The following Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgefles of the Corporation of Tenby, has been prefented to his Majesty by William Owen, Efq; (one of the Representatives in Parliament for the Town of Pembroke) accompanied by Alexander Elliot, Efq; Mayor of the Corporation of Tenby, and two of their Common Council, who were introduced by his Grace the Duke of Mancrefter, one of the Lords of his Majefty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting : Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very gracioully.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgefles of your Majefty's ancient and loyal Corporation of Tenby, in the County of Pembroke.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's said most dutiful and loyal Subjects, having heard, with equal Indignation and Surprize, of a projected Invafion of these Kingdoms in Favour of a popilh Pretender to your Majefty's Throne and Do-minions, most humbly beg Leave to represent to your Majesty, our just Abhorrence of so da-ring and infolent an Attempt; and, upon this Occafion, to tender to your Majefty the ftrongoff Affurances of our inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's most facred Person and Government.

We enjoy, under your Majefty's most auspicious Reign, every Bleffing, under Heaven, that can be defired by a great and a free People. Our Arms have been crowned with Success abroad, and we enjoy the Happinels of Civil and Reli-gious Liberties at home. No Wonder then gious Liberties at home. that a Nation, under these Circumstances, has long been the Envy of a neighbouring Kingdom, whole conftant Policy has been to enflave, as your Majefty's Endeavours have always been used to protect and defend Mankind.

In this glorious Caufe, your Majefty's Defigns

reign Nations, as well as ourfelves, now reap the Benefit of your wife and well-executed Counfels, directed to the Support of the general Liberty of Mankind : It is therefore affonishing, that any of your Majesty's Subjects should labour under such a desperate Infatuation, as to give up and betray the Honour and Glory of these Kingdoms, in Exchange for Tyranny and arbitrary Power, the natural Confequences of popifh Bigotry and Superflition.

We depend, under God, upon your Ma-jefty's known Courage and Wifdom, to defeat the Defigns of these restless and implacable Enemies to our most happy Constitution ; a Conflitution fecured and transmitted down to us by the Blood and Treafure of our Anceftors, and now flourishing in its full Vigour, under your Majefty's Defence and Protection,

We therefore, as true Britons and Chriftians, shall, to the utmost of our Power, defend your Majesty's undoubted Right to the Crown of these Kingdoms, against all Enemies whatfoever, and shall always confider the Continuance thereof in your Royal Line, as infeparable from our prefent and future Happinefs.

We are determined, at the Expence of our Lives and Fortunes, and every Thing that is dear to us, to support your Majesty, frustrate fuch wicked Defigns, and refent the Injury offered to your Majefty and this Nation; not doubting, if France shall, in Support of her wicked Views, ever dare to measure Strength with you again, that fhe will always feel the Weight of your Arm, and be cloathed with bave hitherto met with the defired Success : Fo- Shame, as the was at the late Battle of Dettin-
