Westminster, March 22.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, his Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for repealing certain Duties on spirituous Liquors, and on Licenses for retailing the same, and for laying other Duties on spirituous Liquors, and on Licenses to retail the said Liquors.

An Act for repealing the several Rates and Duties upon Victuallers and Retailers of Beer and Ale within the Cities of London and Westminster, and the Weekly Bills of Mortality, and for transferring the Exchequer Bills unsatisfied thereupon, to the Duties for Licenses to sell spirituous Liquors and strong Waters by Retail; and also for enabling his Majesty to raise a certain Sum of Money for the Service of the Year 1743, to be further charged on the said Duties for Licenses.

An Act for raising by Annuities and a Lottery, in Manner therein mentioned, the Sum of 1,800,000 l. at 3 per Cent. per Annum, for the Service of the Year 1743.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for Relief of Insolvent Debtors.

An Act for the more easy and effectual Conviction of Offenders found at large within the Kingdom of Great Britain, after they have been ordered for Transportation.

An Act to empower Justices of the Peace to act in certain Cases, relating to Parishes and Places to the Rates and Taxes of which they are rated or chargeable.

An Act to explain and amend the Laws touching the Elections of Members to serve for the Commons in Parliament, for that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to restrain the Partiality and regulate the Conduct of Returning Officers at such Elections.

An Act for Repairing the High Road from Boroughbridge in the County of York, to Catherick in the same County, and from thence to Piers Bridge on the River Tees.

An Act for Repairing the Road from Bowes in the County of York, to Brough under Stainmore in the County of Westmorland.

An Act for Enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for Repairing the several Roads leading from the Town of Warminster in the County of Wilts.

An Act for Enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, intituled an Act for the more effectual Repairing the Roads leading from Wadehill in the County of Hertford, to Barley and Royston in the said County.

An Act for Repairing the Road leading from Marlborough through West Kennet, to Shepherd's Shord, and from the Hare and Hounds in Berkhampton to the Top of Cheril Hill, and from the Town of Avebury to the cross Way at Berkhampton, in the County of Wilts.

An Act for continuing and making more effectual an Act passed in the Ninth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, for Repairing the Highways from the City of Gloucester to the Top of Birdlip Hill, being the Road to London; and from the Foot of the said Hill to the Top of Crickley Hill, being the Road to Oxford.

An Act for Repairing the Road leading from the Town of Cirencester, in the County of Gloucester, to a Place called the Monument upon Landsdown in the same County.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the First Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, for the more effectual Amending the Highways between Hockliffe and Woburn in the County of Bedford, and for Repairing the Road leading through Wobourn to Tickford Bridge in Newport Pagnel, in the County of Bucks.

An Act to explain and amend an Act passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, for repairing the Road from the Dun Cow in Dunchurch, to Hill Morton in the County

of Warwick, and from thence to St. James's End in the Town of Northampton.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the Tenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, An Act for Repairing and Amending the Highways from the North Part of Harlow Bush Common, in the Parish of Harlow, to Woodford in the County of Essex.

An Act for continuing an Act made in the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled an Act for Amending and Repairing the Roads from Luton in the County of Bedford, to Westwood Gate in the said County, and for Repairing the Roads from Luton to Saint Albans in the County of Hertford.

An Act to enable the Parishioners of the Parish of St. Botolph without Aldgate, in the City of London, to raise a certain Sum of Money for Payment of Debts already contracted for the Relief and Maintenance of the Poor of the said Parish.

An Act to enable the present and future Proprietors and Inhabitants of the Houses in Charter-house Square in the County of Middlesex, to make a Rate for Raising Money effectually to inclose, pave, watch, clean and improve the said Square, and to continue the same in Repair.

And to Twenty Seven Private Bills.

Naples, February 26. Within a few Days past, upon the Arrival of several Spanish Officers from M. de Gages, to acquaint the Court of the Impossibility of the Spanish Army's undertaking any Operations, since it had so much suffered in the Action of Campo Santo, great Motions are observed amongst the Ministers, and Expresses have been sent to several Provinces of the Kingdom. On the 20th a Shock of an Earthquake was felt in this City, which much terrified the People, though it occasioned no Damage.

Rome, March 2. Some few Days ago Cardinal Corsini presented to the Pope the Will of the late Electress Dowager Palatine, the last of the Medicis Family, which had been delivered by her Highness to his Eminence in October last, when at Florence, in order that it should be assigned to the Pope at her Decease. On the 1st Instant a Courier arrived here from Portugal, with the Nomination from that Court of several vacant Bishopricks in that Kingdom, to be published in the first Consistory. The Cardinals Petra and Pico are dangerously ill.

Rome, March 9, N. S. The Pope is greatly perplexed on the Prospect of the new Burthen, which the Spanish Army's Return into the Romagna will occasion to the Ecclesiastical State. The Cities of Imola and Faenza have applied to the Pope for Instructions and necessary Provisions for that Purpose; as have the Legates of Bologna and Ferrara, on the Request made to them by M. de Traun, to provide for the Reception of a Detachment of 4000 Austrians. On the 4th Cardinal Colonna died suddenly of an Apopleckick Fit, which makes a 24th Vacancy of Cardinals Hats. On the 6th and 7th Instant two Couriers from M. de Gages passed through this City, in their Way to Naples, to

notify the Arrival at Mantua of the First Column of the Austrian Succours from Germany.

Naples, March 5. The Court is in Mourning for the Elector Palatine, which will last six Weeks, and be continued afterwards, the same Time, for the Electress Dowager Palatine of Florence. Their Sicilian Majesties are in perfect Health, and it is expected that the Queen will be brought to Bed by the End of next Month.

Florence, March 5. The last Post from Lombardy brings nothing Material; the Spaniards remain at Bologna, and the Austrians in their former Posts on the other Side of the Panaro. A Body of about 3000 of the latter, it is said, are entred into the Ferrarese, and Magazines are making at Stellata. Many Deserters, mostly French, to the Number of about thirty a Day, arrive here from the Spanish Army in the Bolognese, on their Way to France by way of Leghorn, in Consequence of the Indulto lately published by the French King, with regard to them. On the 28th past a Party of 200 Soldiers, out of Pandolfini's Regiment of Militia, were sent from hence to the Fortrels of St. Martino.

Florence, March 12. Abbé Vernaccini, who ever since Pere Alcanio's Death has acted as Agent for the Courts of Spain and Naples, on the 2d Instant presented a Memorial to Prince Craon, by Order of the Court of Naples, relating to the Allodials of the House of Medicis, which, it is pretended, on the Death of the Electress, devolves to the Queen of Spain. M. Vernaccini's having presented this Memorial, has given great Offence, as he is a Subject of the Great Duke, and has never presented any Letters of Credence, either from the Court of Spain or Naples, and it was therefore sent back to him again on the 10th. We have no News from the Spaniards, except that Part of the Sick and Baggage was arrived at Pesaro, by which it is generally believed M. de Gages will follow. M. de Traun will soon have his Reinforcement; the Regiment of Marulli's Dragoons is arrived in the Mantuan, with two Battalions of Foot. The Letters, which are this Instant come in from Leghorn, bring an Account, that the Spaniards belonging to the St. Isidore, a Ship of War of that Nation at Ajaccio in Corsica, had themselves set Fire to her, on the Appearance of some English Men of War, which were sent to destroy that Ship.

Ratisbon, March 1, N. S. The French Recruits which pass near this City in considerable Numbers are extremely sickly, and each Division is followed by Six or Seven Waggons to carry those who are not able to march. The French who lie at Stadt-am-Hoff, intend, it is said, to throw a Bridge across the River Regen, to keep an open Communication with the Bridge which they have upon the Danube at Weix. They have also thrown another Bridge of Rafter across the Danube at Donaustauff, which is but one League from Ratisbon.

Dantzick, March 16. The King of Prussia's Resident at Warsaw has lately renewed a Claim, made in the Year 1732, of about 500,000 l. Sterling Value, Capital and Interest, due to his Majesty on the Newburg Estates in Poland, now

In the Possession of the Family of Radzewil, and contiguous to his Prussian Majesty's Dominions in Lithuania. Yesterday arrived a Russian Frigate in our Road, who speaks, with all Ships that come in, and proposes to hinder the Swedes being supplied with Provisions from hence.

Aix la Chapelle, March 21. The Duke of Arembergh arrived here last Night, and after conferring with his Excellency the Earl of Stair, set out again this Day for the Castle of Gelstorff, belonging to Count Halberg Chancellor to the Elector Palatin, where his Excellency has at present fix'd his Head Quarters.

Liege, March 26. The Brunchs have sent two or three Officers of their Hussars to raise Recruits in this Town, and take Boys of 12 or 13 Years old.

Hague, March 29. The States of Holland continue their Assembly, and are deliberating again upon a Tax to be laid upon the Inhabitants of the Province, for the Support of the extraordinary Expences of this Year. Some of the Deputies of Overysseil are set out for that Province to assist at the Assembly of the States which is to be held next Week. It is believed that some Resolution will be taken in favour of the Succours in Troops to be sent to the Queen of Hungary. By Advice from the Province of Gueldre, the Consent of those States towards the said Succours is not despair'd of. Major General Rautencrantz has frequent Conferences with the Deputies of the States upon the Subject of two Regiments of Infantry and one of Dragoons to be taken into the Pay of the Republick; but as the Duke of Saxe Gothal his Master insists upon some Limitations as to the Service of the said Troops, that will not easily be admitted here, it is feared the Conferences will end very soon without Success.

Magne, March 29. The Squadron of seven small Ships, destined for the Protection of the Dutch Trade in the Baltick, under the Command of Captain Lyttelger, has Orders to sail by the 20th of next Month.

This Day the Marquis Fogliani, Minister from the King of the Two Sicilies, had his first private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

And afterwards a private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, to both which he was introduc'd by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, March 21.

This Day the Baron de Mardefeld, Minister from the Duke Administrator of Holstein Gottorp, had his first private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his Letters of Credence; to which he was introduced by the Right Hon. the Lord Carteret, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.
