Brussels, March 12. We hear that the Austrian Troops in the Upper Palatinate have had several Rencounters with their Enemies, in which they have always had the Advantage. Upon the 25th of February a large Detachment of Imperial, French and Palatine Troops was fent from the Quarters they were cantoned in along the Left Side of the Danube, towards a Place called Schmidt Muhlen, in order, as is supposed, to raise the Blockade of Amberg; so that it is imagined that by this Time there may have been some Action of Consequence there.
