*Petersbourg, February 12.*

**O**N Thursday last the Birth-day of his Imperial Highness was celebrated with great Magnificence. After hearing Divine Service, and receiving the Compliments of a very numerous and splendid Court, the Empress and the Great Duke dined in Publick on the Throne; the Ladies and Gentlemen of the Court, the Officers of the Guards, and the Bishops, had the Honour to dine at other Tables in the same Room. During Dinner was a grand Concert of Vocal and Instrumental Musick; and in the Evening there was a Ball at Court, and Illuminations throughout the City. Her Imperial Majesty conferred the Order of St Alexander upon General Nartoff and Lieutenant General Brill; and his Imperial Highness created the following Knights of the Order of St. Anne, viz. the Prince of Anhalt Zerbst, the Major Generals, Brown, Stuart, Wiakoff, Hemff, Lapokin, and M. Kbrff the Russian Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Denmark. The same Day Baron Mardefeldt, the Prussian Minister Plenipotentiary, appeared in the Order of the Black Eagle, which his Prussian Majesty lately conferred upon him, when he sent the same Order as a Present to the Empress. The Vice-Chancellor Count Bestoucheff gave a grand Entertainment to the Foreign Ministers, and several other Persons of Distinction.

*Neubourg in the Wood, Feb. 19, N. S.* General Forgatsch having advanced to Schmidtnichl with the Regiment of Lubomirsky Cuirassiers, he seized upon that Post the 15th, and took Prisoners there, one Serjeant, two Corporals, and 53 French Dragoons of the Queen's Regiment, who were brought hither Yesterday. He then put the said Regiment into that Place and Riedt, which the Enemy abandon'd, and thereby all Communication is now cut off between the French Posts of Langensfeldt and Amberg, and we doubt not but they must soon relinquish one or the other. In the mean while we hear, that the Distempers amongst the French still continue, whereas our Army enjoys perfect Health.

*Neubourg in the Wood, Feb. 22, N. S.* Since our last the Enemy has made some Motions on the other Side of the Naab, having reinforced their Posts from Statamhof and Burglengensfeldt to Amberg. Whereupon Prince Lobkowitz has drawn some Regiments of Infantry and Cavalry closer together, in order to secure our Stations near Schwandorff, and the adjacent Parts. Our Hussars have brought in more Prisoners, and amongst them two Serjeants. We have every Day Deserters from the Enemy, and the most Part of them from the Bavarian Regiment of Truchses, who take on in our Corps. We have nothing remarkable concerning Egra, but an Account of the great Scarcity of Wood, which has obliged the Garrison to burn the Roofs of all the Houses in the Suburbs, and the Sickness

still reigning there, which has left, as we hear, but 600 Men in a Condition to do Duty.

*Rome, Feb. 23.* On the 20th the Abbe Franchini, and Count Spada, Ministers from the Great Duke of Tuscany, received a Courier from Florence, with Notice of the Decease of the Electress Dowager Palatine; in Consequence of which these Ministers took formal Possession, for his Royal Highness, of the Palaces, Villas, and all the Effects belonging to her Highness, and dispatched a Courier to Naples, to take Possession of her Estate in that Kingdom. Yesterday died Cardinal Belluga, making a Vacancy of a 23d Hat in the College of Cardinals.

*Florence, Feb. 26.* On the 23d in the Evening, the Corpse of the late Electress Dowager Palatine, after having laid in State at the Palace three Days, was conducted with great Formality to the Chapel of St. Lawrence in an open Coach and Six, with a Canopy over it; it was proceeded by all the Orders of Priests and Canons with Torches, and attended by the Gentlemen of her Court, and most of the Nobility, on Foot; her Ladies followed in three other Coaches and Six. It was also attended by Detachments of the Lorrain Regiment of Foot Guards, the Swiss Guards, the Light Horse, and the Great Duke's Life Guard. The Archbishop of Florence performed the Funeral Service, assisted by three other Bishops of the State; the Regency in a Body, the Senate, Magistrates, and many other Persons of Distinction, attended at the Function in the Chapel; during which, and the Procession, the Minute Cannon was fired from the Fortresses. By the last Accounts from Lombardy we are informed, that the Sardinian Troops have moved from the Borders of the Panaro to their former Quarters of Casal Maggiore, Colorno, Parma, &c. The Austrians were moving towards Ferrara. The Spaniards have removed their Hospitals and Baggage to Imola. The Government of Bologna in the last Week reinforced the Guards at the Gates of that City, on Apprehension of a Surprise, on Notice, that a large Detachment of Hussars and Austrian Troops had crossed the Panaro. On the 25th at Night a Courier from Portugal to Rome passed by this City; and on the 26th M. de Braitwitz received another from the Austrian Camp in Lombardy, to acquaint this Government, that M. de Gages, after having moved his Hospitals and Baggage to Imola and Faenza, had followed them with the rest of his Army; and that it was conjectured he designed to proceed to Rimini.

*Liege, March 12, N. S.* The eighth Division of his Britannick Majesty's Troops, consisting of the Queen's Regiment of Dragoons, the Scotch Fusileers, and Brigadier Huske's Regiment of Foot, commanded by Major General Cope, marched the 9th instant from Tongres to the Plain of Maestricht; and were succeeded on the 10th by the ninth and last Division, consisting of Bligh's, Johnson's and Ponsby's Regiments

Regiments of Foot, commanded by Brigadier Ponsonby, who passed the Maeze Yesterday, and will halt this Day in the Plain of Maestricht, from whence they will advance To-morrow into the Neighbourhood of Aix la Chapelle, where they are to remain till farther Orders. The English Train of Artillery is lodged for the present in the Arsenal at Maestricht, where Colonel Pattison remains with two Companies of Grenadiers. The Bishop and States of Liege have deputed Baron Gelves, one of the Deputies of the Nobility, to compliment the Earl of Stair, and make certain Propositions to his Excellency; and that Gentleman, after having conferred with Mr. Burrish, his Britannick Majesty's Secretary at this Court, set out for Aix la Chapelle the 11th Instant, together with M. Blisia our Commissary General.

*Liege, March 15, N. S.* Baron Gelves and M. de Blisia, who were sent by his Highness the Bishop and Prince of Liege to compliment and make certain Propositions to my Lord Stair, are returned hither from Aix la Chapelle, very well satisfied with their Success, and the polite Reception they met with from his Excellency. We expect that General Pontpétin, with six Battalions of his Britannick Majesty's Hanoverian Troops, will begin their March from Lierre in Brabant on the 19th Instant, and pass through this Principality to Roermunde, where they will cross the Maeze, and enter into the Territory of Juliers.

*Aix la Chapelle, March 12, N. S.* The Elector of Cologne has sent Major General Baron de Wenghen to compliment his Excellency my Lord Stair, upon his Arrival here, and to make some Propositions relative to the Quartering his Majesty's Hanoverian Forces in his Electorate; upon which Brigadier Bland, Quarter Master General of the Army, set out from hence this Afternoon for Bonne, in Company with Baron Wenghen, to compliment his Electoral Highness on the Part of the Earl of Stair, and to regulate what shall be necessary for the Reception of those Troops.

*Hague, March 19, N. S.* Baron Mardenfeld, one of the chief Officers of the Household to the Great Duke of Russia, is arrived here from Petersbourg in his Way to London. Sir Everard Fawkener is also expected here every Day from Dresden. Some of the Deputies of Gueldre are preparing to set out for Nimmeguen the latter End of this Week, in order to assist at the Assembly of the States of that Province there, which is to be held the 26th of this Month. The States of Holland will open their ordinary Assembly To-morrow, and on Thursday next will fill up the Civil and Military Employments that are vacant in their Department. The solemn Deputation which was sent on the Part of Zealand for the Election of a Greffier for the High Council of Justice, is arrived here. The Province of Friseland has sent to the States General their Consent to assist the Queen of Hungary with 20,000 Men, with this Restriction nevertheless, that the Foreign Generals, appointed by the Promotion of the 19th of September last, shall not be employed in the Command of this Body of Troops. We flatter ourselves that the States of Zealand, as well as those of Overysse, will shortly send their Consent to the said Succour. The Marquis de Fogliani, Minister from the King of the Two Sicilies to the States General, is expected to set out To-morrow Morning for England.

*Minorca, January 28, N. S.* James Read, of Bristol, Captain of the Ship called the Sea Horse, appeared in the Court of Vice Admiralty in this Island, and being duly sworn by Don Gabriel Olivar, Judge Deputy of the said Court, made the following Declaration.

That upon the first Day of this Instant January, O. S. the Declarant being at that Time on board the said Ship in the Straights of Gibraltar, at Eight in the Morning a Bark made up to him, which the Declarant judged to belong to Spain; and the Declarant having made every Thing ready to fight them, notwithstanding that his Ship's Company consisted only of Three Men and Four Boys, the Bark coming soon afterwards close up with him, four of their Men jumped on board the Declarant's Ship, of whom they killed two, and wounded a Third in the Arm; and although the rest of the Spanish Sailors on board of the said Bark did every Thing that was in their Power to take the said Ship, keeping a constant Fire upon her, yet their Attempt was rendered fruitless by the obstinate Resistance made by the Declarant and his Ship's Company, who killed and wounded several of the Spaniards in such Manner, that if there had been a favourable Gale of Wind, they would have taken the Bark.

*Whitehall, March 12.*

The King has been pleased to grant to the Reverend John Heylyn, Doctor in Divinity, and one of His Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, the Place and Dignity of a Prebendary of the Collegiate Church of St. Peter Westminster, void by the Promotion of Dr. Edward Willes to the Bishoprick of St. Davids.
