*Petersbourg, October 18.*

**L**AST Sunday Morning the Saxon Minister Baron Gerdsdoff had a private Audience of the Czarina, and congratulated her Imperial Majesty, in the Name of the King of Poland, upon the Conclusion of the Peace with Sweden. He made afterwards a suitable Compliment to his Imperial Highness the Great Duke upon the same Subject. Yesterday General During had likewise a private Audience, and delivered to her Imperial Majesty a congratulatory Letter from the King of Sweden on her Accession to the Crown, which Formality had been omitted on Account of the late War.

*Vienna, November 2, N. S.* This Morning arrived here Prince Lobcowitz's Aid de Camp from Italy, with the News, that the whole Spanish Army had retreated upon the Approach of the Queen's; that the Prince's Head Quarters was at Forli, and that it was thought the Spaniards intended to retire into the Kingdom of Naples.

*Hatover, November 11, N. S.* Her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa arrived here on Saturday last about Four of the Clock in the Afternoon, and last Night the Espousals of her Royal Highness, with the Prince Royal of Denmark, were performed in the Chapel of the Castle, with the greatest Magnificence and Solemnity. On Wednesday her Royal Highness is to proceed on her Journey to Altona, where the Prince Royal of Denmark waits her Arrival.

*Maestricht, Nov. 12, N. S.* The Dutch Auxiliaries, in the Service of the Queen of Hungary, are preparing to traverse the Principality of Liege, in their Way to Mens, Ath, Charleroy, Courtray and Audenard. They have already demanded 126 Waggon's to transport their Baggage, and will pass by way of Stockhem.

*Liege, Nov. 13.* Yesterday the Dutch Auxiliaries began to pass the Maeze at Stockhem, in their Way to the Queen of Hungary's Frontier Towns in Hainault, where they will have their Winter-Quarters.

*Tirlemont in Brabant, Nov. 13, N. S.* This Day the First Division of the British Troops, consisting of the Royal Regiment, the Royal Scots, and the King's own Regiment, all of them Dragoons, with the Scots Highland Foot, under the Command of Lieutenant-General Sir James Campbell and Lieutenant-General Hawley, arrived here from St. Fton in the Principality of Liege, and will be succeeded, at an Interval of one Day, by the other Divisions.

*Aix la Chapelle, Nov. 13, N. S.* This Day the Sixth Division of the English Troops, consisting of Handaside's, Skelton's, Johnson's, and Ponsoby's Regiments of Foot, with five Cannon and four Pontons, arrived here, where they

will halt To-morrow, and proceed the next Day for Gulpen and the Plain of Maestricht.

*Bruxelles, Nov. 16, N. S.* This Day the First Division of the English Troops arrived here, and will march To-morrow by way of Aloft to Ghent. They will be immediately followed by the Second Division, which quarters this Day at Louvain, and these will be succeeded by the Third, which is now arrived at Tirlemont.

*Maestricht, Nov. 17.* Yesterday the Sixth Division of the English Forces arrived here, and will march To-morrow to Tongres in the Principality of Liege. They will be immediately succeeded by the Seventh Division of the Army, consisting of Major General Onslow's, Lieutenant-General Howard's, the Royal Regiment, and Colonel Sowle's, with five Cannon and four Pontons, under the Command of Major-General Howard.

*Hague, November 15, N. S.* Letters from Italy, and particularly from Bologna, of the 30th past, N. S. continue to give a favourable Account of the Progress Prince Lobcowitz makes against the Spaniards, who retire as fast as he advances. They had abandoned Rimini, and taken an advantageous Post behind the Mountains of Catolica, but quitted it likewise at the Approach of the Austrians; and are retreating, through the Dutchies of Urbino and Spoleto, towards the Frontier of Naples. The Escortes for the King's Passage through this State have been demanded To-day, against the 20th, about which Time his Majesty is expected to arrive on the Dutch Frontier. Baron Dehn, lately Envoy from the Court of Denmark in Spain, is just arrived here.

*Hague, November 20, N. S.* The Right Honourable the Lord Carteret is expected here every Hour.

*Whitehall, November 15.*

This Afternoon, about Three of the Clock, a Messenger arrived here with an Account, that the King landed at Gravesend, from whence his Majesty arrived at his Palace of St. James's this Evening in perfect Health, God be praised.

Yesterday Morning, between Eight and Nine o'Clock, her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales was safely-delivered of a Prince, and her Royal Highness and the young Prince continue in as good Health as can be expected.
