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Constantinople, June 30.

THE Ministry is now in good Measure form'd; the Kayhaugh is removed, and made Governor of Belgrade, with the Pashawship of Salonica for his Subfiftance. He is succeeded by the Person who was removed by the late Vizier. The Teftendar was changed the 28th: He is fucceeded by Atiff Effendy, a very able and experienced Man, who has before fill'd that Office. His British Majesty's Ship the Chatham is arrived at Tenedos; one of the Ships under her Convoy, bound for Alexandria, parted with her off Candia, the other is come within the Dardanel. The new Ambaffador from Venice arrived Yesterday.

Constantinople, July 3. It is the general Perfuaſion here, that the Perſian has really made up his Affairs with the Leſſees, and is advanced into the Province of Erivan: Freſh Orders are thereupon given to aſſemble the Ottoman Forces with all poſſible Expedition; they are to be commanded by Hamaul Oglu; the Rendezvous will probably be at Erzerum. There is Advice juſt arrived from Smyrna, of the Arrival of another of the Turkey Company's Ships there, the Thames.

Rome, July 8. On the 23d Cardinal Borghese, as Protector of the Empire, had a publick Audience of the Pope.

Naples, July 24, N. S. The King, on the preſent Occaſions, has demanded two Millions of Ducats; one on the publick Banks of this City, and the other on the Barons of the Kingdom. On the 9th a Cabinet Courier was diſpatched to M. de Caſtropignano, with a large Sum of Money in Specie for the King's Army in Lombardy. The ſame Day the eldeſt Son of the Duke di Tremoli, Cabanco, return'd hither from Madrid by way of Rome, where he had attended his Father the King's Ambaffador at that Court; as did on the 15th from Venice the Prince della Roccella, Caraffa, purſuant to the Notification from the Court to all Nobles Abroad to repair to this City. On the 10th the Queen's Name was celebrated with the uſual Solemnity, the Foreign Miniſters, Nobility, Military Officers, &c. were to compliment their Majeſties on that Occaſion, and in the Evening there was a triple Diſcharge of the Cannons of theſe Fortreſſes. On the 24th their Majeſties retired for eight Days to their Apartments, on Account of

the Death of the late Queen Dowager of Spain, according to the uſual Cuſtom on theſe Occaſions, and the Court appeared in deep Mourning. The Magiſtrate of Health has laid a Quarantine of five Days on all Ships and Veſſels from Leghorne, and other Ports of Tuſcany. Two of the King's Gallies are order'd to remain in this Mole, and Orders have been ſent to two others in Sicily, to avoid meeting with the Engliſh Ships of War.

Florence, July 31. Two Expreſſes arrived here Yeſterday from M. de Traun with Diſpatches to General Braitwitz; the Contents of which are, That on the 24th Inſtant the Spaniſh Army decamped from its Poſts at Bordeno, which M. de Montemar had fortified. He took the Road towards the Ferrareſe, and arrived the 28th at Lugo, continuing his March by the Lower Romagna towards Rimini, whither he had before ſent the Baggage and the Sick. The Auſtrian and Sardinian Armies paſſed the Panaro in Four Columns on the 25th at Night, The King of Sardinia at the Head of his Troops arrived the next Evening at a Place called St. Giovanni. M. de Traun's Troops who formed the Rear, were quartered at a ſmall Diſtance, at a Place called Guiſe, about Two Miles from Bologna. The Senate immediately deputed Eight of their Members to compliment the King, and Four to M. de Traun. Both theſe Armies were to be, as laſt Night, at Imola, from whence they were to march, in order of Battle, towards Rimini, it being reported that the Spaniſh and Neapolitan Troops, who have gained Three Marches, will endeavour to fortify themſelves there in order to receive them. On the 23d an Ediſt from the Regency was publiſhed about the City, forbidding, under very ſevere Punishments, the inliſting Soldiers for Foreign Services, and Pickets out of the new Regiment of Militia have been ordered to the different Towns and Villages of the State to prevent it, ſome Spaniſh Captains and Lieutenants, attended by four or five Serjeants and Corporals each, having often appeared in the Country with Paſſes from M. de Montemar, on a Pretence of being on their Journey to the Gulph of Spezia.

Stockholm, July 27, O. S. The Letters from Finland bring but melancholy Accounts of the Situation of Affairs there, ſince the Armies have taken the Field. General Lewenhaupt, after having abandoned Frederickſham, and ſet Fire to it, came and encamped with his Army behind

hind the River Kymene; where the Muscovites having followed him, the two Armies cannonaded each other several Days across the said River. But the Swedes soon quitted this Post also, and came to Abbersford, apprehending they were in Danger of being surrounded, if the Muscovites, who are much superior to them in Number, should pass the Kymene. Since then, the last Letters advise, that General Lewenhaupt is retired with his Army to Gamelby, and that the Muscovites are advanced as far as Abbersford. In these several Retreats the Swedes have been obliged to leave behind them some Magazines and Artillery, which are fallen into the Hands of the Muscovites.

From Field Marshal Khevenhuller's Camp in Bavaria, July 28, N. S.

The French here continue close in their Intrenchments, which however are no great Hindrance to their Desertion. A Bridge being thrown over the Isser, the Bavarians also begin to desert, and we have already received above 40, among which are many of our own Men, who have taken Advantage of the Queen's general Pardon. The Bavarians near Pilsting are near 5000 strong, commanded by Minuzzi, whom we exchanged for Ogilvy. Our Hussars keep them in a constant Alarm, and as often as they can come at them, which their Situation, amongst a Number of Morasses, renders difficult, obtain more or less Advantages. It appears that the Enemy here intends to wait the Event of the Affair of Prague. Marshal Bellisle has asked another Conference with Count Konigsegg, which was absolutely refused him.

July 31. Yesterday Colonel Menzel had a Skirmish with the Bavarians, and took ten Prisoners: This Enemy narrowly watches our Motions, and hurries from one Intrenchment to another, for the Sake of always keeping as far as he can from us, and we give him all the Fatigue we can.

Extract of a Letter from Motol near Prague, Aug. 8, N. S.

This Day a Man was stopt, who gave himself out to be in the King of Prussia's Service, but in his Saddle was found his Commission of Lieutenant Colonel from the Emperor, with Orders for Prague. Our first Battery having been finished this Night, we began about Noon to fire upon the Garden of Mansfeldt, where M. Broglio had his Quarters, and drove the French from thence. They answered us from another Garden opposite to that, and have wounded some of our Men. Six thousand Pounds of Powder having taken Fire, a House was thereby destroyed, and a Captain and 12 Grenadiers were buried under the Ruins, whereof several have already been dug out. The said Garden is to be entirely demolished, to hinder the French from lodging there again. Fifty of our Hussars overthrew Yesterday the grand Guards of the French, having killed ten or twelve of them, taken seven Prisoners, and driven the rest within Musket Shot of their Foot.

Vienna, Aug. 4. The Hungarians, in the late Action before Prague, had five Officers killed and six wounded, 34 private Men killed and 87 wounded, 37 Horses killed and 107 wounded, and a Captain taken Prisoner. Of the French, M. de Gramont a Colonel was taken Prisoner with 12 Men, about 300 Men were killed, and 118 deserted with their Horses.

Whereas divers Persons, thro' Ignorance or Carelessness, frequently put Letters into the General Post Offices, and the Receiving Houses both in Town and Country, directed on board of Ships, and to Foreign Parts, without paying at the same Time the Postage, as ought to be done; And whereas Letters and Packets are often put into the said Offices with Money and Rings inclosed, and in Fraud of his Majesty's Revenue, divers Persons presume to send Letters with false and counterfeit Franks; This is to acquaint the Publick, that no Letters under any of the Circumstances aforesaid have any Right by Law to be forwarded.

Note, That Letters going out of Great Britain (except to France, Holland, and Flanders) have by the ancient Usage of this Office paid the Foreign Postage, and are required by the Act of Parliament so to do, at the Office in Great Britain where the same are first put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
