To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Justices of the Peace and Grand Jury, at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden for the County of Worcester, on the Seventeenth Day of January, One thousand seven hundred and forty-three.

MAY it please your Majesty to accept our humble and hearty Congratulations on your safe Return from Abroad, after the Dangers and Fatigues to which you was pleased to expose your sacred Person, in Defence of the Liberty of Europe, and in Support of the true Interest of these Kingdom. Next to the Hand of Providence, we ought to ascribe the Defeat of our Enemies at Dettingen to that intrepid Spirit which your Majesty's Presence infused into your Forces, and to that Terror which the long Experience of your Courage and Conduct struck into your Foes. We are therefore obliged, after returning our devout Thanks to Heaven, to express the sincerest Gratitude to your Majesty for a Victory so glorious to yourself, and so beneficial in its Consequences, not only to your own Subjects, but also to every neighbouring Nation that has the Cause of Freedom and Justice at Heart.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your safe Return to these Kingdoms, after a successful, though dangerous, Campaign; and we shall always esteem it among the many signal Instances of the Favour of Heaven to this Nation, that your Majesty's sacred Person remained unhurt in the Battle of Dettingen, where your Royal Presence, under the Direction of Providence, was the Occasion of that glorious Victory.

Your Majesty's generous Concern to maintain your Allies in their just Rights, and to preserve the Freedom of Europe, is becoming a Great and Mighty Prince, supported by a Brave and Free People; who, sensible of the Blessings of Liberty under your Majesty's auspicious Government, gratefully contribute to relieve the Oppressed, and oppose exorbitant and arbitrary Power, which is destructive of the Happiness of Mankind.

The Encrease of your Majesty's Royal Family by the Birth of a Prince, and the additional Strength the Protestant Interest receives by the Marriage of the Princess Louisa with the Prince Royal of Denmark, are Events which give great Joy to your Majesty's faithful Subjects, as they are the Means of continuing the Government of these Kingdoms to your Royal House, and with it the full Enjoyment of our Religious and Civil Rights.

That your Majesty's Reign may be long and happy over us, and that these Kingdoms may be ruled by your Royal Progeny, so long as Religion and Liberty are valuable to Mankind, is the earnest and constant Wish of us your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.

Petersbourg, January 3. On New Year's Day her Imperial Majesty received the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and a great Number of Persons of Distinction. The Great Duke appeared in Publick for the first Time after his late Indisposition; and the Physicians being of Opinion that his Imperial High-

ness may be able to travel in Three Weeks the Empress has declared her Intention of setting out for Moscow towards the latter End of this Month. After Divine Service the Cannon of the Fort and Admiralty were fired, and in the Evening was a Ball at Court, Illuminations, &c. as usual. Between Seven and Eight o'Clock this Morning died of a violent Fit of the Cholick, which had continued about Eighteen Hours, Privy Councillor Brevern, one of the Ministers of State for Foreign Affairs. Tomorrow the First Regiment of Guards is to march towards Moscow, to be stationed at different Places on the Road against her Imperial Majesty's Journey. The other Regiments are to follow very soon.

Stockholm, January 10, O. S. The King of Sweden conferred, a few Days ago, on the Prince Royal, the Command of the Regiment of Horse which was late General Lowenhaupt's.

Vienna, Jan. 22. General Brown and Count Richcourt set out this Week, or the Beginning of next, the one for Prince Lobcowitz's Army, the other for the Court of Turin.

Vienna, Jan. 25. Count Altham, the Ambassador Extraordinary from the Great Master of Malta, has made his Publick Entry into this City.

Hamburg, Jan. 31. The Danish Officers, according to the latest Letters from Copenhagen, have obtained Leave to dispose of their Field Equipages.

Liege, Jan. 31. The French enlist a great Number of Recruits here; and it is reported that Six Troops of Dragoons will soon be raised in this Country for the Emperor.
