ORDERS having been given the 20th Instant to the Quarter-Masters and Fourriers to take the Lead towards Fribourg, in order to mark out a Camp there, his most Serene Highness Prince Charles of Lorraine, and the Marshal Count Khevenhuller, followed them thither the next Day with the whole Army, which is to pursue its March from thence in four Columns to the Winter-Quarters. After the Prince's Departure, Prince Waldeck is to remain in his most Serene Highness's Quarters at Hochstatt, where he will command the Body to be left behind for forming the Cantonments, which is to consist of nine Battalions, and as many Companies of Grenadiers, from the Regiments of Prince Maximilian of Hesse, Neuberg, Waldeck, Daun, Broune, Mercy, Baireuth, Marchall, and Grune; as also of Bathiani's Regiment of Dragoons, and the three Regiments of Hussars, of Trips, Kalnocky, and Ghyjany, 200 Croats, and Trenck's Pandours; with this Body of Troops Prince Waldeck will continue for some Days at the Camp above-mentioned, and afterwards distribute it into the Cantonments. His Most Serene Highness the Prince of Gotha is posted with another Corps at Bregenz, which consists of the Regiments of Khevenhuller, Hohenzoller, Francis, and Charles Lorraine. General Count Plaz, with the Serjeants General Count Starhenberg and Baton Gelhay, have their Quarters at Rheinsfelden, with 10 Battalions, and as many Companies of Grenadiers, viz. Old Konigsfek, Hildburgshausen, Botta, Pallavicini, Giulay, Starhenberg, Kollowrath, Young Konigsfek, Moll, Harrach, and Oilone's Regiment of Dragoons, and 2000 Croats.
