May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of Exeter, humbly beg Leave to approach your Majesty, and offer our most sincere Congratulations on your Majesty's Arrival to these your British Dominions. The gracious Interposition of the Divine Providence in protecting your Majesty's sacred Person from those imminent Dangers to which you so generously exposed it in Defence of the Liberties of Europe, (with which those of this Nation are most intimately connected) and your Return hither in Health and Safety, fill our Hearts with Joy, and demand out utmost Thankfulness.
