**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgeses of this ancient Corporation, humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your safe Arrival in these your British Dominions. We take this Opportunity of expressing our Joy on the glorious Success of your Majesty's Arms at Dettingen; a Victory, next under God, owing to your Majesty's Conduct and personal Valour; by which not only the Rights of the House of Austria, but the Liberties of all



all Europe were secured from falling a Prey to the common Enemy of both.

We cannot sufficiently acknowledge your Majesty's constant Regard for the Furtherance of the Protestant Interest, particularly in the late Instance shewn by the Marriage of her Highness the Princess Louisa with the Prince Royal of Denmark; and it is with great Satisfaction that we hear of the Increase of your Royal Line, by the Birth of another Prince.

We most heartily implore the Divine Providence to grant your Majesty a long and auspicious Reign, as well for the Prosperity of these your Kingdoms, as the Good of all Europe in general: And with Hearts full of Gratitude assure your Majesty, that we will, to the utmost of our Power, contribute to the Ease and Support of your Majesty's Government.

*Naples, Nov. 5, N. S.* Several Warrants from the War and Secretary of State's Office have of late been directed to the Officers of the King's Troops in this City, to repair immediately to their respective Posts, and other Detachments of Foot from *Capua*, &c. have been ordered to march towards *Aquila*, whither Provisions of all Sorts are constantly sent. On the 25th past the Queen of Spain's Birth-day was celebrated at Court with great Solemnity, the Foreign Ministers, Nobility, &c. in their rich Habits, appeared at Court, to compliment their Majesties on that Occasion; and in the Evening there was a Discharge of the Artillery of the Castles, Gallies, &c. The Accounts brought this Week of the Sickness, are less favourable than the last; it continues at *Reggio* and in that Neighbourhood; and though great Care is taken to keep the Malady within the Lines, yet this Government is under great Alarm.

*Rome, Nov. 9.* Cardinal Pozzo Bonelli, the Archbishop of Milan, who was on Departure for that City, has been obliged to suspend his Journey thither, until the Difficulty, which his Promotion to that Cathedral meets with at the Court of Vienna, is removed. The Pope has appointed M. Ferretti Governor of the Arms at Ferrara, and M. Origo Governor of the Forts of Civita Vecchia, in lieu of the latter. On the 29th past an Edict was published about this City, notifying the Re-establishment of Commerce with Tuscany by Land. The Pope continues to take the Air about the Gardens in this City, and many of the Cardinals are returned from their Country Seats. Frequent Consultations are held before the Pope, upon the Dispatches from the Legations of Bologna, Ferrara, and Ravenna, on the Difficulties they find themselves under, as to supplying the Armies in the Romagna not only with Forrages, but likewise the Contributions they require in Money, which put this Government into the utmost Agitation.

*Florence, Nov. 12.* By the latest Accounts from the Romagna, the Spanish Army continues at Fano and Pesaro, where the Artillery and Ammunition were arrived from Civita Castellana. Prince Lobkowitz remains at his Head Quarters at Rimini, at which Place and at the Cattolica his Artillery is arrived. On the 3d Instant M. de Kaunitz, the Queen of Hungary's Minister to the King of Sardinia, set out from the Army on his Return to Turin. Many Sardinian Officers arrive daily at the Austrian Army to serve as Volunteers, and a Battalion of Vasquez is to join the said Army from Lombardy. On the 6th Instant express Orders from the Regency were sent to Pistoia, Siena, and Leghorn, to examine the Weight of Zecchins there, that Coin having of late been found less than its usual Weight, so that the Merchants refuse to receive Payments in it. An Edict has been since published, whereby the Great Duke, for the Credit of his Coin, offers to make good the Deficiency. On the 9th returned hither from Vienna, the Cabinet Courier dispatched hither some few ago by M. de Richécourt, with the Pope's Dispensation for the Marriage of Prince Charles of Lorraine and the Archduchess Mary-Anne.

*Vienna, Nov. 20.* The Duke of Aremberg arrived here on Sunday last in perfect Health, and Marshal Khevenhuller is expected the next Week. Prince Charles's Marriage with the Archduchess was declared Yesterday the Name Day of the Empress; and Count Kaunitz is appointed Grand Maitre of the new Court at Brussels.

*Hambourg, Nov. 26.* Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Denmark set out from Altena in the same Chariot the 23d Instant, about Eight in the Morning, in order to proceed by easy Stages to Copenhagen. From Sleswick, where her Royal Highness is to repose two or three Days, the Prince will go on, in order to be in Readiness to receive the Princess at the Palace of Fridericksberg; and from thence their Royal Highnesses are to make their publick Entry into the City of Copenhagen. The Prince has given the several English who had the Honour to accompany her Royal Highness, to Altena, very generous Marks of his Liberality.

*Brussels, Nov. 25.* Major General Popoff, by, Colonel la Devise, and Colonel Robinson, Deputy Quarter Master General, &c. with the Eighth and last Division of his Britannick Majesty's Troops, arrived here in very good Order this Day, according to the Route prefixed, notwithstanding the River Roar near Duren had so overflowed its Banks that there was no passing it without a Bridge of Pontons, in making of which the General himself assisted in Person: The Roads too were almost made impassable by the Wheel Carriages of the preceding Divisions.

*Hague, Nov. 29, N. S.* The News, that was published here the Beginning of this Week, of the French having pass'd the Rhine at Hunningen,

ningen, proves to be premature; they having only lodged themselves in an Island in that River belonging to the Marquisate of Baden; where they are said to be fortifying themselves; but hitherto not a Man of them, as far as we hear, has set his Foot upon the Continent of Swabia; though indeed the Branch of the Rhine, which separates this Island from Germany, is said to be far less considerable than that which separates it from Alsace; and over which the French have now thrown their Bridge. The said Island is German Territory; and the Fortifications that were formerly on it, and which the French are raising again, were razed by the Peace of Baden.

*Whitehall, November 26.*

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to pass the Great Seal, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of St. Asaph, to elect a Bishop of that See, void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God, Doctor Isaac Maddox, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Worcester; and also to name and recommend to the said Dean and Chapter, the Reverend John Thomas, Doctor in Divinity, one of his Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, and Dean of the Cathedral Church of Peterborough, to be by them elected Bishop thereof.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Henry Pulteney, Esq; to be Governor and Captain of the Town of Kingston upon Hull, and of all the Forts, Block-Houses, and Fortifications belonging to the same.

*Leicester-House, Nov. 23.*

This Day the Baron d'Ehrthall, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Mentz, had his first private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; to which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.
