HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, his Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting to his Majesty an additional Duty on foreign Cambricks imported into Great Britain, and for allowing thereout a Bounty upon certain Species of British and Irish Linens exported.

An Act for the more effectual preventing the counterfeiting of the current Coin of this Kingdom, and the uttering or paying of false or counterfeit Coin.

An Act to empower the Importers or Proprietors of Rum, or Spirits, of the British Sugar Plantations, to land the same before Payment of the Duties of Excise charged thereon, and to lodge the same in Warehouses at their own Expence; and for the Relief of Ralph Barrow, in respect to the Duty on some Rock Salt lost by the overflowing of the Rivers Weaver and Dane.

An Act for the more effectual preventing any Cloth or Woollen Goods, remaining upon the Rack or Tinters, or any Woollen Yarn or Wool left out to dry, from being stolen or taken away in the Night-time.

An Act for further regulating the Plantation-Trade; and for Relief of Merchants importing Prize-Goods from America; and for preventing collusive Captures there; and for obliging the Claimers of Vessels, seized for Exportation of Wool, or any unlawful Importation, to give Security for Costs; and for allowing East India Goods to be taken out of Warehouses, in order to be cleaned and refreshed.

An Act to revive several Acts, for the Punishment of Persons destroying Turnpikes, or Locks, or other Works erected by Authority of Parliament, and for other Purposes therein mentioned; and to continue several Acts relating to Rice, to

Frauds in the Customs, to the clandestine Running of Goods, and to Copper Ore of the British Plantations; and for extending the Liberty given by the Act of the Twelfth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, for carrying Sugar, of the Growth of the British Sugar Colonies in America, to Ships belonging to any of his Majesty's Subjects residing in Great Britain, and navigated according to Law; and for the more effectual preventing the cutting of Star or Bent.

An Act to continue several Laws (for the Encouragement of the making of Sail-Cloth in Great Britain; and of the Silk Manufactures of this Kingdom, and for allowing a Drawback on the Exportation of Copper Bars imported) and to explain a Clause of an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, to prohibit the Exportation of Corn, and other Things therein mentioned, and to give further Time for the Payment of Duties omitted to be paid for the Indentures and Contracts of Clerks and Apprentices.

An Act to explain an Act made in the Fourteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, entitled, An Act to render the Laws more effectual for preventing the stealing and destroying of Sheep, and other Cattle.

An Act for preventing the Mischiefs which may happen by keeping dangerous Quantities of Gunpowder in or near the Cities of London and Westminster.

An Act to prevent the Marriage of Lunatics.

An Act for the better enabling the Commissioners for building a Bridge cross the River Thames, from the City of Westminster to the opposite Shore in the County of Surrey, to finish the said Bridge, and to perform the other Trusts proposed in them; and for enlarging the Time for exchanging of Tickets unclaimed in the last Lottery for the said Bridge; and to make Provision for Tickets in the said Lottery, lost, burnt, or otherwise destroyed.

And to four private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech,

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THIS Session of Parliament has been drawn out into so unusual a Length, and the Season

son of the Year is so far advanced, that I am persuaded you are all very desirous of a Recess.

I acquainted you at the Beginning of the Session, with my Endeavours to bring about an Accommodation between those Princes, whose Union was most necessary in this critical Conjunction. The Treaty lately concluded between the Queen of Hungary and the King of Prussia, under my Mediation, and so highly to the Honour of Great Britain, must undoubtedly produce the best Consequences to the Common Cause.

The Successes which have attended the Austrian Arms in Germany; the Conjunction of the King of Sardinia's Forces with those of the Queen of Hungary in Italy; the present favourable Disposition of the States General, and of other great Powers, are, under God, chiefly owing to the generous Assistance, afforded by this Nation, to its ancient and natural Allies.

These happy Events cannot fail to give Encouragement to our Friends; and to establish the Reputation of our Strength, and our just Influence Abroad.

If, for the further Support and Defence of the Queen of Hungary, and to restore and secure the Balance of Power, so particularly recommended to me by my Parliament, it should become necessary for me to contract new Engagements, or to enter into further Measures, I rely upon your Zeal and Perseverance in so just a Cause, to enable me to make them good.

In the Midst of these extensive Transactions, I have been, and shall continue to be, attentive to the Prosecution of the War against Spain with the utmost Vigour; which is of the greatest Importance to the Trade and Navigation of my Subjects; the Encouragement and Protection whereof, shall be one of my principal Cares.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The Zeal, Unanimity, and Dispatch, with which you have given such large Supplies for the Service of the current Year, demand my particular Thanks; and are fresh Proofs of your Duty to me, and of your Concern for the true Interest of your Country. The Success, with which these Supplies have been raised, must convince all the World of the established Credit of this Nation.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have the justest Confidence in the Affections of my People, which I shall not fail to cultivate by a constant Care of their Rights and Liberties; and by promoting their Prosperity and Happiness. Let it be your Endeavour, in your respective Countries, to make these my good Intentions rightly understood; to calm and heal all Animosities and Divisions; to support my Authority and Government; and to preserve the Peace and good Order of the Kingdom.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said,

My Lords and Gentlemen,

IT is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This Day the Right Honourable John Lord Gower, was, by his Majesty's Command, sworn of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, as likewise Keeper of the Privy Seal; and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

This Day the Right Honourable Allen Lord Bathurst, and also the Right Honourable William Finch, Esq; Vice-Chamberlain of his Majesty's Household, were, by his Majesty's Command, sworn of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took their Places at the Board accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Twelfth of King Charles the Second, and divers other Acts, the Exportation and Loading on any Horse or Carriages or Vessels in order to Export out of Great Britain, Ireland, Jersey, Guernsey, Sark and Alderny to Foreign Parts, of any Sheep, Wool, Woolfells, Mortlings, Shortlings, Wool, Yarn, Wool Flocks, Fullers Earth, or Fulling Clay, or of Wool slightly manufactured, so as to be reducible to Wool again (except in the particular Cases therein mentioned) is strictly prohibited, under the Penalties of forfeiting the Goods, Twenty Shillings for every Sheep, Three Shillings for every Pound Weight of such Goods, and of the Ship and Tackle, and of all the Goods and Chattels of the Master and Mariners assisting, and Three Months Imprisonment, and the Penalties to be equally divided between the Crown and the Prosecutor. And by an Act of the Fourth of his Majesty King George the First, the Offender is to be transported for Seven Years, if he don't pay the Penalty after Conviction, and Three Months lying in Prison; and in Case of Return before the Seven Years, he is lyable to be punished with Death as a Felon. And by an Act of the First of King William and Queen Mary, Wool to be sent Coastwise is prohibited to be loaded or carried by Land within Five Miles of the Port from whence it is to be sent Coastwise, unless it is first entered at such Port, with its Weights, Marks and Numbers, under the Penalty of forfeiting the Goods, with the Horses and Carriages, and the Persons concerned in carrying them, are subject to the same Penalties as for Exportation. But this is not to hinder the Conveyance of Wool from the Place of Shearing to the Owner's Dwelling-house, or Outhouse, though within Five Miles of the Sea. Provided, that within Ten Days after Shearing, and before the Removal, he certifies to the Officers of the next Part the Number of Fleeces,

Fleeces, and where lodged, Three Days at least before Removal. And by the Seventh and Eighth of King William the Third, no such Goods are to be carried by Land within Five Miles of the Sea Coast, but between Sun Rising and Sun Setting, on the Penalty of forfeiting the Goods and Horses and Carriages; and if exported beyond the Sea, the Ship and Goods and treble the Value are forfeited, and the Inhabitants of the Hundred or Place next adjoining to the Sea Coast, out of or through which they shall be carried or Exported, are to forfeit Twenty Pounds, if the Goods are under Ten Pounds Value, and if above, then treble the Value and treble Costs, to be recovered against two or more Inhabitants, and the Justices at their Quarter Sessions are to tax each Town as in Case of a Robbery under the Statute of Hue and Cry. And all Aiders and Abettors are to suffer Three Years Imprisonment, and the Owners of the Goods are to pay treble the Value of the Forfeitures to the Inhabitants so charged. And by the same Act, and another Act of the Tenth and Eleventh of King William the Third, the Lords of the Admiralty are to appoint a certain Number of Ships of War and armed Sloops to cruize from the North Foreland to the Isle of Wight, and on the Coasts of England and Ireland, for seizing all Vessels Exporting Wool, with severe Penalties on the Officers neglecting their Duty therein. And whereas by the Ninth and Tenth of King William the Third, the Owners of Wool shorn or lodged within Ten Miles of the Sea, in Kent and Sussex, are obliged to give within Three Days after shearing, an exact Account in Writing of the Number of Fleeces, and the Place where lodged, to the Officers of the next Port, and the like Notice before the Removal of it, with the Names and Abodes of the Persons to whom disposed, on the like Penalties as on Exportation: And none who reside within Fifteen Miles of the Sea in those Counties, are to buy any Wool till Bond given, with sufficient Sureties not to sell it to any that reside within Fifteen Miles of the Sea, on the Penalty of forfeiting the Goods, with Three Shillings for every Pound Weight: And no Wool removed from the Place where first hous'd after Shearing, within Ten Miles of the Sea in those Counties, shall be lodged after the first Removal, within Fifteen Miles of the Sea, on the Penalty of forfeiting the Goods if found, and if not found, of Three Shillings per Pound Weight; which Penalties are to be divided, one Third to the Crown, and two Thirds to the Prosecutor. And whereas for the more effectual preventing the Exportation of Wool and Woollen Goods from Ireland to Foreign Parts; It is by the several Acts of Parliament of the First of King William and Queen Mary, the Seventh and Eighth of King William the Third, the Tenth and Eleventh of King William the Third, the Third of King George the First, and the Fifth of King George the First, provided, that none of those Goods shall be Exported out of Ireland, unless shipped in the particular Ports therein mentioned, and with Intent to be Imported into the Ports of Great-

Britain therein also specified, and unless Notice be first given to the Commissioners of the Customs, or to the Customer or Collector of the Port into which they are intended to be brought, of the Quantity, Quality and Package, with the Marks and Numbers, the Name of the Ship and Master, and the Port of Importation; and unless Bond be given, with sufficient Sureties in treble the Value of the Goods, that they shall be landed accordingly, and a Licence be also granted in the Manner therein directed, under the Penalty of forfeiting the Vessel and Goods and 500 l. by each Offender; and the Master, Mariners, Carriers, Waggoners, and other Persons assisting in the loading, carrying or exporting, contrary to those Acts, forfeit Forty Pounds for each Offence; and one Moiety of the Penalties is given to the Crown, and the other to the Prosecutor: And for the more effectual Prevention of all Frauds in the Exportation from Ireland, particular Directions are given for the Form of the Warrants for shipping of the Goods, and the Certificates of landing, and for registering all the Goods so Imported, and transmitting from Ireland an Account of the Goods so Exported to England: And whereas by an Act of the Twelfth of his present Majesty's Reign, no Wool or Woollen Goods therein mentioned, are to be Imported from Ireland, but in Vessels of the Built of Great Britain or Ireland, on the Forfeiture of the Ship and Goods. And it is further provided, that no Wool, Woolfells, &c. shall be pack'd up in any Box, Chest or other Package, except in Packs or Trusses of Leather or Canvas, to be marked on the Outside with the Words Wool or Yarn, in Letters not less than three Inches in Length, on the like Penalty as on Exportation, and that none shall be put on Board any Ship or Boat bound beyond the Sea, or laden in order to be carried Coastwise, unless Notice be first given to the Commissioners or Managers of the Customs of the Port from which it is to be Exported, of the Quantity, Quality and Package, Marks and Numbers thereof, with the Name of the Ship, and other Particulars, and unless Bond is first given with Surety for landing it accordingly, on the Penalty of forfeiting the Goods or the Value of them, with the Vessel and Furniture, and none of such Goods are to be landed but in the Presence of an Officer, who if he misbehaves therein, is to forfeit 200 l. and Persons bribing or attempting to bribe him, forfeit 300 l. And all Persons obstructing the Officer in his Duty are to be transported. And by the same Act, Insurers knowingly on Wool Exported to Foreign Parts, forfeit 500 l. and the Policy is made void; and all these Forfeitures are given solely to the Informer: And to encourage the Prosecution of Offenders, if any, who shall be convicted of the Three Shillings per Pound Weight by this or other Acts, shall be unable to pay it, One Shilling per Pound Weight is to be paid out of the Publick Revenue. And whereas the due Execution of the said Laws, and all other the Laws in Force made for this Purpose, is of the greatest Consequence to the Woollen Manufacturers of this

this Kingdom, and yet the same have been very much neglected, to the great Prejudice of this Nation; his Majesty duly weighing the many Mischiefs arising therefrom, and being firmly determined to cause all the said Laws to be effectually put into Execution, does by Advice of his Privy Council, strictly order and command all Officers of the Customs and others, to use their utmost Endeavours in the discovering, prosecuting and preventing the said Offences, under Pain of his Majesty's highest Displeasure. And doth likewise order and command the Commissioners of the Customs, and all Justices, Sheriffs, Officers and Subjects whatsoever, to be aiding and assisting therein, to the utmost of their Power.

Vienna, July 7, N. S.

A Courier from M. Gundel the Queen of Hungary's Secretary at Paris, having brought an Account of some Propositions that were made by the French Ministers to him and Count Steinville the Great Duke's Minister there, inviting the Queen to enter into a separate and private Negotiation with that Crown, towards the Conclusion of a General Peace; and offering to send a Person of Confidence immediately to Vienna for that Purpose, Her Majesty has been pleased to order the following Answer to be returned to those Insinuations, and the same to be communicated at the Courts of her Allies.

THE Queen has been as attentive as it was humanly possible, not to give any Shadow of a Pretence to her unjust Enemies for attacking her. And the Cardinal Fleury must know better than any Body her pacifick Sentiments. No Sort of Regard was had to them, at the Time when it was thought they might be able to oppress her. The Queen has in her Hands authentick Proofs of all the Ill that was designed her, to a Degree even to lose Sight of Christianity. The Hopes of succeeding therein are now vanished, and a great Change has happened in Affairs. However they have beforehand ruined and ravaged her Dominions, overturned the fundamental Constitutions of the Empire, oppressed the Liberty of Germany; and it was not the Fault of France, that the House of Austria was not entirely annihilated, which it was pretended indeed did no longer exist; and all this has been done without the least Regard to the Treaties, and to the most solemn Guaranties. It was even boasted, that they would give Laws to the Queen upon the Bastions of Vienna. And what was aim'd at was nothing less than to impose the Yoke upon Germany, and upon all Europe. The Cause of the Queen is therefore become the Cause of all the Princes of the Empire, who are true Patriots, and of all those Powers who have at Heart Tranquillity, and Independance. The Point is, to secure both the one and the other, with their Concurrence, without which we should work but at a patched Peace. And although the Queen persists in her Moderation, and pacifick Sentiments, it is still equally just and indispensible, as well to redress the extreme Injuries that have been already done her,

as to secure her against the like Enterprizes for the future.

Copenhagen, July 14. The Russian Squadron from Archangel being daily expected in the Sound, Baron Korff has bespoken a friendly Treatment and Reception for it, if Occasion requires, upon the Coasts and in the Ports of Denmark; to which he has received a favourable Answer. A Ship Master, just come into the Sound, reports that he saw thirteen Sail of Russian Ships cruising pretty high upon the Ocean off the Coast of Norway, and that at a good Distance lower he met with six or seven Swedish Men of War.

Brussels, July 18. Upon Application having been made by the British Minister here to Count Harrach, Governor General of the Austrian Netherlands, his Excellency promised to send Orders to Ostend for releasing the English Collier brought lately into that Port by a Spanish Privateer.
