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Translation of the Journal of the Russian Army under the Command of Felt Marshal Lascy, printed at Moscow, the 21st of July.

First Relation of the 11th of July, from the Camp situated on the other Side of the River Kymen.

AFTER having passed the two first Arms of the Kymen, we likewise passed on the 10th the third Arm of this River, with as much Difficulty as we found when we passed the former in the building of our Bridges, the River being very rapid, and having many Cataracts.

A Party of our Cossacks having swam across it in the Evening, they met a Party of the Enemy's Cavalry consisting of 40 Men, whom they cut to Pieces, making a Subaltern Officer and eight Soldiers Prisoners, and there were but three who saved themselves in a neighbouring Wood. Other Parties of Cossacks brought to our Camp above 300 Head of Cattle and Horses. The same Day, the 10th, I sent the Brigadier General Prince Cantimir with a Detachment to reconnoitre the Enemy 28 Wersts advanced before us at Abersfors, who saw one of their Guards on the other Side of the River, and approached so near, that he fired on them, which the Swedes did not answer. In returning they took a Peasant, who reported, that the Swedish Army had passed the 6th a Place called Pithos, going to Borgo, which he himself had seen; that one Part of this Army stayed at Abersfors, on the other Side of the River, and that he had heard that the Swedish Avant Guard had got to Borgo, and that they were to go, as the Report went, to Helsingfors, or elsewhere. That he had also heard, that the Fleet remained near the Island Apso; but that he himself had seen, three Days before, the Fleet of Gallies and some Frigates at the said Pithos. The Enemy, in retiring, burn their Bridges, cut down the Corn, ruin the Ways, and carry off whatever they find in the Villages. I will endeavour to pursue them immediately to Abersfors, where the Gallies will join me, and if they should be gone from thence, I will follow them farther without Loss of Time.

Second Relation of the 13th of July, from the Camp near a Place called Kypis.

The 11th we marched 11 Wersts forward to Kypis, and having thrown a Bridge there over the River, a considerable Detachment of our Cavalry and Grenadiers, with many General Officers, went still 12 Wersts and a half farther, to Pithos. There we found a Bridge burnt down, and another broke. The Hussars, by my Order, swam over the River, and advanced five Wersts, to Abersfors, where they saw but few of the Enemy, whom they fired at across the River. After having built a Bridge at Pithos, I ordered a Detachment of the Army to pass it, with some Field Pieces, with Directions to go to Abersfors, to make the Hussars pass the River there, in order to reconnoitre the Country

as far as Rernokirki, and to follow the Hussars thither, there being no more Rivers to pass, and from thence to send the Hussars to Borgo, who are to endeavour to demolish that Town. The Body of the Army is as this Day, the 13th, in the Camp at Kypis. I have ordered our Fleet, consisting of 43 Gallies, and many Prahms and Bomb Vessels, under the Command of General Lewaschoff, to go to Borgo, and from thence to Helsingfors, to search for the Enemy's Gallies, which we shall follow with all possible Diligence.

Messina, July 23, N. S. The Patron of a Messinese Bark which arrived here the 18th Instant in two Days from Port Farin near Tunis, gives an Account, that the French, who have a Settlement at a Place called La Cella in the Kingdom of Algiers, with a Garrison of between 800 and 1000 Men, some few Days before the said Patron left Port Farin, drew out 400 of them, and, in the Night Time, made a Descent on the Island of Tabarca, thinking to have surprized it, but, by some Means or other, the Moors having penetrated their Design, laid themselves so in Ambush, that when the French were all landed, the Moors came out, and fell upon them with such Bravery, that, on the Spot, they killed near 200 of them, and took the others Prisoners, with 30 or 40 Officers, whose Heads, by Order of the Bey, were cut off, and laid in the Tavern or Wine Cellar which the French have in Tunis. On the 15th Instant arriv'd here the Queen of Heaven, a Venetian Brigantine, Captain Peter Balasan, from Tripoli de Barbaria, who has a Passenger on board performing his Quarantine here, one Abraham Caragular, that says he is going on an Embassy to England from the Bey of Tripoli.

Lisbon, July 30. The 9th Instant the King set out for the Caldas and arrived there the next Day, with less Fatigue than could have been expected. The 12th the Queen went thither, and all the Royal Family are now there. The Prince Don Francisco, who had been out of Order before he set out, was taken very ill a few Days after he arrived, and died the 21st; his Body has been brought to Town and buried at St. Vicente de Fora, where several of the Royal Family lye interred. By Letters of the 25th from Caldas, we hear, that the King has taken the fourth Bath, that his Majesty is better, and that the Waters agree with his Constitution, altho' they have not yet so intirely restored to him the Use of his left Side, as was expected and wish'd.

Lisbon, July 31. By a Letter from Oporto dated the 21st Instant, there is Advice, that Captain Elton, of the Deal Castle, having met on his Cruise with his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Loo, they went into Vigo River and demanded Contribution, but, upon the Inhabitants refusing to comply, the Captains had cannonaded the Town, burnt and destroyed three Vessels, and carried off a fourth, which proved to be an English Prize.

Florence, Aug. 11, N. S. Cardinal Borghese, Protector of Germany, and invested with the

(for that Day only) went the 1st of August in the Afternoon, to the Quirinal, where he performed the Ceremony of paying Obedience in the Name of his Master, to the Pope, and of demanding the Confirmation of the Imperial Dignity in taking the usual Oaths; tho' this Act, by the two last Emperors Joseph and Charles VI. was only performed in the Presence of the three Cardinals of the Palace, the Pope was desirous, this Time, of having several Witnesses to it, and being seated on his Throne, accompanied by the Cardinals Ruffa, Belluga, Mosca Aquaviva, Alexander Albani Corini, Valenti Gonzaga, Aldrovandi and Passionei. His Eminency, afterwards, in the Name of his Master, made the usual Demands of what is call'd the Jus Primarum Precum, viz. that the Emperor might be permitted for one Year to dispose of all the Benefices of the Empire that are or shall become vacant in the Months which the Pope has a Right of collating to them, which being granted by the Pope, and the Cardinal's Function being accordingly at an End, he returned to his Palace and laid down the Character of Ambassador.

From the Camp before Prague, Aug. 20.

The 17th in the Evening we began a Parallel, by way of Communication betwixt our two Posts of the Schans and Shilhorn; the 18th three Batteries were begun, one at the Left of the Schans towards the Town, the other two beyond Shilhorn, which is the same with Angeli-que: All the three will be ready to play after To-morrow. About Nine at Night the Enemy began to fire from the Rampart upon our Workmen, which continued till the next Morning the 19th, half an Hour after Three, when they made a Sally with five Brigades of their Infantry, 16 Companies of Grenadiers, 300 Dragoons, and 300 Carabineers, in all 6000 Men, commanded by a Marechal de Camp, and two Brigadiers. They divided this Force in two Parts, the greatest of which attacked the Swedish Schantz, where most of the Guard had been detached to cover the different Workmen. When we first broke Ground here, the 11th Orders were given to the farthest advanced Posts not to fire upon any Account, but to retire as quick as possible, and acquaint the commanding Officer if any Part of the Enemy advanced. This Order was transmitted, it seems, from the advanced Posts to one another afterwards, unknown to the Officer who commanded, and therefore all that covered the new Battery, and were advanced before our Posts, came running back full Speed into the Schantz, with the Enemy at their Heels, whose Fire upon the few that remained in it was the first Thing that alarmed them, who were not 200 Men, so that the Enemy poured immediately into it, to the Number of 3500 Men, and nailed four Pieces of Cannon, and the Mortars; mean while most of the different Detachments that had given Way at the first Alarm, rallied about 400 Paces behind, where there was a Lieutenant Colonel with 160 Men, and just about Day-break marched towards the Enemy, who immediately gave way, and fled into the Fossé of the Town without doing any other Hurt; a Surprize that succeeded extremely well with them at first, and of which they might have made a much better Use. On the Left they had the same Success, but Prince Charles's Regiment being in Battallion behind the Trench, chased them immediately out again. The Loss at both Right and Left amounts to 61 killed and wounded. We have a Captain of Navarre Prisoner, and the Enemy one of ours: We look on it as a little Affront,

but it has not retarded the Works above four Hours; and it's a Lesson that will be very useful to us in, the Sequel of the Siege.

Dresden, Aug. 22, N. S. By the Accounts we have of the Route laid out for the French Troops under Marshal Maillebois, they reckon to be at Furthe near Nuremberg on the 11th of September N. S.

Hamburg, Aug. 24, N. S. The Report which has been current here that the Swedish Fleet was returned to Carlscroon, is since found to be without Foundation.

Note, That Letters going out of Great Britain (except to France, Holland, and Flanders) have by the ancient Usage of this Office paid the Foreign Postage, and are required by the Act of Parliament so to do, at the Office in Great Britain where the same are first put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
