*Stockholm, February 1.*

**O**N Saturday last a Resolution was taken by all the Orders of the States, that no Motion or Proposal concerning the Succession to the Crown, should be made by any Member, till such Time as the Grand Secret Deputation, jointly with the Senate, should have declared to the Diet that such Deliberation might be entered into without any Prejudice to the Safety and Dignity of this Nation.

*Petersbourg, Feb. 5.* General Keith hath resolved to remain in this Service, as has likewise Lieutenant General Lieven, and several other Foreign Officers of Reputation. General Lowendahl has indeed obtained Leave to go to Poland, and from thence to Holstein; but it is believed he will come back again, and at his Return be made General of the Artillery, in the room of the Prince of Hesse Hombourg, who solicits the Permission to go into Germany for the Recovery of his Health. The Day before Yesterday was celebrated here the Anniversary of the Institution of the Order of St. Anne, founded by the late Duke of Holstein upon his Marriage with the Princess Anne, Sister to her present Imperial Majesty. His Imperial Highness the Great Duke, Sovereign of the Order, and ten Knights, dress'd in the Habit of the Order, went in Procession through the Empress's Apartments to Chapel, where Divine Service was performed by the Archbishop of Novogorod, assisted by four Bishops. Afterwards his Imperial Highness dined in Publick with the said Knights. There were several Discharges of Cannon, and a grand Concert of Vocal and Instrumental Musick during Dinner. In the Evening there was a Masquerade at Court.

*Naples, Feb. 12, N. S.* Last Week a Convoy of eleven Transports from Brindisi anchored at this Port, conducting the Artillery, Ammunition, &c. which some few Months ago was sent from hence for the Use of the Spanish and Neapolitan Armies in the Ecclesiastical State. The King has granted the Exportation from the Kingdom of Sicily of 100,000 Tomolis of Corn, free from the usual Duties, for the Benefit of the Publick.

*Florence, Feb. 16. N. S.* Upon the 11th towards Evening the Spanish Army returned, and took up their old Posts again in the Suburbs of Bologne, in the Chartreux, and other Convents. M. de Gages, when he was got upon the Bridge of Rheno, a Mile off Bologne, caused a triple Discharge of small Arms and Field Pieces to be made by the Troops which had already passed over it, and in his March under the Walls of Bologne he caused himself to be preceded, by Way of Triumph, by two hundred Austrians, who had been taken Prisoners in the Beginning of the Battle. After this he went to his old Quarters. Upon the 12th in the Morning he went, accompanied by his principal Officers richly dressed, to the Church of the Spanish College

in Bologne, where he caused solemn Mass and Te Deum to be sung for the great Victory obtained over the Armies of the Queen of Hungary, and the King of Sardinia. The Spaniards had given out through the City of Bologne, that they would that Day expose to publick View the Kettle Drums and the Standards which they had taken from the Enemy, which drew a great Concourse of People together, but nothing of that Kind was to be seen, which occasioned great Laughing and Raillery among the Populace. According to their own Account they left above Three thousand Men dead upon the Field of Battle, and there are almost as many wounded and deserted. In the Spanish Brigade of Guards alone there are wanting 80 Officers, the greatest Part of which were killed. The Walloons, the Spanish Guards, the Regiments of Ireland, and of Lombardy, the Regiments of Sagunto, and the Queen's Dragoons are almost entirely ruined, and the Royal Carabineers have suffered a great deal. The Lieutenants General Mac Donel and his two Sons, the Dukes D'Arcos, D'Atrisco, and the Count D'Aranda are wounded, besides a great Number of other Officers. M. de Gages, the Day before the Battle, sent away his Plate, Baggage, and other Things of Value by the Way of Ferrara to Faenza. At present he is fortifying himself at the Chartreux and other Posts under the Walls of Bologne, upon the Advice that he has received that a Body of three thousand Austrians are come on this Side of the Panaro, and have encamped at Castel St. Giovanni. But although the Spaniards pretend that they will remain at Bologne, it is nevertheless believed that they design to retire towards the Romagna, for it is certain that they have sent away in the Night a great many Carriages for Faenza, and that their Army is so broken, that it is not in a Condition to make Resistance against a small Body of Troops. They confess that M. de Traun made surprizing good Use of his Cannon and his Infantry, but say that his Cavalry performed but indifferently. A Colonel of the Royal Carabineers passed through this Place the Day before Yesterday, who, as is reported, is carrying to Madrid the Standards taken from the Austrians in the last Battle. There is a Report here, that the Pope is fallen ill, and that this News was brought by some Travellers who left Rome after the last Post.

*Rome, Feb. 16.* M. de Thun has caused all the Papers and Writings of the late Cardinal del Guidice, relating to the Affairs of the Queen of Hungary, to be removed to his own House, in Expectation of the Instructions of the Court of Vienna.

*Florence, Feb. 19.* Yesterday, about Three of the Clock in the Afternoon, died of a Malignant Fever, the Electress Dowager Palatine. Last Night an Extraordinary Council was held, and in the Night a Courier was, by the Regency, dispatched to Rome, with Directions to the Great Duke's Minister to take Possession of her Money and Reveue in that State. This Morning a Courier

Courier was dispatched to the Great Duke to acquaint his Highness therewith. All publick Diversions, Operas, &c. have been forbidden; and the Preparations for her Funeral are making with great Hurry. On the 17th at Night died at Leghorne, of a Pleuretick Fever, Prince Ottajano de Medicis, a Subject of the King of Naples.

*Vienna, Feb. 20.* Three Battallions compleat of an old Hungarian Regiment, joined on the Road by a fourth, are already ordered into Italy, with 1500 Recruits for the German Regiments there, to reinforce Marshal Trauh. It may be depended on that the Spaniards have not lost less than 4500 Men, and the Confederates not more than 1000. Prince Lobcowitz's Head Quarter is at Neuburg near Cham, but he is extended all along the Naab.

*Ratisbon, Feb. 25.* The Troops under the Command of Velt Marshal Khevenhuller are actually marched out of the Places where they were cantoned, in order to form the Blockade of Braunau and Burghausen. Prince Lobcowitz advances every Day towards Straubing, in such a Manner as seems to imply an Intention to besiege that Town. Marshal Maillebois, who continues to command at Stadt-am-Hoff, has sent Part of his Baggage to this City, where it is lodged in the House of M. de la Noüe the French Minister.

*Maestricht, March 1, N. S.* On the 27th of February the Earl of Stair passed through this Place in his Way to Aix la Chapelle, under a triple Discharge of our Artillery; and this Day the British Train arrived here, where it will continue for some Time, on Account of the Badness of the Roads; and the Horses belonging to it were intended to be sent to Vifet, a Town two Leagues distant from hence, in the Principality of Liege.

*Aix la Chapelle, Feb. 28, N. S.* Last Night his Excellency Velt Marshal Earl of Stair arrived here from Maestricht.

*St. Tron, March 1, N. S.* Yesterday the Fifth Division of the English Troops, consisting of the Royal Regiment of Dragoons, with Major General Howard's and Colonel Handasyd's Regiments of Foot, arrived here, and will pursue their March To-morrow for Tongres and Maestricht.

*Liege, March 5, N. S.* Yesterday the Sixth Division of the English Forces, consisting of Sir Robert Rich's Dragoons, with Peer's and Pulteney's Regiments of Foot, commanded by Brigadier Pulteney, arrived at Tongres, and will this Day prosecute their March through Maestricht towards the Neighbourhood of Aix la Chapelle. And Yesterday the Seventh Division, consisting of Lord Cadogan's Dragoons, with the Regiments of Brigadier Onslow and Brigadier Conwallis; arrived at St. Tron, upon the Frontier of this Principality; from whence they will proceed To-morrow by the same Route of Tongres and Maestricht.

*Berlin, March 2, N. S.* The King of Prussia is expected here from Potzdam on Tuesday next. He will stay but a few Days in Town; from hence he returns to Potzdam, where he will remain till the 20th Instant, which is the Day appointed for his Journey to Silesia.

*Brussels, March 6, N. S.* By Advices from Ratisbon of the 19th of February, they have there refused a Passage to a Body of French Troops detached from Straubing for Stadt-am-Hoff, which were designed to fortify the Gar-

riſon againſt any Attempts of the Troops of the Queen of Hungary, which were marching that Way. The Detachment was ſtopped half a Day before it could paſs the Danube by a Bridge of Boats in the Neighbourhood, which wanted to be repaired. Nevertheleſs they would have permitted a Paſſage by ſmall Diviſions for the Horſes, Baggages and their Eſcorts. Egra and Amberg remained cloſely blockaded.

*Carlton-Houſe, Feb. 27.*
