After which his Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Zeal, Prudence, and Dispatch, with which you have carried on the Publick Bufinefs, during the Course of this Seffion, give me the greatest Satisfaction.

That this Nation, and the Common Caufe, may reap the most beneficial Fruits of your vigorous Refolutions, I have, at the Requisition of the Queen of Hungary, ordered my Army, in Conjunction with the Auftrian Troops, to pass the Rhine, as Auxiliaries to her Hungarian Majesty, and for her Support and Assistance; and to oppofe any dangerous Meafures, that might affect the Balance and Liberties of Europe, or hinder the Re-establishment of the publick Tranquility, upon just and folid Foundations. I have continued a ftrong Squadron in the Mediterranean, and another in the West Indies, in order to carry on the great Work of diftreffing our Ehemies, the Spaniards, and reducing them to fafe and honourable Terms of Peace; as well as of maintaining the Rights of Navigation and Commerce belonging to my Subjects : And from the former of thefe Squadrons, my Allies in Italy have found, and ftill continue to receive, a moff uleful and advantageous Support.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you my Thanks for the ample Supplies, which you have granted for the Service of the current Year, and which, you may be af-fured, fhall be applied to those great Ends for which they were given.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have a firm Confidence in your good Affections; and it is the fix'd Purpose of my Heart to promote the true Interest and Happiness of my In Return for this, I expect, on Kingdoms. your Part, that you will exert your best Endeavours, in your respective Stations, to render my Government easy, and to preferve the Peace and Quiet of the Nation.

Prince Lobcowitz is fupposed to have 15,000 Men, and Marshal Brog-lio as many. The Queen sets out for Prague the 25th Inftant:

Mentz, April 21. On the 18th the French began to pais the Rhine at Fort Louis, and marched towards Bruchfal : They were fuppofed to be about 16,000 ftrong:

Mentz, April 23. Yesterday the Election came on here for the Filling up the Vacancy of this Archbishoprick and Electorate! At Seven in the Evening all the Troops of the Garrison were drawn up in the Avenues from the Palace to the Cathedral, called the Dome, where the Chapter affembled about Ten, and unanimoufly conferred on Count Oftein their High Trea-The exfurer, the Dignities above-mentioned. ceffive bad Weather of the Day very much interrupted the Order and Magnificence of the ufual Procession on this Occasion; the only regular Ceremony without Doors, was that of the Ringauers. These People are Subjects of this Electorate, but have fome very particular and great Privileges; among the reft, on the Demile of an Elector, they take Possession of the Palace, and have a Right to retain it as long as the Vacancy lasts; but as that has generally been a great while, and the attendant Expences to them heavy, they only keep Guard there two or three Days before the Election : When the new chosen Elector comes near, they shut up the Gates of the Court Yard, and their two chief Officers, called the Burgrave and Vice-dome, go up to the State Coach with the Charter of their Privileges in their Hands; at the fame time they tender an Oath to him, that he shall religiously observe their faid Charter and Privileges, which were granted to them at a Time when two Electors were chofen by a Division in the Chapter; one of which being foon after drove out of the Refidence; found Refuge with these Ringauers, and the Death of the other happening in a fhort Time; was by them reftored to and confirmed in his Dignity.

Neuwied, April 24, N. B. His Excellency the Earl of Stair having pais'd by Bonn in his Way hither, was most graciously received there by the Elector of Cologne, and arrived at this Place Yesterday in perfect Health, notwithstanding the bad Weather and Roads. Marshal Neipperg is already here, and the Duke d'Arem-

berg is expected every Hour. Hambourg, April 26, N. S. Letters from Ratisbon of the 18th Instant, N. S. advile, that ήQ

no doubt was made but that the Body of Troops which the Marshal de Broglio had affeinbled near Amberg, (where this General has his Quarters) the Command of which he has giyen to the Marquis de Chaila, is defigned to be thrown into Egra; that the Troops would arrive there as the 20th Instant, N. S. unlefs the Austrians should be able to retard their March. The Bishop of Lubeck is still in this Town, and will remain here some few Days. Upon the Receipt of the last Dispatches from the Swedish Plenipotentiaries at Abo, a Messen ger was immediately sent away to the Marshal of the Diet to bring him to Town, his Excellency not having been in Stockholm when they auived there.

Liege, April 26, N.S. The first Division of the English Horie which remained in Brabant is soon expected upon the Frontier of this State, in its Way to the Rhine. That Body of Cavalry, confiding of eleven Squadrons, will march in four Divisions, of which the first, confisting of the blue Regiment of Guards, will be commanded by Lieut. Gene.al Honeywood.

Brussel, April 27. All the Buitish Horse are ordered to march for the Army on Tuesday hext the 30th Instant.

Hague, April 30, N. S. The States of Holland, which feparated Saturday laft, are to meet again on Wednefday the 15th of May next. The Town of Groningue has given her Confent to the Proposition of Holland for the March of the 20,000 Men; and it is hoped the Members of the Omme Landen, which make out Part of that Province, will also be brought to give their Affent to that Measure. In the mean Time Zealand has not yet given any Answer upon the faid Proposition; but, it is reported, that Province will foon do it: According to the Letters, which arrived this Morning from Flanders, the Hessian Troops were to march towards the Rhine on the 9th or 10th of next Month.
