Moscow, December 13.

UPON the News of Schach Nadyr's Army having made some Motions towards the Russian Frontiers, Orders have been given to some of our Regiments to march that Way. Their Rendezvous is to be at Keflar, and the Major General de Lieven, who will be made Lieutenant General, will have the Command of them. An Edict has been published here, prohibiting the Wearing of Gold and Silver Lace, or Embroidery in Apparel, from which however the Imperial Family and Foreigners are excepted.

Moscow, Dec. 16. Some Days ago the Empress sent the blue Ribbon with the Order of St. Andrew to General Keith, Commander in Chief in Finland. Yesterday about Noon, her Imperial Majesty, accompanied with his Imperial Highness the Great Duke, and attended with a very numerous Retinue, set out from this City on her Return to Petersburg. Her Majesty proposed to celebrate her Birth-Day on Saturday next at Novogorod, which City is five Hundred and fifty Werst distant from this, and two hundred Werst on this Side Petersburg. The three Nights immediately preceeding the Empress's Departure from hence, the Court was very numerous, and every Person there had the Honour to kiss her Imperial Majesty's Hand.

Milan, Dec. 29. Some Days since died at his Residence of Vercelli, his Eminence Cardinal Ferrerio, Bishop of the said Town, of the Dominican Order.

Mantua, Dec. 29. The Queen of Hungary's Cavalry is posted at present along the Po, at Bondeno, Ostiglia, Sermide, and Revere. Our Commandant the Marquis Pallavicini is raising 500 more Men for the Garrison of this Place, the Croats being gone for the Army.

Prague, Jan. 5. That Part of the French Garrison that was allowed by the Capitulation to withdraw, went out of the Town the 2d of

this Month. Prince Lobkowitz the same Day entered the Town by the Wischeradt or Citadel, at the Head of part of his own Army, amidst the Acclamations of the Inhabitants, who cried out long live Maria Theresä Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, Long live Prince Lobkowitz. The Prince dined the same Day with the Archbishop, and in the Evening was conducted to his Quarters by the Light of fifty Flambeaus; next Day Te Deum was sung in the Cathedral Church.

Vienna, Jan. 5. Marshal Kevenhuller is at Lintz to concert with the States of the Upper Austria the necessary Preparations for the Carriage of Provisions to the Army. The Council of War have ordered the Fortifications of Scharding and Passau to be augmented.

Vienna, Jan. 9. General Fëstetitz writes, that the French Army having divided itself into two Columns beyond Egra, in their farther March towards the Naab, he had put himself with his Hussars, in such a Manner between them, as to make a Kind of a third Column; that between Prague and the Place from whence he wrote, he had pierced their Columns no less than 23 Times, and that of above 1500 Prisoners that he had taken, half had died at their approaching to Fires, which shews how great the Influence of the Cold, and what the Effects of sudden Heat may have been upon the whole French Army.

Paris, Jan. 17. N. S. The Chevalier de Belleisle is arrived at Court. The Marshal his Brother has obtained leave to repair to his Seat, at Vernon, to take a little Repose there. M. D'Argenson is appointed Secretary at War in the Room of the late M. Breteuil. There has been an Action at Aignes-Belles between seven Battalions of Sardinian Troops, and some Regiments of Spaniards.

N. B. A Post Chaise may be had at any of the Stages on the Harwich Road, to go Part or all the Way, for one or more Stages, for those that do not chuse to travel in the Night.

General Post Office, London, July 3, 1742.

Whereas divers Persons, thro' Ignorance or Carelessness, frequently put Letters into the General Post Offices, and the Receiving Houses both in Town and Country, directed on board of Ships, and to Foreign Parts, without paying at the same Time the Postage, as ought to be done; And whereas Letters and Packets are often put into the said Offices with Money and Rings inclosed, and in Fraud of his Majesty's Revenue, divers Persons presume to send Letters with false and counterfeit Franks.

This is to acquaint the Publick, that no Letters under any of the Circumstances aforesaid have any Right by Law to be forwarded.

Note, That Letters going out of Great Britain (except to France, Holland, and Flanders) have by the ancient Usage of this Office paid the Foreign Postage, and are required by the Act of Parliament so to do, at the Office in Great Britain where the same are first put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
