From the King of Sardinia's Camp at Calgaro, June 22, N. S.

UPON Advice that the Spaniards decamped in the Night of the 17th, and marched towards Cento, the King ordered a Detachment, composed of all the Picket Guards, a large Body of Horse, and 50 Hussars, to follow and attack their Rear Guard, who killed 50 Men, made 68 Prisoners, and took 70 Horses, which have been brought hither, with nine Dragoons deserted from the Enemy's Army, who have informed us, that the Duke de Montemar was marched towards Mirandola, in the Perswasion that the Gates of the Town would be opened to him upon his Appearance. The Prisoners have likewise asserted that this was the Design of their General, upon which we decamped suddenly on the 18th at Night, and marched with Diligence towards Mirandola, where we expect to arrive before the Enemy, not only because we are nearer to that Place, but also that our Hussars have surprized and carried off 24000 Portions of Bread from them, which cannot fail to retard their March.

Vienna, July 4. The 29th past 900 French Prisoners arrived here from Bohemia, and were sent on immediately to the Prisons appointed for them in the Kingdom of Hungary. Yesterday a great Train of heavy Artillery, consisting of 15 battering Cannons, six Mortars, and a prodigious Quantity of Powder, Bombs, Balls, and other military Implements, set out from the Royal Arsenal here for the Queen's Army in Bohemia, escorted by a Detachment from the Regiments of Palsy, Bayreuth, and Synnay. Three thousand Hessians have joined Marshal Torring, and the Duke d'Harcourt has been reinforced with five Squadrons and three Battalions. Count Khevenhuller has made a Motion with all his Foot and Horse Grenadiers, joined to all the irregular Infantry of his Army, to try the Countenance of the Enemy, and to force them if possible to some Motion likewise.

Konigsbal, July 6, N. S. The Marshal Duke de Bellille having sent a Trumpet to our Camp to demand a Conference with Count Konigsseg, he was conducted to it, under an Escort of the Queen's Troops, within a Gun Shot of the Head Quarters, and having acquainted the Felt-Marshal that he had Orders from his Court to treat of a general Peace, he

was answered, that her Majesty the Queen of Hungary and Bohemia could hearken to no Proposals without first acquainting her Allies with the same, and the Maritime Powers in particular. The first Convoy of Artillery from Vienna comes hither To-morrow, but it will not be all here before the 15th; as soon as it is arrived it is proposed to attack the Town, but till then it is judged needless to fatigue the Troops, who are daily augmenting by the Sick that recover, and fresh Recruits. Four Battalions of German Infantry, and 12000 Hussars and Hungarian Infantry, from Moravia and the Frontiers of Silesia are expected here in the mean while. They give out at Prague, that a Peace will soon be concluded, in order to prevent their Soldiers from deserting. We are daily crowded with Deserters, and Men and Horses that the Hussars take, and this Day Seven-night 52 of their Officers tried, as they have done twice since, to get into Saxony, in order to return to France, but were prevented by our Hussars; since Yesterday all the Baggage that was in the little Isle before the Town has disappeared, with the Pontoons. We apprehend that the Waggons are sent to bring the Magazines they had at Leuthmeritz since the Saxons have retired, and therefore the Prince has sent a Detachment thither to prevent them.

Breslau, July 9, N. S. The King of Prussia left Glatz the 29th past, arrived here the 5th Instant, and is set out upon his Return to Berlin. M. Kanengieser, Referendary of Bohemia, is arrived here from Vienna with Instructions from the Queen of Hungary for settling the Limits of Silesia between the two Crowns.

Osnabrug, July 12, N. S. On the 9th Instant, at Five in the Afternoon, a Courier arrived here with Orders for all the French Troops to be in a Readiness to march the 13th, which occasioned great Agitation as well among the Officers as the Soldiers, who imagined they were to make a longer Stay. Yesterday and To-day Accounts were settled with the Magistrates about the Forage that has been delivered; and the Burghers having specified what was due to them, the Soldiers were obliged to pay their Debts. A Certificate was required of the Magistrates that those Troops had kept a good Order and Discipline during their Stay in this Town. They would have obliged the Bakers to buy their Corn and Meal, whereof they had laid up a very great Store,

Store, but those Provisions being for the most Part mouldy and spoil'd, they refused them, and the Regency was obliged to take them in Payment for the Forage that had been delivered. Their Ovens were broken and demolished. This Morning at Five o'Clock their Sick were carried away; To-morrow at Five the whole Body is to march, and their Baggage and Ammunition Waggon are already loaden.

Hague, July 17. The late Proposition of Holland for furnishing Equipage and Waggon Money to a considerable Body of Troops, to enable them to march upon the first Warning, is now pass'd the States General, and Orders are accordingly issuing out to the Officers of the several Regiments, for providing themselves forthwith with Necessaries for that purpose.

By Letters from Vice-Admiral Mathews dated the 14th of June in Villa Franca Harbour, and brought by Captain Callis, Commander of the Duke Fireship, there is Advice, that Captain Norris, upon his Cruize between Cape Rous and Villa Franca, having had Notice of five Spanish Gallies being sail'd from Margareta to St. Tropes, he immediately follow'd them thither with his Majesty's Ships under his Command, in order to detain them there till he should receive Orders from the Admiral concerning them. But that the said Spanish Gallies having began to fire upon the King's Ships, and thereby broken the Rules which are usually observed in a Neutral Port, Captain Norris had immediately given Orders to the Duke Fireship to set Fire to them, which being accordingly executed by the said Captain Callis, they were all immediately destroyed.

The King has been pleas'd to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable Richard Lord Viscount Cobham to be Field Marshal of all and singular his Majesty's Forces.

And his Majesty has also been pleas'd to constitute and appoint his Lordship to be Captain and Colonel of the First Troop of Horse Grenadier Guards, in the room of James Dormer, Esq; deceased.

General Post Office, London, July 3, 1742.

This is to acquaint the Publick, that no Letters under any of the Circumstances aforesaid have any Right by Law to be forwarded.

Note, That Letters going out of Great Britain (except to France, Holland, and Flanders) have by the ancient Usage of this Office paid the Foreign Postage, and are required by the Act of Parliament so to do, at the Office in Great Britain where the same are first put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office
