

Huffars, and, as is reported, some Pandours, to the Number of 8 or 900 Men, came from Adenwald to Erlsberg, and to Zwingenberg, where the French had a Party of about 3000 Men to guard their Magazine, which the Hungarians attack'd, and oblig'd them to fly to the Wood, which lies near Jegersperg, and where they have lodged themselves; but we have no Account of what has happen'd since. The French have burnt their Magazine at Grofschau, because they could not carry it off. As to their Hay and Straw Magazine at Grofs Gerau, they had demanded 100 Waggon to remove it to Oppenheim, but could not get such a Number; and the French Officers having ask'd a Certificate of their having left such a Quantity behind, it was refus'd them, upon which they threatned to plunder the Inhabitants.

*Hanau, July 20, N. S.* The whole French Army, under the Command of Marshal Noailles, passed the Rhine on the 17th Instant. The Marshal's Head Quarters are at Hernchern; half the Army is encamped above Worms, towards Frankenthal, in two Lines; and the other half encamped below Worms, towards Oppenheim. We have just received Advice, that the Corps which was Yesterday at Frankenthal, amongst which were those of the French King's Household, broke up this Morning, and marched downwards towards Oppenheim.

*Maestricht, July 19, N. S.* This Day Brigadier Howard, at the Head of four British Regiments, amongst which is that of the Scotch Highlanders, passed the Maeze at this Place, having under his Convoy about 250 Waggon loaden with the Baggage and Stores of the British Army.

*Hague, July 23, N. S.* The Battalion of Foot Guards marched out from this Place Yesterday Morning, and were embarked at Delft for Arnheim, where it is supposed they will arrive To-morrow Morning. The March of the Three Squadrons of Horse Guards from hence stands fix'd for Thursday, as that of the Head both of the Infantry and Cavalry into Westphalia does to the 3d of next Month. Last Friday the States of Holland disposed of all the Employments, Civil and Military, which were vacant upon their Repartition, when General Prætorius obtained a Regiment and Company in the Service of the Republic.

*Whitehall, July 16.*

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint his Royal Highness William Duke of Cumberland, to be Lieutenant General of his Majesty's Forces.
