We likewiſe with great Humility congratulate your Maſteſty on the Marriage of your Royal Daughter to the Prince of Denmark; and on the Encreaſe of your Maſteſty's illuſtrious Family by the Birth of another Prince.

We pray to God that your Maſteſty's Reign over us may be long, happy and glorious; that a Prince of your Royal Houſe may never be wanting to ſit upon the Throne of this Kingdom. Given under our Common Seal at Scarbrough the Twenty Sixth Day of December 1743.

The Marriage of her Royal Highneſs the Princeſs Louiſa with the Prince Royal of Denmark, and the Birth of another Prince to his Royal Highneſs the Prince of Wales, are Events which muſt give great Pleaſure to all the Well-wiſhers to your Maſteſty's Royal Family, and the

Happineſs of theſe Kingdoms; we do therefore, with Hearts full of Joy, beg your Maſteſty's favourable Acceptance of our Congratulations thereupon, and of our ſincereſt Wiſhes, that theſe Kingdoms may never want a Deſcendant from your Maſteſty to fill the Throne. Your Maſteſty's ſafe Return to theſe your Britiſh Dominions rejoiced the Hearts of all your good Subjects.—This Joy was much increaſed, by reflecting on the extreme Dangers, to which, in Defence of the Liberties of Europe, you generouſly expoſed your Life in the Fields of Dettingen, and acquired immortal Honour; where, under the Influence of Heaven, and animated by your Preſence and Valour, the confederate Army gain'd an important Victory over the common Enemy.

This, with the Recovery of the Duke from the honourable Wound he receiv'd in the Battle; the Marriage of the Princeſs Louiſa with the Prince Royal of Denmark; and the Birth of another Son to his Royal Highneſs the Prince of Wales, is ſuch a Series of Events, as greatly encourages our Hopes, that the Goodneſs of God will perpetuate the Bleſſings, which we perſuade ourſelves his Providence deſigned in placing your Maſteſty's Family upon the Throne of theſe Kingdoms: Under which we have enjoy'd ſo many Years of Peace and Proſperity.
