The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This Day the Right Honourable George Wade, Esq; Lieutenant General of the Ordnance, was, by his Majesty's Command, Sworn of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

This Day the Right Honourable Thomas Clutterbuck, Esq; was, by his Majesty's Command, Sworn of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the Thirteenth Year of his Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act for prohibiting Commerce with Spain." It is among other Things enacted, That from and after the first Day of June 1740, no Wines or Fruits of any Sort, nor Wool, Iron, Drugs or Grocery Wares, Skins, or any other Goods or Commodities whatsoever, of the Growth, Product, or Manufacture of any of the Kingdoms, Dominions, Islands or Territories of the King of Spain, commonly called Old Spain, lying or being in Europe, or of the Islands commonly called the Canary Islands belonging to the said King of Spain, shall, during the present War with Spain, be imported, in any Ship or Vessel whatsoever, into any Port, Haven, Creek, or other Place whatsoever, in the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, Isle of Man, or Minorca, or the Town or Port of Gibraltar, from any Port or Place whatsoever, either mixed or unmixed, with any Commodities of the Growth or Product of any other Nation, Place or Country whatsoever, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture of all such Goods and Commodities, and Treble the Value thereof, and of the Ship or Vessel in which they shall be imported, with all her Guns, Tackle, Furniture, Ammunition and Apparel, to be prosecuted and divided in the Manner therein mentioned, but subject to such Provisoes and Exceptions as are therein contained: And whereas by the said Act, Power is given to his Majesty, when he shall judge it for the Benefit of his People, to take off the aforesaid Prohibitions and Restrictions, or any Part thereof, from any of the Goods and Commodities aforesaid, by his Royal Proclamation or Proclamations to be issued under the Great Seal of Great Britain, or by his Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, to signify the same, and thereupon such Goods and Commodities as aforesaid, shall and may be imported, being first duly entered and paying the Customs and other Duties due by Law for the same. And whereas his

Majesty doth judge it for the Benefit of his People to take off the aforesaid Prohibitions and Restrictions, so far as the same relate to Wool and Barilla of the Growth or Product of any of the Kingdoms, Dominions, Islands or Territories of the King of Spain, commonly called Old Spain, lying or being in Europe, or of the Islands commonly called the Canary Islands, belonging to the King of Spain. It is therefore ordered by the King's most excellent Majesty in Council, that the said Prohibitions and Restrictions shall be, and the same are hereby taken off, so far as they relate to Wool and Barilla of the Growth or Product of any of the Kingdoms, Dominions, Islands, or Territories of the King of Spain, commonly called Old Spain, lying or being in Europe, or of the Islands commonly called the Canary Islands, belonging to the said King of Spain; and that the said Wool and Barilla may from Time to Time be imported, being first duly entered, paying the Customs and other Duties due by Law for the same, and being subject to all such other Restrictions, Regulations, Terms and Conditions, as they would be subject to, in case the said Act had not been made, and no otherwise.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Algernon Lord Percy, commonly called Earl of Hartford, to be Governor of the Island of Guernsey, his Lordship this Day in Council took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Governors of that Island.

Rome, June 2. The English Men of War appear often off *Civita Vecchia*, and along the Roman Coast, and visit all Ships and Barks that they meet.

Naples, June 5, N. S. On the 30th past the Name of the Prince of Asturias was celebrated at Court with great Solemnity, the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, &c. were to pay their Duty on that Occasion to their Majesties, and in the Evening there was a triple Discharge of the Cannon of the Fortresses. The same Day, Notice came here from *Messina*, that the Ships of War, *St. Philip* and *Partheope* were arrived at that Port from *Ancona*, after having conveyed to the *Adriatick*, the large Train of Artillery and Military Stores for the Neapolitan and Spanish Armies. A Battalion out of the *Corfican* Regiment of Foot is ordered to relieve another in Garrison at *Gaeta*, which is to repair to these Fortresses.

Ferrara, June 9, N. S. The Duke and Duchesses of *Modena* having demanded and received

ceived the necessary Passports, have actually passed through the Austrian Army in their Way to Venice. The Princesses are retired to the Convent of St. Francis de Sales, and the Hereditary Prince, with the Princess his Consort, are gone to Carrara, the King of Sardinia having sent the Baron de Carpenels to Safluolo, to assure the Duke that his Majesty would never permit the least Injury to be done to the Ducal Family of Modena. In the mean time every thing was prepared for the Siege of the Citadel of Modena, and the Trenches were to be opened before that Fortrefs on the 9th.

Parma, June 9, N. S. The Prince Royal of Savoy is arrived in the Territories of this State with a Body of Piedmontese and Swiss Troops, in order to join the King his Father. They write from Mantua, that 3000 Croats are arrived there from Germany, and that they immediately expect 600 Rascians, all of them clothed in the Turkish Manner.

Florence, June 17. The Spanish and Neapolitan Armies remain in their Encampments: There is a strong Probability however, that they will soon either attempt an Action, or remove into the Ferrarese, as they cannot longer subsist in the Bolognese for Want of Forage. On the 10th a Picket of Spanish Dragoons deserted when on Duty at their Bridge over the River Reno. A few Days ago a Train of 16 large Cannon from Ancona arrived at the Spanish Camp along the River Muzza.

Vienna, June 13, N. S. The Queen will appear in Publick, for the first Time, after her lying in, on Sunday or Monday next, and will set out a few Days afterwards for the Castle of Schonbrunn.

Vienna, June 20. By Letters which came in this Day at Noon, and dated at Pilsnetz in Bohemia, there is Advice that the main Army is between Pilsen and Beraun, about 10 Leagues from Prague, that the French who first entered Prague, were in such haste as to shut the Gates upon those of their own Body who lag'd, and that they have passed cross the Town to this Side of the Mulda.

Dresden, June 26. Prince Charles is said to be arrived with his whole Army within half a German Mile of Prague.

Breslaw, June 25. We hear that the Peace between the King of Prussia and Queen of Hungary, was proclaimed at his Prussian Majesty's Head Quarters by Sound of Trumpet and Kettle-Drums, in Presence of all the General and Field Officers assembled for that Purpose; and that as soon as the King of Prussia received the Queen of Hungary's Ratification of the Preliminary Articles, his Majesty ordered his Army to hold themselves in Readiness to march in three Bodies, one towards Silesia, another towards Brandenburg through Luface, he having previously asked Leave of the King of Poland, and the third Body towards Westphalia, and that they are already all three upon their March. The King of Prussia will be here on the 4th of next Month, he stays but four Days, from hence he goes to Glogaw, where he stays two Days, and from thence streight to Berlin.
