A P R O C L A M A T I O N

Requiring Quarantine to be performed by all Ships and Vessels coming from the Island of Sicily, or from or through the Mediterranean.

WHEREAS upon Information given to this Board, That the Island of Sicily was visited with the Plague, We the Lords Justices and Council, in order to prevent the Infection being brought by Ships or Vessels coming from thence, or other Places in the Mediterranean, into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, did, by our Proclamation, bearing Date the Eighteenth Day of July last, Order, That all Ships or Vessels then arrived and not unladen, and all Ships and Vessels, which should thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the said Island of Sicily, should make their Quarantine for forty Days; and that all Ships and Vessels that were then arrived, and not unladen, or should thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from any other of the Ports in the Mediterranean, should make their Quarantine for fourteen Days. We the Lords Justices and Council judging it necessary (for the further preventing the said Infection from being brought into this Kingdom) to make several Alterations and Additions to our said Proclamation of the Eighteenth of July last, do hereby Order, That all Ships or Vessels already arrived and not yet unladen, and all Ships or Vessels which shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from or through the Mediterranean (except the Island of Sicily) do make their Quarantine for fourteen Days; and all such Ships and Vessels as are arrived and not yet unladen, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the said Island of Sicily, do make their Quarantine for forty Days; which respective Times are to be reckoned from the Day each Ship or Vessel shall come to Anchor in the

Place appointed for performing such Quarantine, and not before.

That the Places for performing Quarantine by such Ships and Vessels, bound to any Port between Miffen-Head and the Tuskard, be the Bay of Baltimore. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound for any Port between Tuskard and Rathlin, be Lough-Learn and the Bay of Carlingford, near Killowen Point, opposite the Town of Carlingford. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound for any Port between Rathlin and Torry-Island, be Ballymastoker Bay or Red-Castle Road, near Londonderry. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound to any Port between Torry-Island and Black-Sod Bay, be the Harbour of Killybeggs. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound to any Port between Black-Sod Bay and Loop-Head, be Clew-Bay (otherwise called) the Bay of Burrishowle. And for such Ships and Vessels as shall be bound to any Port between Loop-Head and Miffen-Head, be Scatterry Road, in the River of Limerick.

That until and during the Time for making such Quarantine, no Person coming, or Goods imported in any such Ship or Vessel, shall come on Shore, or be landed in any Place within this Kingdom.

That no Pilots shall go on board any Ship or Vessel obliged to perform Quarantine, in order to conduct the same into any Port or Place, but shall perform such Service in some other Boat or Vessel; which Boat or Vessel shall keep as much to the Windward of the Ship or Vessel, so to be conducted, as possible: And if any Pilot or other Person shall go on board such Ship or Vessel, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Person coming in such Ship or Vessel shall be obliged to perform the same.

That if, at the Expiration of the Forty Days Quarantine to be performed by any Ship or Vessel that is or shall be liable thereto, it shall appear to the Officers of the Customs in the Place where such Ship or Vessel shall be, and the Master

fter or other Persons taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, together with two other Persons belonging to the said Ship or Vessel, shall make Oath before the Customer, Comptroller or Collector of the Port where such Quarantine shall be performed, or the next Port thereunto, or before any of their Deputies and any one Justice of the Peace near adjoining to such Port, that such Ship or Vessel, and all and every Person and Persons therein, have duly performed their Quarantine as aforesaid, and that the Ship or Vessel, and all the Persons on board are free from Infection; that then the respective Persons coming in such Ship or Vessel (a Certificate of such Oaths being made by the Persons before whom the same shall be taken) shall be permitted to go on Shore; but the Goods imported in such Ship or Vessel, together with the Bedding of the Sailors, shall be landed, opened and aired, and so remain a Week, and after may be brought to their Places of Discharge, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk raw, thrown or wrought, Linnen, Cotton-Wool, Cotton-Yarn, or manufactured, Wool raw, or in any wise wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair-Yarn, Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid-Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hats and Brushes, Matting and artificial Flowers: Which the Officers of his Majesty's Customs shall cause to remain on Board such Ship or Vessel, and not permit to be landed, till an Account thereof shall be given in Council, and Orders shall be given concerning the same.

That the Places for Landing and Airing the Goods imported by such Ships or Vessels as are or shall be liable to the Forty Days Quarantine, shall be such Places as shall be appointed by his Majesty's Officers of the Customs, who are hereby impowered and required to appoint proper Places for the same.

That whatever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine.

That such Persons as after Quarantine performed, shall be employed in the Hold of any such Ship or Vessel, for the taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection from Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk raw, thrown or wrought, Linnen, Cotton-Wool, Cotton-Yarn or manufactured, Wool raw, or in any wise wrought, Feathers, Grograin or Mohair-Yarn, Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wool, Carpets, Camblets, Burdets or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid-Skins and Skins in the Wool or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oyl in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hats and Brushes, Matting and artificial Flowers, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine of Forty Days.

That the Captains of every of his Majesty's Ships of War attending the Service of this Kingdom, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of this Kingdom, shall take due Care so prevent the Landing any Goods, Seamen, or Passengers, from on board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of his Majesty's Customs.

That the Commissioners and other Officers of his Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine before directed be duly performed.

And we do hereby strictly charge and command the Commanders of his Majesty's Ships of War attending the Service of this Kingdom, as likewise the Commanders of his Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea-Coasts, and all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, and all other Officers and Ministers of Justice, to be aiding and assisting to the Officers of the Revenue and Customs, and to all other Persons that shall be concerned in stopping Ships coming from any Port or Place in the said Island of Sicily, or any other Ports of the Mediterranean, or from or through the same, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for, and obliging them to perform their Quarantine, as aforesaid.

GOD Save the King.

Naples, Aug. 6. The freshest Advices which the Court has received from Sicily, continue to give a favourable Account of the Sicknes at Messina, where many People have of late recovered. On the contrary, the Accounts from Reggio have greatly alarmed this Government, as the Sicknes which has lately discovered itself in the Suburbs of that City, has reached some of the neighbouring Villages, where no Day passes but some few die. A Prohibition, under the severest Penalties, has been published, not to export any Sort of Provisions out of the two Sicilies, a large Quantity of which is putting into the Magazines of this Capital; many private People likewise are laying in a good Stock of Provisions in their Houses.

Rome, Aug. 10. In the last Week 50 Soldiers of the Garrison of Civita Vecchia arrived here to reinforce the Guards at the Gates of this City, upon the News of the Sicknes having reached Calabria. To this End, Orders have also been given to compleat and augment the Company of Corsican Soldiers.

Florence, Aug. 13. On the 8th the Florentine Nobility began to do Duty at all the Gates of this City; their Business is to receive and examine the Bills of Health from the Passengers that arrive. We are informed by the latest Letters from

from Lombardy, that Prince Lobcowitz is expected from Germany to relieve Marshal Traun in the Command of the Auftrian Troops in Italy, who, on account of his advanced Age, has desired Leave to resign. The Spaniards continue in their usual Quarters of Rimini, &c.

Berne, Aug. 23, N. S. According to the freshest Advices from Savoy, the Spanish Army under M. de las Minas is divided into three Bodies, the one encamped at Montmelian, the other at St. Jean de Maurienne, and the third at Conflans. Six Battalions of French Troops are arrived at Fort Barreaux, and the Swiss Regiment de Vigier, with Traver's Regiment of Grifons, are on their March thither. The Campaign in those Parts must be over in six Weeks at farthest, and yet no body pretends to say what Route those Troops propose to take, which makes many People apprehend we may have the Spaniards for our Neighbours another Winter.

Mentz, August 23. This Afternoon the rest of the British Cavalry and Infantry pass'd the Rhine, as did the Hessians. The Duke of Cumberland begins to get on Horseback again, and dines every Day in Publick with the King.

Mentz, August 27. Upon the 25th the Artillery pass'd the Rhine, and about Two this Morning the whole Army struck their Tents, and about Three marched in three Columns towards Oppenheim. About Five his Majesty left the Chartreux, in order to join the Army on their March, and was saluted by the Cannon of this Place.

Hague, August 27. We have just received an Account from Nimeguen, that M. Wafenberg, who has been many Years Minister from the King of Sweden to his Britannick Majesty, died there the 25th Instant of an Apoplectick Disorder.

Hague, Sept. 3. The various Reports, with which we have of late been flatter'd, of Prince Charles's having gained his Passage over the Rhine, are not confirmed.

Hambourg, August 28. By the last Letters from Copenhagen we have Advice, that the Count Tessin had taken a Lease of his House for the Term of three Years. The Swedish Deputation set out from Stockholm the 20th Instant, N. S. for Carlscroon, thence to embark for Stalsfund to proceed on hither. The Emperor's Resident M. Kurtzroch is set out for Lubeck to assist as Commissary from his Imperial Master at the Election of a Coadjutor to the Bishop of Lubeck; the Chapter will be held the 30th.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Henry Pelham, and Samuel Sandys, Esqrs. George Compton, Esq; Sir John

Rufhout, Bart. and Philips Gybbon, Esq; to be Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of his Majesty's Exchequer.

Admiralty Office, August 25.

His Majesty's Ship the Jersey, commanded by Captain Harry Norris, arrived Yesterday at Spithead, and brought in a Prize called the Dauphine, Simon Lagora Master, from La Vera Cruz and the Havanna, laden with a very valuable Cargo of Cocheneal and Indigo. She was taken the 6th Instant, by the Honourable Captain John Byng, in his Majesty's Ship the Captain, in the Latitude of 46. 47. Belle Isle bearing N. E. by N. about 13 Leagues.
