*Petersbourg, February 8.*

**O**N the 4th Instant, arrived here from Berlin Lieutenant Colonel Grabe, dispatched by his Prussian Majesty with the Order of the Black Eagle, to be presented to the Empress: On Sunday her Imperial Majesty went to her Palace at Sarskoy Miz, about 30 Werst from hence, and is expected to return To-morrow.

*Neubourg in the Wood, Feb. 15.* Prince Lobkowitz having found that the General Officers and their Retinue could not be conveniently lodged at Pfreimt, at which Place he had at first designed to establish his Head Quarters, has now taken the Resolution to remain here as long as the present Cantonment lasts. In the mean while, at a Place called Fiechtelberg, situated between Weyden and Neustadt, and abandoned by the Enemy, a Foundery has been discovered, where several Cannons, Bombs, Balls, Arms, and such like Military Stores, have been found, and an Engineer is sent thither to make an Inventory of the Whole. Sixty three French Prisoners passed by here To-day in their Way to Amberg, to be there exchanged for some of ours.

*Florence, Feb. 23, N. S.* Letters from Bologna of the 19th assure, that the Austrian General Novati has demanded of that City 200 Waggon's of Hay, and the like Number of Wood, threatening to come and take them away by Force, if they delay sending them. The Regency has thereupon sent the Senator Angelitti to make Remonstrances to Count Traun. The Spanish Army does not consist in all at present of above 8000 Men: M. de Gages has sent Part of the Cavalry to Castel St. Pietro and to Imola, and according to all Appearances, he will soon, with the rest of the Troops, take the Route of the Romagna. In the Action on the other Side of the Panaro, the Spaniards had 3057 killed, about 2000 private Men wounded, 227 Officers killed or wounded, 223 Officers taken Prisoners, with 800 private Men. The Austrians 1237 killed, about 400 wounded, 222 private Men, 6 Officers, and the Generals Payersberg and Ciceri taken Prisoners. The Electress Dowager Palatin has been interred with great Pomp in the Tomb of her Ancestors. She

has declared, by her Will, the Grand Duke her sole Heir, and four Florentine Senators her Executors. She has bequeathed a great many Legacies, and Part of her Jewels to different Princes, and private Persons, and 30000 Crowns to the nearest Relation of the House of Medicis, to found a perpetual Primogeniture jointly with the Capital assign'd for the present to pay her Domesticks their Wages during Life. It is said, that besides the Capitals and Jewels specified in the Will, there has been found a Million of Gold, whereof the Marquis Rinuccini and the Secretary Guidacei have given Notice to the Regency, it being the Treasure of the House of Medicis, which the Grand Duke Don Gaston would never touch, having consign'd the Keys thereof to his Sister before his Death, as he received them from his Father, without ever having the Curiosity, during his Reign, to look into it.

*Brussels, March 12.* We hear that the Austrian Troops in the Upper Palatinate have had several Rencontres with their Enemies, in which they have always had the Advantage. Upon the 25th of February a large Detachment of Imperial, French and Palatine Troops was sent from the Quarters they were cantoned in along the Left Side of the Danube, towards a Place called Schmidt Muhlen, in order, as is supposed, to raise the Blockade of Amberg; so that it is imagined that by this Time there may have been some Action of Consequence there.

*Lierre in Brabant, March 7.* The Baron de Blisia, Commissary General to the Bishop of Liege, arrived here three Days ago to compliment General Pont-Pietin, and settle the Route for the March of Six Battalions of his Britannick Majesty's Hanoverian Forces, who will be soon in full March through the Principality of Liege, and will cross the Maeze at Roermunde.

*Liege, March 8, N. S.* Yesterday the seventh Division of the English Troops, commanded by the Earl of Rothes, consisting of Lord Cadogan's Dragoons, with Brigadier Onflow and Brigadier Cornwallis's Regiments of Foot, marched from Tongres, and passed the Maeze at Maefricht, in their Way to the Duchy of Juliers; and this Day the eighth Division, consisting of the Queen's Regiment of Dragoons, the Scotch Fusileers and Brigadier Husk's Regiment

ment of Foot, commanded by General Cope, arrived at Tongres from St. Tron, and will pursue their March through Maestricht Tomorrow.

Paris, March 13. The Government of the Town and Citadel of Strasboug, and the Direction of the Fortifications of France, being become vacant by the Death of the Marshal d'Asfeldt, the former is given to M. de Broglio, the other is divided between the Secretaries of State, of War and of the Marine. M. de Maurepas has the Direction of the Sea Ports, and M. Dargenson that of the Inland Towns.

General Post Office, London, July 3, 1742.

Whereas divers Persons, thro' Ignorance or Carelessness, frequently put Letters into the General Post Offices, and the Receiving Houses both in Town and Country, directed on board of Ships, and to Foreign Parts, without paying at the same Time the Postage, as ought to be done; And whereas Letters and Packets are often put into the said Offices with Money and Rings inclosed, and in Fraud of his Majesty's Revenue, divers Persons presume to send Letters with false and counterfeit Franks. This is to acquaint the Publick, that no Letters under any of the Circumstances aforesaid have any Right by Law to be forwarded.

Note, That Letters going out of Great Britain (except to France, Holland, and Flanders) have by the ancient Usage of this Office paid the Foreign Postage, and are required by the Act of Parliament so to do, at the Office in Great Britain where the same are first put in.

Note also, That if such Letters to Foreign Parts are put into any of the Country Offices, the Inland Postage of such Letters to London must also be paid on putting the same into such Office.
