**M**AY it please your Majesty to accept our humble and hearty Congratulations on your safe Return from Abroad, after the Dangers and Fatigues to which you was pleased to expose your sacred Person, in Defence of the Liberty of Europe, and in Support of the true Interest of these Kingdom. Next to the Hand of Providence, we ought to ascribe the Defeat of our Enemies at Dettingen to that intrepid Spirit which your Majesty's Presence infused into your Forces, and to that Terror which the long Experience of your Courage and Conduct struck into your Foes. We are therefore obliged, after returning our devout Thanks to Heaven, to express the sincerest Gratitude to your Majesty for a Victory so glorious to yourself, and so beneficial in its Consequences, not only to your own Subjects, but also to every neighbouring Nation that has the Cause of Freedom and Justice at Heart.
