Westminster, April 15.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers, the Commons being come thither accordingly, his Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for Granting an Aid to his Majesty by a Land Tax, to be raised in Great Britain for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and forty two.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the thirteenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for repairing the Roads leading from the Town of Bromsgrove to the Town of Dudley, in the County of Worcester, and from the said Town of Bromsgrove to the Town of Birmingham in the County of Warwick, so far as the said Act relates to repairing the Roads leading from the Town of Dudley to the Town of Bromsgrove in the County of Worcester, and for making the same more effectual.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by two Acts of Parliament, one of the eighth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, and the other of the ninth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, for repairing the Highways between the House commonly called the Horseshoe-House, in the Parish of Stoke Goldington, in the County of Bucks, and the Town of Northampton, and the Road from the North Bridge of Newport Pagnel, in the County of Bucks, to the Horseshoe-House.

An Act for continuing and making more effectual an Act made in the seventh Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for repairing the Road from Wendover to the Town of Buckingham in the County of Bucks, and for building a Bridge at Padbury, and making it a County Bridge.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by two Acts of Parliament, one of the first, and the other of the twelfth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, for repairing the Highways between Tyburn and Uxbridge in the County of Middlesex; and for amending the Road leading from Brent Bridge, over Hanwell Heath, through the Parishes of Hanwell, New-Brentford, and Ealing, to the great Western Road in the said County.

An Act to explain and amend an Act passed in the twelfth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act to enable the Parishioners of the Parish of Saint Catherine Coleman, in Fenchurch-street, in the City of London, to rebuild the Church of the said Parish; and for making the said Act more effectual for the Purposes thereby intended.

An Act for laying a Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or one sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, upon every Scots Pint of Ale and Beer, which shall be brewed for Sale, brought into, tapped, or sold within the Town of Kirkcaldy and Liberties thereof.

An Act for explaining, amending, and making more effectual two Acts of Parliament, one passed in the ninth and tenth Years of the Reign of his late Majesty King William the Third, for erecting Work-houses and Houses of Correction in the Town of Kingston upon Hull, for the Employment and Maintenance of the Poor theré; and the other passed in the eighth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, for the more effectual Provision of the Poor in the said Town.

And to Eight private Bills.

Brinn, April 8. As soon as her Hungarian Majesty's Army, under the Command of Prince Charles of Lorraine, entered Moravia, and that the Avant Guard had advanced within two Leagues of this Place, the Allies abandoned these Cantons with great Precipitation. The Prussians, in Confusion, abandoned Muschau, Porlitz, Tracht, Baufram, Selowitz, Wischau, Goding, Aufpitz and other Places, and are marched towards Olmutz, having left behind them at Porlitz and Selowitz a great Quantity of Wheat, Oats and Flower, besides what they threw into the Water in the last Place, for want of Waggons and Horses to transport the same. Three hundred Waggons with these Provisions have already been sent to Nickelsburg from Porlitz, and 400 more are expected. What has been found at Selowitz will be carried to Feldsburg and Wischau. The Enemy has likewise abandoned a considerable Magazine in good Condition, and a great Quantity of Provisions is also left at Goding. Above 2000 of our Troops are already arrived at Porlitz, and our Hussars have entred Selowitz. A Party of our Troops surprized the Prussians in their leaving Goding, near Aufpitz, and having passed by Bisentz, where they pillaged the Castle, our Hussars killed them 300 Men, wounded about 200, and made as many Prisoners. Our Hussars of Brinn made a vigorous Sally upon the Saxon Rear Guard, and pursued them as far as Modriz, having killed 800, or as is otherwise assured 1100 Men, and have besides taken a great Number of Prisoners, after which the Saxons immediately left these Quarters. The General Prince d'Estherhazi has join'd General Baroniary. The Saxons in their Retreat could not take with them a single Wagon of Bread or other Provisions, and they are march'd into the Mountains, where they will find no Subsistence.

Vienna, April 11, N. S. Yesterday Morning died in the Convent, founded by herself in the Suburb called Rennweg, the Empress Dowager Amalia, after a lingering Illness. Her Imperial Majesty was a Princess of the House of Brunswick Lunebourg, born the 21st of April 1673, and married to the Emperor Joseph at Vienna the 24th of February 1699. The French to whom Marshal Toring is joined in or near the Bishoprick of Aichstadt, have broke down all the Bridges over the Danube in those Parts, which will make it difficult for General Lucasi to keep Ingolstadt blocked; and there is no Advice as yet of the Surrender of Straubing.

Dresden, April 16, N. S. The King of Prussia's sudden Resolution of marching his Army out of Moravia, is thought to have been owing to want of Provisions, that Country being entirely ruined. It is said that Prince Dieterich d'Anhalt is to form a Line with 16000 Men from Olmutz to Ratibor. The Siege of Eger is carrying on by Count Saxe with a Body of 1500 Men only, and the Governor M. d'Auphin has as many in the Place, the Fortifications of which have been lately repaired in the weakest Parts. M. Bellisle and M. de Montijo are both soon expected here. We hear that the French, who were on their March to Donawerth, have changed their Route, and are gone towards Nurembourg. An Epidemical Distemper rages in Bohemia, and is particularly fatal to the Foreigners there, and it is scarce credible what Number of the French, both at Prague and at Piseck are carried off by it. It is written from Prague, that an Hospital without the Town, wherein were 200 French, has been burnt down.

Hague, April 24, N. S. On Saturday the 21st Instant his Excellency the Earl of Stair, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of Great Britain, had a publick Audience of the States General, to whom he spoke in the following Manner.

High and Mighty Lords,

THE King my Master, closely united, as he is, with your Republick, by the strongest Ties of mutual Interest, whereby a good Correspondence between his Kingdoms and your States is rendered absolutely necessary for the reciprocal Support of their common Liberty and Independance, is moreover desirous, in this delicate and dangerous Conjunction, to give you the most convincing Proofs of his perfect Friendship and entire Confidence; and it is for this Reason that his Majesty sends me hither in Quality of his Ambassador Extraordinary, with full Powers to concert, and take jointly with your High Mightinesses, the proper Measures for preserving the Liberty of Europe, and re-establishing a just Balance of Power; as likewise for maintaining the Independance of his own Kingdoms, and of the Dominions of your High Mightinesses, by preserving the House of Austria, in Conformity to our common Engagements, and to our mutual Interests; and his Majesty flatters himself, that these Measures will be taken without Loss of Time.

The whole World is informed of the generous Efforts, which your Ancestors made for the Recovery of their Liberty, and the Defence of their Religion. The whole World is Witness to the great Actions performed by your Republick for the Support of the Liberty of Europe: Those glorious Actions do not allow the King to entertain one Moment's Doubt of the Magnanimity and of the Wisdom of your Republick. You will not, certainly, submit now to the Servitude against which you fought so gloriously. In an entire Persuasion of this Truth, the King addresses himself to your High Mightinesses, assuring you of his entire Friendship, and Confidence, and at the same Time, of a powerful Assistance for supporting such Measures as shall be jointly taken.

The King extremely commends your High Mightinesses late wise Resolution of augmenting your Land Forces, and putting Part of your Fleet to Sea. Your High Mightinesses in a strict Union with the King of Great Britain, will thereby become Masters of the Sea, which is a very great Advantage; and on the other Hand, you will be in a Condition to cover that Part of

your Frontier, which you find at present to be the most exposed; and in Case your High Mightinesses judge it necessary, to procure an additional Defence on that Side, by a new Alliance, the King, as Elector, offers you, with the greatest Cordiality, his Concurrence therein; and to the End that the Barrier may not be weakened by your Troops being employed in garrisoning that exposed Frontier, the King has given his Orders, in Consequence of the Requisition of the Queen of Hungary, for the transporting a considerable Body of his British Troops into the Low Countries.

When your High Mightinesses shall have thus put all your Frontiers into a Condition of not apprehending any Surprize, you will be able to protect your Allies in the Manner you shall think most convenient; and thereby other Princes, who might be willing to act in Conjunction with the maritime Powers for the Maintenance of the Liberty of Europe, would be able to do it with greater Freedom, and without Fear, which can never be the Case, without a perfect and declared Union of those two Powers, and without their taking Measures in Concert for their own reciprocal Security, and for the Preservation of their Allies, and of the publick Liberty.

All that we have lately seen must clearly convince us, that the most solemn Treaties are too weak a Support for the Liberties of Europe, and that more real Securities are necessary.

The King finds himself obliged to remonstrate to your High Mightinesses, that the solemn Faith of Treaties requires that the Queen of Hungary should be assisted. The King, on his Part, has given most convincing Proofs of his good Faith, and of his Friendship towards the said Queen. The considerable Sums that were given her the last Year, and the still more considerable ones which are granted for this present Year, demonstrate his Majesty's Exactness in the Performance of his Engagements, and his Readiness to go even beyond them; and his Majesty relies upon the good Faith of your High Mightinesses, which is so well known, that you will not delay fulfilling, in the same Manner, your Engagements towards the said Queen; and his Majesty desires your High Mightinesses to consider, that if that Princess shall be once oppress'd, it will be more difficult to support the general Independance of Europe.

The unanimous Consent of his Majesty's People, is such a Security to your High Mightinesses for his good and generous Intentions, as cannot but be very agreeable to you; and the King flatters himself, that the Subjects of your High Mightinesses are in the like Sentiments for the Preservation of their own Independance, and of the publick Liberty.

The Uprightness of my Heart, the Sincerity of my Intentions towards my Country, towards the King my Master, and towards your Republick, will, I hope, make up for many Defects. I will explain my self more fully, as soon as it shall please your High Mightinesses to name Commissaries to confer with me.

M. de Haren, who presided that Day in the Assembly, returned the following Answer to his Excellency.

Mr. Ambassador,

THE Friendship and Union which have so long subsisted between the Crown of Great Britain and this Republick, have been always looked upon by their High Mightinesses as too advantageous for them not to think themselves obliged

liged to employ their utmost Endeavours towards cultivating of them, and rendring them perpetual.

It is then not at all surprizing, if they have now the greatest Pleasure in being informed of the Desire of his Britannick Majesty, not only to confirm the good Understanding between the maritime Powers, but to establish it upon more solid and stable Foundations than ever.

The Neighbourhood, the solemn Treaties, and the Conformity of Sentiments, as well with Respect to Religion, as with Respect to Liberty, all contribute to make us sensible of the inestimable Value of a strict Union between the two Nations. Their High Mightinesses will always give convincing Proofs of it, as also of their profound Veneration and of their perfect Esteem for his Majesty's sacred Person, and for all his Royal Family, for the Preservation and Prosperity whereof, they make the most ardent and sincere Vows; and they cannot, Sir, but signify to you, how much they are charmed with his Majesty's having chosen you to come hither on his Part, to give them such Assurances as will tend to the Increase of their mutual Friendship. No body, Sir, was more proper than your self for this Employment; you, whose good Intention towards this Republick is known, and whose Merit is so universally applauded and admired.

Their High Mightinesses will give all their Attention to what you have just proposed to them, by Order of the King your Master, and they will be ready to give you Audience, and to name Commissaries to confer with you as often as you shall desire it.

The King has been pleased to grant the Dignity of a Baron of the Kingdom of Great Britain unto the Right Honourable William Earl Fitzwilliam of the Kingdom of Ireland, by the Name, Style and Title of Lord Fitzwilliam, Baron of Milton in the County of Northampton.

And likewise to grant the Dignity of a Baron of the Kingdom of Great Britain, unto Richard Edgcumbe, Esq; by the Name, Style and Title of Baron of Edgcumbe, of Mount Edgcumbe in the County of Devon.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable John Earl of Stair, Field Marshal of his Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of the Island of Minorca, in the room of Algernoon Earl of Hertford, who is appointed Governor of the Island of Guernsey.

Whereas on Sunday the 4th Instant, about Two of the Clock in the Morning, five Men mounted on Horseback, loaded with Goods, suspected to be Tea, passing through the Road near Clerkenwell Green, one of their Horses run against the Constable, who holding up his Staff to defend himself, the Person on the said Horse discharged divers Pistols or Blunderbusses at the said Constable and his Watchman Isaac Crawley, and wounded the said Crawley in his Arm, which has since been cut off: And whereas another of the said Persons returning back, fired four Pistols or Blunderbusses at the said Constable and his Watchman; and soon after divers Persons came to the Watch-house at Clerkenwell Green, and discharged several Pistols or Blunderbusses through the Door of the said Watch-house, and wounded Richard Croxall, another Watchman there on his Duty, who is since dead. For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned, his Majesty is pleased to

promise his most gracious Pardon to any two of the Offenders who shall first discover their Accomplices (the Person who first fired at and wounded Isaac Crawley excepted) so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement for such Discovery, the Person or Persons so discovering shall receive a Reward of Fifty Pounds for each Offender who shall be apprehended and convicted; to be paid by the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

N. B. The Person who first discharged the Pistols or Blunderbusses at the Constable, and his Watchman, was a Lusty Man, about Forty Years of Age, of a Swarthy Complexion, pitted with the Small Pox, and had on a Wig of a Darkish Colour, a Light Coloured Duffel Coat, and a Great Coat over it, and the Horse or Mare he rode on was of a large Size, of a dark Bay Colour, with Cropt Ears, the Saddle he rode on, which was dropt from the Horse, is a brown Leather Saddle, with four Staples, and two Leather Straps, such as are frequently used by the Smugglers, with a Worlten Saddle Cloth, Chequ'd with Blue and White, with one Girt and a Surcingle, and another of the said Person, who returned back and fired upon the Constable and his Watchman, rode on a large black Horse, was a lusty Man in a light Colour'd Great Coat, and another of the Horses was a spotted Horse with a Bald Face.
