From the Door of the Coach they marched before her into the Anti-Chamber, the Prince handing her all the Way into her Apartment: Where, after a few Minutes Repose, the Grand Marshal and Grand Master from the King and Queen, as also the Masters of the Courts of the two Danish Princesses, were introduced to make the Compliments of their respective Principals. The Ladies were next admitted; then the Princes, Ministers, &c. who, however numerous, were all received by her Royal Highness (notwithstanding the Fatigue of her long Journey) with such a cheerful Countenance, with such gracious Affability, and with such proper Marks of Distinction, as filled every one with a most agreeable Surprise, as well as with the highest Satisfaction.

Copenhagen, Dec. 10. Her Royal Highness, who still continues at the Palace of Fredericksberg in perfect Health, has received the Visits of their Majesties and of the Danish Princesses; and this Morning gave a private Audience to the Swedish Ambassador, and afterwards a publick one to all the Foreign Ministers of the second Order, and to a very numerous Court. The Prince lodges in Town, but commonly passes the whole Day in the Company of her Royal Highness. To-morrow is the Day appointed for her publick Entry into this City, and for the final Celebration of the Marriage.

Hambourg, Dec. 16, N. S. General Wurmb, who was formerly employed in the King of Great Britain's Service, as Elector of Hanover, and some Years since retired from the said Service, was this Morning chosen Commandant at Hambourg.

Munich, Dec. 17, N. S. Yesterday Duke Theodor of Bavaria, Bishop of Ratisbonne and Frisingen, Brother to the Emperour, arrived here from Bonn, to begin his Residence as Canon of the Cathedral of St. Lambert, with a View, as is said, of offering himself as a Candidate at the ensuing Election of a Bishop and Prince of Bishops.
