Petersbourg, April 3.

THE Czarina's Coronation remains fixed to the 22d Instant, and it is said that after that Solemnity her Majesty will set out on a Sort of Pilgrimage to a Monastery at Kiow in the Ukraine, 700 English Miles from Moscow. This Piece of Devotion has been usually practised by all her Predecessors upon their Accession to the Throne, but they have usually contented themselves to go to a Monastery nearer the Place of their Residence. There are several different Reports concerning the Return of the Court to this City, but it is doubted whether it will come back before the Month of October or November.

Placentia, April 16, N. S. The Spanish Army continues in the Ecclesiastical State, the Head Quarters at Rimini, and has only moved some few Miles nearer Bologna, as the Want of Forage and Means of Subsistence required it. The Desertion among them is beyond Expression, and in a Month's Time no less than 600 are come hither. By an exact Register kept at Modena since their Landing, above 6500 are come through that City. The Austrian Forces, on the other Hand, are still in their Quarters in the Modenese, Marshal Traun having fixed his at Correggio, and his Troops, as well as the King of Sardinia's, are abundantly provided with every thing necessary, notwithstanding the Scarcity of Forage, which is owing to the exact Discipline and Oeconomy that is observed: They both together amount to 30 or 32000 Men, and the several Regiments may be said to be compleat, having hitherto suffered little or nothing by Desertion.

Florence, April 17. By Letters which were brought to Leghorn by his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Garland, dated the 11th of March, O. S. at Port Mahon, there is Advice that Vice Admiral Haddock's Squadron was then entirely refitted, and ready to put to Sea; that the Admiral had already stationed all his Cruizers in the most advantageous Posts, to observe the Motions of the Spaniards. And that a Tender belonging to the Spanish Admiral with 60 Men and an Officer on board, had been taken by one of the said Cruizers.

Vienna, April 21. General Nadasdy having advanced with the Hussars near to Olmutz, was faced with a Body of about 8000 Prussians, who after some Skirmishes retired towards Night into the Town; upon which, and the farther Report of a Person who escaped out of the Place, as if the said Corps had passed thro' Olmutz with a Design to post themselves at or about Sternberg,

at the Foot of the Mountains, after having left a Garrison of 2000 Foot and 1200 Horse, Prince Charles, in order to take his Measures more surely, had only made half a March the next Day, so that he will not have been before Olmutz, till as Yesterday. In the mean while he had ordered the great Artillery from Brinn. A Courier in his Passage hither found the Mountains between Moravia and Silesia lined with Peasants upon the Point of being joined by a Body of Hussars, and the Passages embarrassed with Trees and other Impediments. He left about 8000 Prussians in Olmutz, and Prince Charles within a German Mile of that Place, intending as the said Courier reports, to attack them as Yesterday.

Copenhagen, April 28. The Commission for examining the State of the Navy is now ended, and upon the Report made from it to the King of Denmark, his Majesty declared his Approbation of the Conduct of Count Daneskiold in the Direction of the Marine Affairs, confirmed him in his Post, and settled on him an extraordinary Pension of 7000 Rixdollars for Life.

Leipzig, April 30. On the 25th the Saxon Army was near Kutenbourg, marching towards Leuthmeritz. The King of Prussia is arrived at Konigin-Gratz; Marshal Broglio continues at Piseck with his Corps, and it is said, that all the fresh Reinforcements from France ought to be at Donawerth the 5th of next Month. The Court return'd Yesterday to Dresden. It is written from Berlin, that the King of Prussia intends to entertain the King of Poland at Neustadt near Glogaw, as his Polish Majesty goes to Fraustadt.

Hambourg, May 1, N. S. Count Sparr, who came here to enlist Sailors for the Swedish Fleet, is returning home, having engaged about 200 Men, which are already sent off for Lubeck.

Hague, May 4. This Morning Baron Reischach delivered a Memorial to the States, in Refutation of what had been asserted by some Ministers of the Allies here, as if the Queen of Hungary pretended to engage her Allies to support her Exceptions to the Election of the Elector of Bavaria, as well as her Rights to her Father's Succession. Prince Charles certainly got to Olmutz by the 21st past, where it is said there is a Garrison of 8000 Prussians. We hear that Marshal Khevenhuller has abandoned the Bridge at Deckendorff, and the whole Course of the Isser, having posted himself upon the Inn for the Defence of Passau. By the last Letters from Italy it is written, that the King of Sardinia was expected to enter the Modenese on the 23d past, and that the Spaniards were assembling at Fyenzen in
