on their Way to Ancona, there to receive the King's Orders how to proceed. On the 10th Twenty four Spanish Saddle Horses arrived here from Madrid, which the King of Spain has presented to the King of Naples.

Rome, March 17. The Pope has lately held a Consultation with seven Cardinals, to take the last Resolution with Regard to the Articles of the Ecclesiastical Immunities long since depending with the Court of Turin, the King of Sardinia having of late renewed some Pretensions, insisting upon the same Conveniences as were lately granted to the King of the Two Sicilies. On the 16th Prince Mansfelt, Minister from the Elector of Bavaria, as Emperor, arrived here to reside at this Court.

Florence, March 18, N. S. On the 12th and 14th two Columns of about 700 Horse each, out of the Spanish Regiments la Reine, Sagunto, and Royal Carabineers Cavalry, passed under the Walls of this City from la Spezia on their March towards Arezzo, to join the rest of the Army under the Command of M. de Montemar in the

Ecclesiastical State. They were followed by 300 Michelets, and had with them 12 small Pieces of Brass Field Cannon. A Party of about 400 Spanish Horse only are left at Sestri di Levante in the Genoese State, with Directions to remain there till farther Orders. Deserters out of the Spanish Troops continually arrive here in great Numbers; all the Germans are received; many enter willingly into the Great Duke's Service, and have been incorporated into the Regiment of Lorrain Guards, and the Tuscan Regiment, both at Leghorn: Others have been sent privately into Lombardy. This Affair, as the Spanish Army diminishes so greatly, occasions repeated Complaints on the Part of M. de Montemar to the Regency, especially on account of those pretended by the Spaniards to have been debauched by the Great Duke's Officers, when on March near the Walls of this City; but as yet the Government has not taken the Resolution to deliver them, alledging, that as the Pass for those Troops so near the Town was not granted, but protested against as an Act of Violence, M. de Montemar has no Right to insist upon the delivering them up. M. de Montemar has removed his Head Quarters to a Place called La Cattolica, a small Distance from Pesaro, on account of its being a more convenient Situation for an Encampment of Troops. Last Night an Express arrived here from Padoua, with Notice, that the Princess Eleonora died there on the 16th Instant; she was Widow of the Cardinal de Medici, and Sister to the present Duke of Guastalla.

Petersbourg, March 17. Lieutenant Colonel Lagerkrantz, a Swedish Officer, and the Chevalier Crepi, arrived here the 14th from Finland; under the Conduct of a Russian Officer, being sent, as is said, by General Lowenhaupt, to demand that the Cessation of Arms might be continued: Whereupon a General Council of War was held, wherein it was resolved to carry on the War with Vigour, before Sweden be in a Condition to transport any more Troops. Felt Marshal Lacy sets out to Morrow for Wybourg, and a great Train of Artillery is to follow in a few Days. M. de Lagerkrantz, and the Chevalier Crepi, are preparing to set out for Moscow. Yesterday's News bring an Account, that 200 Dragoons, and 800 Cossacks, under the Command of Count Isembourg, had already put to the Sword all they met with in their Way to the Gates of Friderickshain; put to Flight the advanced Posts, and brought back a great Number of Prisoners.

Turin, March 21. The King of Sardinia set out Yesterday Morning by the Way of Alexandria and Tortona, for Plaisance, where he proposed to be this Day at Noon. He is attended by the young Prince of Carignan, who begins his first Campaign near his Sardinian Majesty, without any Command in the Army.

Vienna, March 28, N. S. This Court has received Advice, that the Generals Berenclau and Lucaisi, having been sent over the Danube at Dechendorf; had marched to Cham, as if with an Intention to throw themselves into Bohemia



or into Voigland, but turned on a sudden with a Design to surprize Count Töring at Phoring situated upon the Danube between Ratisbon and Ingolstadt; that the Bavarian General had just Time to save himself under the Cannon of the latter, but that the Austrians had seiz'd at the said Phoring, Kelheim, Nieuftadt and Vörburg, all lying upon the Danube between Ratisbon and Ingolstadt, several considerable Magazines of all Sorts; that Colonel Menzel had passed the Danube at the same Time at Hoelstadt with 1500 Horse; had found and dispersed several Undertakers and Contractors of Provisions of all Sorts, at and about Nordlingen, and that these two Bodies were to join afterwards at Weissenberg, and to be followed by Marshal Khevenhuller with the Army, amounting to above 24000 Men. In the mean while his Quarters are said to be full of Deputies and Agents from the several Princes, States and Cities of Suabia, and even of Franconia, to offer their respective Neutralities. The 200,000 Florins exacted of the Dutchy of Neuburg are paid, but deposited by Count Khevenhuller, in order to be restored upon the Elector Palatine's exact Observation of the Neutrality.

Kelheim, March 28. On Easter-Day we marched towards Ingolstadt, to look for the Enemy, who had all drawn together there, and we followed them upon their Heels to attack them. Field Marshal Baron Berencloew went up close to the Fortrefs to reconnoitre it, whereupon the Enemy, to about 100 Men, sallied, but our Hussars, who were at Hand, especially 40 of the Regiment of Adel, immediately marched forth, and, notwithstanding the superior Number of the Enemy, and the Cannon of the Fortrefs, attacked them so briskly, Sabre in Hand, that they did not look for the same Way they came out, but went directly over the Palisadoes, leaving some dead behind. We had above 100 Cannon Shot fired at us, but not one Man was hurt. The Place is now blocked up by Major General Count Luchesi, who has delivered the Enemy's sick and disabled, amounting to 1500 Men, to General Santini, by whom they have been distributed into the Convents. That Gentleman, as well as the French Commandant General de Villemure, have requested some Provisions might be granted them for their own Table. Field Marshal Count Töring, with the Remains of the Bavarian Troops he could gather, particularly Cavalry, hastened from Ingolstadt, and posted himself between Donawerth and Rain. The Enemy made another Sally from Ingolstadt last Night, but were repulsed by our Hussars. We have taken 50 Vessels on the Rivers.

Kelheim, March 29. Two Companies of Grenadiers of the Enemy have deserted, and are come over to us. Field Marshal Count Khevenhuller intended to remove his Head Quarters yesterday to Mosburg, in order to be nearer to the Enemy, from whence he is to remove them farther to Pfaffenhofen. Provisions, especially Flower, are very scarce in Ingolstadt, which gives us hopes of being soon able to reduce it.

Copenhagen, April 3, N. S. On the 29th past a new built Vessel of Forty Guns, called the Crown Yacht, was launched here in Presence of the Court. The 31st was the Anniversary of the Prince's Birth-day, when his Royal Highness entered upon the 20th Year of his Age; but it passed without any extraordinary Celebration. Several Promotions had been ex-

pected, but none were made; only Mademoiselle Beleywitz, the first Lady of the Queen's Court, was then invested with the Order of the Convent of Wallöe. The Caroufel not having been in Readiness to be perform'd on the Occasion abovementioned, is deferred till next Saturday.

Dresden, April 4, N. S. People here appear at present very uneasy at having no News from their Army in Moravia, concluding that their Couriers must have been intercepted, and having certain Information that a Party of Austrian Hussars met with a Squadron of their Horse, of Rheichenberg's Regiment, in a narrow Defile, and made the Lieutenant Colonel Fluch, who commanded it, as well as every Officer and private Man, Prisoners of War. His Polish Majesty intends to be at Fraustadt by the 12th of May, in order to hold a Senatus Consultum. His Majesty's Absence from hence will scarce exceed 10 Days. The Day that Colonel Neubour set out for Piseck for the settling of a Cartel with the Austrians for the Exchange of Prisoners, his Polish Majesty was pleased, on Account of his singular Merit, to appoint him Quarter Master General to the Army, with the Title of Major General, and with a considerable additional Pay.

Hambourg, April 6, N. S. Count Sparre who had for some Days discontinued to enlist Sailors for the Swedish Fleet, has again hoisted his Flag for that Purpose. And we hear that the Russian Army in Finland will speedily receive a Reinforcement of Troops draughted from those which are at present in Garrison at Petersburg; that Hostilities will recommence forthwith; and that, in all Appearance, the War between those Northern Crowns will be prosecuted on both Sides with the utmost Vigour.
