South-Carolina.

By the Honourable William Bull, Esq; Lieutenant - Governor and Commander in Chief in and over this his Majesty's Province of South-Carolina.

Hundred and Forty-three, and in the Sixteenth Year of his Majesty's Reign.

WHEREAS his Majesty, to promote and encourage the better Settling of this his Province, has been graciously pleased to direct the Governor to grant to such Protestants, as should become Settlers therein, *Fifty Acres of Land* for every Man, Woman, or Child, free from Quit-Rent for ten Years: And as a farther Encouragement, the Duties payable on the Importation of Negroes, were appropriated as a Fund to supply them with Provisions for one Year, and Tools whereby they were enabled to provide for their own Subsistence afterwards: Upon which Encouragement many Protestants came and settled in the several Townships laid out for that Purpose.

And whereas there still remains in the publick Treasurers Hands upwards of Fifteen Thousand Pounds current Money, which is applied for the Encouragement of poor Protestants to become Settlers and Inhabitants in any of his Majesty's Townships, or such other Parts as they shall be directed.

These are therefore to make known the same to all Persons whatever, and more particularly to such as may be inclined to transport themselves from Foreign Parts, and settle in this Province, that they shall be put in Possession of the said Lands without any Expence to them; and that there is also allowed, out of the said Fund, for the Support of such poor Protestants and their Families for one Year, *Three Hundred Weight of Beef, Fifty Weight of Pork, Eight Bushels of Corn, Two Hundred Weight of Small Rice, and One Bushel Salt*, for every Person above Twelve Years and under Fifty Years of Age; and for every Person under Twelve Years of Age, half the said Quantity; and to every Man *One Ax, One Broad and One Narrow Hoe*, to enable them to clear and cultivate their Lands, and raise Provision for the second Year: Also to every five Persons *One Cow and Calf, and One Breeding Sow*.

And also those Persons who come over Servants, will receive the like Bounty and Encouragement, when their Servitude is ended, if they become Settlers in any of the Townships, or such other Parts as they shall be directed to settle in.

In Testimony of which, I have hereunto set my Hand, and caused the Great Seal of his Majesty's Province to be affixed at Charles Town, this Ninth Day of April, *Annoque Domini* One Thousand Seven

Stockholm, Oct. 11, O. S. Yesterday his Swedish Majesty was pleased to name M. Ringwicht, who was a few Years ago Minister at Vienna, to be his Swedish Majesty's Minister at the Court of Great Britain. The Prince Royal is expected To-morrow. His Royal Highness lies this Night at Geddaholm, an Estate belonging to Count Thuro Bielke.

Vienna, Oct. 19. Prince Lobkowitz moved into the Bolognese to seize the Spanish Magazines at Bologna, in which he has succeeded, and got considerable Subsistence for his Army: The Inhabitants opposed it, under Pretence of their belonging to that City, but the Prince having had Proofs that the whole was Spanish Property, took Possession of them. It is thought he will now advance towards the Spaniards; his Army consists of about 20000 Men. The Town of Modena is fortifying with the greatest Diligence.

Schwalbach, Oct. 24, N. S. This Day the first Division of his Britannick Majesty's Forces, commanded by Lieutenant General Sir James Campbell, and Lieutenant General Hawley, consisting of the Royal Regiment, the Royal Scots, and the King's own Regiment, all of them Dragoons, with the Scots Highland Foot, arrived here in their March to their Winter Quarters in Brabant and Flanders. They will proceed To-morrow by Way of Naesteden to Nassau, Valendar, and Andernach, where they will arrive on the 29th, and will be immediately followed by the second Division, commanded by Lieutenant General Sir John Cope.

Coblentz, October 27. The British Troops are marching this Way in Divisions. They are to pass the Rhine at Neuwied on flying Bridges, for which Purpose that belonging to the Town of Oppenheim fail'd by this Place Yesterday; and one from hence, together with some others in this Neighbourhood, are to repair in a few Days to the first mentioned Town. Marshall Noailles, who is supposed to be as this Day at Sarr Louis, sent a few Days since a Brigadier with a Gentleman from King Stanislaus to the Duke of Aremberg, to demand Reparation for the Damages done
