

after having camped several Hours out of the Eastern Lines, are now posted before the Western Lines, with an Army of about 15,000 Men, whereof there may be about 6000 Horse. We hear there are great Diffensions amongst their Generals. The French cannot, upon the most moderate Calculation, have lost less than 6000 Men, and they are getting together what they can of old Tents, and Clothes, and all Sorts of Utensils to be found at Prague, for forming their new Camp and Equipages. There are common Huiars in Prince Charles's Army who have more than a Thousand Ducats in their Pockets since the Passage of the Mulda.

Scaffhouse, June 27. The 13 Cantons of the laudable Helvetic Body will hold their Annual Assembly next Week at Baden.

Dresden, July 1. The Austrians have their Head Quarters near Konighal, but come up to the very Gates of Prague, and by their Light Horse endeavour, and with some Success, to intercept the French Foragers; by which the Cavalry in the Town will at last be ruined; for it is assured that they have scarce any Hay or Oats left. The Desertion of the French from thence is very great.

Dusseldorp, July 3. The Marshal de Maillebois return'd hither from Aix the 30th of last Month.

Paris, July 7, N. S. We have had a Report here for some Days, which is now confirmed; that some English Men of War have burnt five Spanish Gallies, and disabled a sixth, near St. Tropes.

Hague, July 7. The Proposition for putting 50 Battalions, amounting to 100,000 Foot, and 50 Squadrons, amounting to 2500 Horse, into a Readiness to march upon the first Orders, by issuing to the Officers the Money for their Equipages, passed Yesterday unanimously in the Assembly of the States of Holland, and will be brought To-day into that of the Generality. Letters from Dresden, of the 30th, past bring Advice, that the Great Duke was arrived at the Army, and was advanced within two Cannon Shot of Prague.

The Letters from Cassel of the 2d Instant, N. S. bring the melancholy News of the Decease of the young Prince William, Son of her Royal Highness the Princess Mary, and of his most Serene Highness Prince Frederick of Hesse, who was born the 25th of December last, N. S. and died the 1st Instant.

General Post Office, London, July 3, 1742.

Whereas divers Persons, thro' Ignorance or Carelessness, frequently put Letters into the General Post Offices, and the Receiving Houses both in Town and Country, directed on board of Ships, and to Foreign Parts, without paying at the same Time the Postage, as ought to be done; And whereas Letters and Packets are often put into the said Offices with Money and Rings inclosed, and in Fraud of his Majesty's Revenue, divers Persons presume to send Letters with false and counterfeit Franks;

This is to acquaint the Publick, that no Letters under any of the Circumstances aforesaid have any Right by Law to be forwarded.

Note, That Letters going out of Great Britain (except to France, Holland, and Flanders) have by the ancient Usage of this Office paid the Foreign Postage, and are required by the Act of Parliament so to do, at the Office in Great Britain where the same are first put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
