Westminster, April 21.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, his Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting to his Majesty the Sum of One Million out of the Sinking Fund; and for applying a further Sum, therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and forty three; and for the further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act for continuing several Laws relating to the Allowance upon the Exportation of British made Gunpowder, to the Importation of Naval Stores from the British Colonies in America, to the additional Number of One hundred Hackney-Chairs, and to the Powers given for regulating Hackney Coaches and Chairs; for punishing the Venders of unstamped News-Papers; for allowing the Importation of Hemp or Flax manufactured in Ireland, though not sworn to be of the Growth of Ireland; and for the Relief of Bryan Blundel, in respect to the Duty on some white Salt lost in a Storm at Sea.

An Act for rectifying Mistakes in the Names of the Commissioners for the Land-Tax, for the Year One thousand seven hundred and forty-two; and for the appointing other Persons, together with those named for the said Year, to put in

Execution in Act of this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for granting an Aid to his Majesty by a Land Tax to be raised in Great-Britain for the Service of the Year One Thousand seven hundred and forty-three.

An Act to indemnify Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for that Purpose; and also for amending so much of an Act made in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of King Charles the Second, intituled, An Act for preventing Dangers which may happen from Popish Recujants, as relates to the Time for receiving the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, now limited by the said Act.

An Act for allowing further Time for Inrollment of Deeds and Wills made by Papists, and for Relief of Protestant Purchasers, Devisees, and Lessees.

An Act for the further Punishment of Persons, who shall aid or assist Prisoners to attempt to escape out of lawful Custody.

An Act for allowing Carts to be drawn with four Horses.

An Act to continue an Act made in the fifth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, intituled, An Act to prevent the committing of Frauds by Bankrupts.

An Act to make the Hamlet of Bethnel Green, in the Parish of St. Dunstan, Stepney, in the County of Middlesex, a separate and distinct Parish; and for erecting a Parish Church therein.

And to three private Bills.

After which his Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Zeal, Prudence, and Dispatch, with which you have carried on the Publick Business, during the Course of this Session, give me the greatest Satisfaction.

That this Nation, and the Common Cause, may reap the most beneficial Fruits of your vigorous Resolutions, I have, at the Requisition of the Queen of Hungary, ordered my Army, in Conjunction with the Austrian Troops, to pass the Rhine, as Auxiliaries to her Hungarian Majesty, and for her Support and Assistance; and to oppose any dangerous Measures, that might affect the Balance and Liberties of Europe, or hinder the Re-establishment of the publick Tranquility, upon just and solid Foundations. I have continued a strong Squadron in the Mediterranean, and another in the West Indies, in order to carry on the great Work of distressing our Eemies, the Spaniards, and reducing them to safe and honourable Terms of Peace; as well as of maintaining the Rights of Navigation and Commerce belonging to my Subjects: And from the former of these Squadrons, my Allies in Italy have found, and still continue to receive, a most useful and advantageous Support.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you my Thanks for the ample Supplies, which you have granted for the Service of the current Year, and which, you may be assured, shall be applied to those great Ends for which they were given.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have a firm Confidence in your good Affections; and it is the fix'd Purpose of my Heart to promote the true Interest and Happiness of my Kingdoms. In Return for this, I expect, on your Part, that you will exert your best Endeavours, in your respective Stations, to render my Government easy, and to preserve the Peace and Quiet of the Nation.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by his Majesty's Command, said,

My Lords and Gentlemen,

IT is his Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Tuesday the Seventh Day of June next, to be then here held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuesday the Seventh Day of June next.

Stockholm, April 8, O. S. Lieut. Sheffer, who, together with another Express went to Abo, with the last Instructions sent to the Swedish Plenipotentiaries, returned hither on Monday Evening last.

Vienna, April 17, N. S. We reckon that Prince Charles is by this Time arrived at the Army in the Upper Palatinate, from whence we are every Minute expecting the Account of an Action about Weyden, where Prince Lobcowitz was waiting for the coming up of the Detachment marching under the Command of Marshal Broglio to the Relief of Egra, in order to give them Battle. Prince Lobcowitz is supposed to have 15,000 Men, and Marshal Broglio as many. The Queen sets out for Prague the 25th Instant.

Mentz, April 21. On the 18th the French began to pass the Rhine at Fort Louis, and marched towards Bruchsal: They were supposed to be about 16,000 strong.

Mentz, April 23. Yesterday the Election came on here for the Filling up the Vacancy of this Archbishoprick and Electorate! At Seven in the Evening all the Troops of the Garrison were drawn up in the Avenues from the Palace to the Cathedral, called the Dome, where the Chapter assembled about Ten, and unanimously conferred on Count Ostein their High Treasurer, the Dignities above-mentioned. The excessive bad Weather of the Day very much interrupted the Order and Magnificence of the usual Procession on this Occasion; the only regular Ceremony without Doors, was that of the Ringauers. These People are Subjects of this Electorate, but have some very particular and great Privileges; among the rest, on the Demise of an Elector, they take Possession of the Palace, and have a Right to retain it as long as the Vacancy lasts; but as that has generally been a great while, and the attendant Expences to them heavy, they only keep Guard there two or three Days before the Election: When the new chosen Elector comes near, they shut up the Gates of the Court Yard, and their two chief Officers, called the Burgrave and Vice-dome, go up to the State Coach with the Charter of their Privileges in their Hands; at the same time they tender an Oath to him, that he shall religiously observe their said Charter and Privileges, which were granted to them at a Time when two Electors were chosen by a Division in the Chapter; one of which being soon after drove out of the Residence, found Refuge with these Ringauers, and the Death of the other happening in a short Time, was by them restored to and confirmed in his Dignity.

Neuwied, April 24, N. S. His Excellency the Earl of Stair having pass'd by Bonn in his Way hither, was most graciously received there by the Elector of Cologne, and arrived at this Place Yesterday in perfect Health, notwithstanding the bad Weather and Roads. Marshal Neipperg is already here, and the Duke d'Artemberg is expected every Hour.

Hambourg, April 26, N. S. Letters from Ratisbon of the 18th Instant, N. S. advise, that

no doubt was made, but that the Body of Troops which the Marshal de Broglie had assembled near Amberg, (where this General has his Quarters) the Command of which he has given to the Marquis de Chaila, is designed to be thrown into Egra; that the Troops would arrive there as the 20th Instant, N. S. unless the Austrians should be able to retard their March. The Bishop of Lubeck is still in this Town, and will remain here some few Days. Upon the Receipt of the last Dispatches from the Swedish Plenipotentiaries at Abo, a Messenger was immediately sent away to the Marshal of the Diet to bring him to Town, his Excellency not having been in Stockholm when they arrived there.

Liege, April 26, N. S. The first Division of the English Horse which remained in Brabant is soon expected upon the Frontier of this State, in its Way to the Rhine. That Body of Cavalry, consisting of eleven Squadrons, will march in four Divisions, of which the first, consisting of the blue Regiment of Guards, will be commanded by Lieut. General Honeywood.

Brussels, April 27. All the British Horse are ordered to march for the Army on Tuesday next the 30th Instant.

Hague, April 30, N. S. The States of Holland, which separated Saturday last, are to meet again on Wednesday the 15th of May next. The Town of Groningue has given her Consent to the Proposition of Holland for the March of the 20,000 Men; and it is hoped the Members of the *Omme Landen*, which make but Part of that Province, will also be brought to give their Assent to that Measure. In the mean Time Zealand has not yet given any Answer upon the said Proposition; but, it is reported, that Province will soon do it: According to the Letters, which arrived this Morning from Flanders, the Hessian Troops were to march towards the Rhine on the 9th or 10th of next Month.
