

from Lombardy, that Prince Lobcowitz is expected from Germany to relieve Marshal Traun in the Command of the Auftrian Troops in Italy, who, on account of his advanced Age, has desired Leave to resign. The Spaniards continue in their usual Quarters of Rimini, &c.

Berne, Aug. 23, N. S. According to the freshest Advices from Savoy, the Spanish Army under M. de las Minas is divided into three Bodies, the one encamped at Montmelian, the other at St. Jean de Maurienne, and the third at Conflans. Six Battalions of French Troops are arrived at Fort Barreaux, and the Swiss Regiment de Vigier, with Traver's Regiment of Grifons, are on their March thither. The Campaign in those Parts must be over in six Weeks at farthest, and yet no body pretends to say what Route those Troops propose to take, which makes many People apprehend we may have the Spaniards for our Neighbours another Winter.

Mentz, August 23. This Afternoon the rest of the British Cavalry and Infantry pass'd the Rhine, as did the Hessians. The Duke of Cumberland begins to get on Horseback again, and dines every Day in Publick with the King.

Mentz, August 27. Upon the 25th the Artillery pass'd the Rhine, and about Two this Morning the whole Army struck their Tents, and about Three marched in three Columns towards Oppenheim. About Five his Majesty left the Chartreux, in order to join the Army on their March, and was saluted by the Cannon of this Place.

Hague, August 27. We have just received an Account from Nimeguen, that M. Wafenberg, who has been many Years Minister from the King of Sweden to his Britannick Majesty, died there the 25th Instant of an Apoplectick Disorder.

Hague, Sept. 3. The various Reports, with which we have of late been flatter'd, of Prince Charles's having gained his Passage over the Rhine, are not confirmed.

Hambourg, August 28. By the last Letters from Copenhagen we have Advice, that the Count Tessin had taken a Lease of his House for the Term of three Years. The Swedish Deputation set out from Stockholm the 20th Instant, N. S. for Carlscroon, thence to embark for Stalsfund to proceed on hither. The Emperor's Resident M. Kurtzroch is set out for Lubeck to assist as Commissary from his Imperial Master at the Election of a Coadjutor to the Bishop of Lubeck; the Chapter will be held the 30th.

His Majesty's Ship the Jersey, commanded by Captain Harry Norris, arrived Yesterday at Spithead, and brought in a Prize called the Dauphine, Simon Lagora Master, from La Vera Cruz and the Havanna, laden with a very valuable Cargo of Cocheneal and Indigo. She was taken the 6th Instant, by the Honourable Captain John Byng, in his Majesty's Ship the Captain, in the Latitude of 46. 47. Belle Isle bearing N. E. by N. about 13 Leagues.
