Petersbourg, October 11.

HER Imperial Majesty has been for some Days past in the Country, to take the Diversions of Hunting and Shooting, and is expected in Town this Evening.

Hamburg, November 6, N. S. Prince Nariskin, late Minister from the Russian Court, to that of Great-Britain, is at present here on his return to Petersbourg. M. Osten, who has left the Russian Service, with the Character of Lieutenant Colonel, is soliciting the vacant Employment of Commandant of this Town.

Aix la Chapelle, November 9. This Day the Third Division of the British Troops, under the Command of Lieutenant General Sir John Ligonier, and my Lord Albemarle, arrived in the Neighbourhood of this Town, where they will halt To-morrow; and will be succeeded on the 11th Instant by the fourth Division, consisting of three Battalions of the Foot Guards, with four Cannon and four Pontons.

Aix la Chapelle, Nov. 11. This Day three Battalions of his Britannick Majesty's Guards, with four Cannon and four Pontons, arrived here in their Way to Flanders. They will prosecute their March To-morrow, and will be immediately followed by the fifth Division of the English Troops, consisting of Duroure's, Pulteney's, Bligh's and Campbell's Regiments of Foot, commanded by Major General Lord Rothes, and Brigadier General Campbell. A Part of the Cannon and Pontons march also with this Division.

Maestricht, November 10. Yesterday the Head of the English Troops arrived in the Plain of this Town, where they will halt To-day, and march To-morrow to Tongres in the Principality of Liege.

Tongres, Nov. 12, N. S. Yesterday the first Division of the British Troops marched from hence to St. Tron. They are already succeeded by the second Division, and will be followed To-morrow by the Third, which Halts this Day in the Plain of Maestricht.

Hague, November 12. N. S. Baron Erthal, Envoy from the Elector of Mentz to the British Court, has been here some Days, and designs to go over with the next Mail.
