Passau, April 12, N. S.

HIS Excellency Marshal Khévenhuller having been informed the 4th Instant, that the Enemy had seized the Castle of Griesbach, resolved to dislodge them. For this Purpose he detach'd Baron Bernclau from Scharding in the Night between the 6th and 7th, with seven Companies of Grenadiers, 800 Fuzileers, 400 Horse, and 3 or 400 Hussars, to the said Place, whither the Enemy were at the same Time sending a Body of Troops from Pfarkirchen, who marched towards Griesbach on the Left, whilst we were advancing on the Right. But our Detachment having been before-hand with them, the Hussars took Post upon an Eminence on the Left over-against the Castle, and the Foot advanced in the Valley on the Right. The Hussars, upon their Arrival, required the Besieged to surrender, which the Lieutenant who commanded, refused, till our Infantry coming up, he surrendered himself and Garrison Prisoners of War, and we immediately threw into the Place a Major, two Captains, four other Officers, and 300 Soldiers, with all things requisite for their Defence, after which our Troops returned to Scharding. Griesbach is a Castle well situate, and fortified on one Side with a large and deep Ditch, and on the other by a great Precipice, besides good Walls, and Galleries for the most Part Bomb-proof. It is ample enough to lodge a Garrison sufficient for defending it, so that it cannot be forced without heavy Artillery, and Mines in Case of Necessity. This Post is of so great Consequence, that it not only covers our Cavalry on the other Side of the Inn, but secures also our Troops at Villhoven, and exposes the Enemy's Quarters in the Neighbourhood, but chiefly at Pfarkirchen, Neideck, and Ebenfeldt, to the greatest Inconveniences, and they are accordingly now at those Places in the utmost Confusion and Fear.

Vienna, April 17, N. S. The Queen has given the Regiment of Foot vacant by the Death of General Walsegg, to the Lieutenant Feld-Marshal General Baron Bernclau, in Consideration of his thirty Years Services to the House of Austria, and particularly those he has performed in the Course of the present War.

Vienna, April 20, N. S. On Wednesday Morning, the 17th Instant, 26 Prussian Officers, lately arrived here from Berlin, were presented to the Queen by Felt-Marshal Count Dhona, the Prussian Minister, and are to set out very soon for her Majesty's Armies, where

they will serve in quality of Volunteers. Yesterday in the Afternoon the eldest Princess Royal, and Archduchess Mary-Ann, set out for Prague, with her Governess and other Ladies; and the Queen and the whole Court will set out on the 25th Instant for the same Place.

Heilbron, April 24. M. Gravel, the French Minister at Studgard, having required the Circle of Swabia to withdraw their Garrison out of Heilbron, in order to the French Army's taking Possession of that Post, in pursuance of the requisitorial Letters of the Emperor, the same was refused; and it was answered, that the Circle thought it necessary to keep that Place for their own Safety, and for maintaining the Neutrality. M. Gravel then replied, that the Prince de Dombes having a Mind to take up his Quarters there, he hoped no Difficulty would be made of granting that Request to a Person of his Quality. But the Answer he received thereto was, that it could not be allowed, since the Prince, as a great Lord, would have his Guard with him, which could not be admitted into the Town; though in Case he would come alone, and be satisfied with a Guard of the Troops of Swabia, there would be no Objection to it. The same Proposal was made to a Commissary of the Town of Heilbron, who had been sent to Spier upon Account of the French Troops that are marching to the Neckar; but he answered, that he had no Commission to explain himself thereupon, and that the Magistrate of the Town would leave the Care of it to the Circle of Swabia and to the Garrison. In the mean Time, Orders have been given for reinforcing the Garrison of the Town with two Companies, who are already got into the Place, under the Orders of Lieutenant-Colonel Sternfeld. The Regiment of Dragoons of the Circle of Swabia is to take Post in four of the nearest Towns and some Villages in the Country of Wirtemberg. Some Undertakers designed to have erected here a Magazine of Hay and Oats, but Waggons were not suffered to come into the Town. They are viewing the Magazines of the Circle here, that they may be filled up in Time.

Dantzick, April 24. A Russian Frigate has been for some Time in this Road, and pretended to make Seizure of all neutral Ships carrying Corn and Provisions to Sweden, but upon the Representations of Sir Cyril Wich, his Britannick Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Petersbourg, he has received for Answer from the Russian Ministers, that they don't understand any Goods to be Contraband except warlike

warlike Stores and Soldiers Cloathing, and that no Objection can be made against neutral Ships, particularly British, carrying Corn and Provisions to Sweden.

Falkenstein, April 25. This Day 4000 French, who were on the Side of Neustadt, marched to Landau and Spier; they are also making great Preparations for the Magazine, which they had there, to follow them. They have left off working at the Line at Neustadt, and not one Frenchman is to be seen any more there. Troops are marching every Day from Metz and Saar Louis towards the Rhine; and Yesterday 1800 Men came into the Country of Saarbrack and Zweybruck, in order to march to Spier.

Munich, April 26. Upon the 19th of this Month his Imperial Majesty arrived here in good Health, and the Day after arrived the Prince his Son.

Copenhagen, April 27. Their Danish Majesties, Yesterday after Dinner, made a sudden Excursion to Fridericksberg, where, 'tis believed, the Margrave arrived last Night, and that he will attend them to Town this Evening. The Troops here are daily exercised in order to their passing in Review; but no Preparations are yet making towards an Encampment.

Hamburg, April 30, N. S. We learn by the freshest Accounts from Stockholm, that the last Propositions of the Russian Ministers at Abo, not having been acceptable to Sweden, they had dispatched a Courier to Petersbourg, in order to their receiving more favourable Instructions. The Swedish Messenger Gramann waits at Abo the Return of this Russian Courier; where a Ship is likewise in Readiness to bring away the Swedish Plenipotentiaries, in Case Russia does not explain herself in a more favourable Manner. They are assembling a Body of 6 or 7000 Men upon the Island of Aland, to oppose the Entrance of the Russian Gallies between the Scheeren. The Bishop of Lubeck still continues here.

Liege, April 30, N. S. Our Commissary General, Baron Blisia, set out two Days ago for Roermunde, to settle the Route with the Hanoverian Commissaries, for the Remainder of the Hanoverian Troops, now upon their March from Brabant, who will pass thro' this Principality by Way of Hasselt, and cross the Maeze at Roermunde. The British Train of Artillery, which has lain for some Weeks past at Maestricht, will march on Friday the 3d of May towards the Rhine. The first Division of the British Horse, commanded by Lieutenant General Honeywood, will arrive this Night at Louvain, from whence they will prosecute their March To-morrow by Way of Tirlemont; and we have already ordered 95 Waggons to assemble at St. Tron on the 4th of May, to receive the Baggage of those Troops, who will march by Way of Tongres, and pass the Maeze at Maestricht.

Liege, May 3, N. S. Our Commissary General, Baron Blisia, returned last Night from Roermunde, after having settled the Route of his Britannick Majesty's Hanoverian Forces with General Pontpétin. And that Gentleman would

have set out for St. Torn this Morning, in order to have received Lieutenant General Honeywood, at the Head of the first Division of the English Horse, had not the March of those Troops been put off to the 9th Instant, by Reason of the Governor of Maestricht's having demanded Passage for a Part of his Garrison, who are to march incessantly by Way of Tongres to Mons and St. Gilain; and the Villages upon that Route, in which the Troops must Quarter, not being large enough to receive the English and Dutch at the same Time. The English Artillery will march To-morrow from Maestricht, join General Cope's Regiment on the 6th, and march forthwith to the Rhine, escorted by that Regiment, and other Troops of the last Division. We have just received Advice, that the Vanguard of the English Army is arrived, under the Command of Lieutenant General Ligonier, in the Neighbourhood of Francfort.

Brussels, May 4, N. S. On the 1st Instant the nine Troops of the Royal Blue marched out from hence. The rest of the Horse, viz. two Troops of Horse Guards, the Troop of Horse Granadiers, Lord Pembroke's and Ligonier's, are still here: All these were to have marched also, but have received twice a counter Order, each retarding their March for five Days; so that their Divisions will gradually go from the 12th Instant to the 15th, by reason the Quarters at Aix la-Chapelle and other Places could not be clear for them. General Honeywood went away the other Day with his Baggage. Bragg's Foot do Duty here at the Grand Guard.

Hague, May 3. By all our Advices from the Empire, the News of the French having succeeded in their Design of changing the Garrison of Egra, is confirmed.

Hague, May 7. All Reports now agree, that Marshal Brogio's Exploit at Egra was not near so considerable as was at first given out; he having only thrown some fresh Men, but few or no Provisions, into that Place.

Whitehall, April 30.

On Wednesday last, about Four o'Clock in the Morning, the King set out from St. James's for Gravesend, where his Majesty embarked for Holland, and sail'd from thence between Nine and Ten that Morning, but the Wind coming contrary, was obliged to cast Anchor at Five the same Evening at the Nore, and on Thursday Morning put into Sheerness, where his Majesty still continued Yesterday in the Evening.
