The following new Regulation has been publish'd here.

THE further most gracious Declaration of his Majesty upon the Regulation of the 28th of July 1741, that Salt, Victuals, and Cloth, shall not for the future be accounted contraband, but shall be permitted to be transported freely to the Ports of Russia that are not actually blocked up. Given in the Council Chamber the 20th of January, 1743.

WE Friderick, by the Grace of God, King of Sweden, of the Goths, and of the Wandales, &c. &c. Landgrave of Hesse, &c. &c. do declare, That although by our gracious Regulation of the 28th of July 1741, and the Explanation thereof of the 14th of August in the same Year, which hath been printed, for the Regulation as well of our Ships of War as of commission'd Privateers, we had, amongst other things, ordered, That Salt, all Sorts of Victuals, and all Kind of Cloathing for Soldiers, should be looked upon as contraband Merchandizes, and declared to be liable to be confiscated, if, during this War, such Things should be found and taken in Vessels bound to the Ports of the Enemy: Nevertheless we have for certain Reasons relating thereto, and upon the humble Advice of the States of our Kingdom, thought proper at present to make some Alteration therein; and in Consequence thereof, we are pleas'd by these Presents graciously to declare, That no other Merchandizes shall be deemed contraband but only Arms, Ammunition, and Regimentals; so that for the future, the Transportation of Salt, Victuals, and Cloth, shall be permitted to the Ports of Russia that are not actually blocked up. For the rest, our gracious Regulation above-mentioned of the 28th of July, and the Explanation of the 14th of August 1741, shall remain as to all the Points contained in it, in full Force and Effect. All those whom it shall concern shall be obliged to conform themselves thereto. For the greater Force, we have signed these Presents with our own Hand, and caused them to be confirmed with our Royal Seal. Stockholm, in the Council Chamber, the 20th of January, 1742.

Naples, Jan. 29. In virtue of the Treaty with the Bey of Tunis, the King is to allow him a certain Sum of Money, and 250 Dollars to be paid for each Slave, Subject of the Two Sicilies. The recover'd Spanish Soldiers, as it is pretended, from the different Hospitals in Abruzzo, are repairing to their respective Companies of M. de Gage's Army, in the Ecclesiastical State. On the 28th the King's Birth-Day was celebrated here with the usual Solemnity, the foreign Ministers, Nobility and Military Officers in rich Habits, were to compliment their Majesties on that Occasion, on which M. de Castropignano, Captain General of the King's Forces, entertain'd many of the Nobility at a great Dinner, and in the Evening there was a triple Discharge of the Cannon of the Fortresses, Gallies, &c. The Queen goes on happily in the seventh Month of her Pregnancy.

Rome, Feb. 2. In the last Week several of the Inlisters for the Spanish Service were taken up by Order of the Government, against whom a criminal Process is carrying on. On the 1st past the Pope conferr'd on M. Visconti the vacant Archbishoprick of Milan, and M. Atese succeeds him in the Charge of Auditor di Ruota, with which the former was charged. On the 27th died of an Asthma Cardinal Pieri; as did on the 30th Cardinal del Giudice of a Pleuresy, and this Day Cardinal Cortadina.

Florence, Feb. 5. From Lombardy we are informed, that on the 2d Instant M. de Gages, pursuant to the repeated Orders he had receiv'd from the Spanish Court, had, on a sudden, began his March with the Troops under his Command, from the Neighbourhood of Bologna, and halted that Evening at St. Giovanni in Persiceto, about ten Miles from that City, 'tis thought with a Design to attempt either a Surprise on the Austrians, or to gain some advantageous Post over the Panola of the Modanese: His Army marches in order of Battle, to whom he caused the Allowance of Bread to be distributed for eight Days, and Thirty six Charges for each Soldier, having mov'd the heavy Baggage and Sick from Bologna to Imola. The said Army has within some few Days past been reinforced with several hundred Men from the Kingdom of Naples, being as they pretend, Invalids recover'd in the Hospitals in Abruzzo, wher they were left upon the Retreat of M. de Montemar from Rimini. Other small Parties

ties have also join'd the said Army from Orbello, where Trains of Artillery for Battery and Field Pieces are preparing with great Expedition in order to be sent to the said Army. The Austrian and Sardinian Troops remain in their former Posts. In the last Week a Party of Spaniards seized a Boat in the Po, in the Jurisdiction of Ferrara, laden with Provisions and a Sum of Money belonging to the Austrians: The Legat of Ferrara, on Notice thereof, order'd the Spaniards into Confinement, whereupon M. de Gages threatened the Legat to plunder and set Fire to the City; but as the Legat, 'tis said, applied to the Austrians for Assistance, M. de Gages did not think proper to put his Menaces in Execution; the Spanish Soldiers were however set at Liberty. The Electress Dowager Palatine continues out of order with a Cold and slight Fever, M. de Braitwitz is on the mending Hand of the dangerous Illness he had of a Pleurisy, of which many People in this City die, occasion'd by the excessive cold Weather. On the 29th past, sail'd from Leghorn his Britannick Majesty's Ships the Revenge Captain Barkely, and the Salisbury Captain Osborn.

Hamburg, Feb. 29, N. S. We hear from Stockholm, that M. Berkentin, the Danish Ambassador, having required that Deputies might be nominated to enter into Conference with him upon the Subject of his Negotiation, the following Persons had been chosen for that Commission, viz. the Senators Gyllenborg, Tessin, and Wrangel, to whom a fourth had been added, who is M. Klinkenstrom, but that some Objections had been made in the Diet against the Appointment of Count Tessin, so that the Affair was not absolutely settled when the Post came from thence.

Brussels, Feb. 20, N. S. The Division of British Troops under the Command of Brigadier Huske, march'd out of this Town Yesterday. The same Day in the Afternoon, Major General Ligonier lead his Division at the Head of the Royal Grey Dragoons; who made a very fine Appearance. One Division of Foot is still here. Monday proved rainy and snow'y for two Hours in the Morning, and very boisterous after, but the Weather is now likely to prove dry. The last Column of the Hessians march'd out this Day for Mons.

Hague, Feb. 22, N. S. From the Empire we have an Account of the Austrians gaining Ground every Day in the Upper Palatinate, where they had been some Time in Possession of Schwandorf, as some Letters say they are now of Amberg too. Egra was close blockaded, so that no Provisions of any Kind could enter. The Mortality of the French in Bavaria continued to a terrible Degree. They gave out that a Body of 15000 Recruits was upon full March to join them. From Italy, that the Spaniards pass'd the Panaro the 3d Instant, and were upon full March towards the Modenese; that the Austrians had abandoned Buerporto upon their Approach, and were assembling together with the Piedmontese Troops to oppose the farther Progress of the Spanish Army. From Flanders we hear, that the British Troops were in Motion in different Columns since the 15th Instant towards the Meuse.

put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are
put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of
such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the
same into such Office.
