We entirely confide in your Majefy's eminent Wildom, for the carrying on the juft and neceffary War the Nation is engaged in, and that has been fo injurioufly begun by the French King : And hope, that as our Enemies are not to be convinced by the Juftice of your Majefty's Conduct, the Terror and Succefs of your Arms, and those of our Allies, (under the Bleffing of God) will prevail, to the obtaining of fuch a Peace, as will be a lafting Security to your own Quiet and Repole, to the Protestant Succeffion in these Kingdoms, and the Trade and Liberties of Europe.

We affure your Majefty that, whether in Peace or in War, we fhall be always ready, with our Lives and Fortunes, to fupport your Majefty against all the Enemies of your Person and Government, which we fhall ever detest as Enemies to our Country.

May Providence direct your wife Councils and pious Enneavours, that all Things may happily confpire to compleat the Luftre of your Majefty's Reign, and the Glory of the British Nation.

There is News here of the actu l Poll flion of Nice by the Spa-There is News niards and the French; but, as it would be fome Time before the Arrival of their Artillery, we are not to expect to hear of their Attempts against the Intrenchments of the Piemontese these ten or twelve Days. The Spanish Troops are said to amount to no more than 17 or 18,000 Men, and the French only to feven or eight hundred. The Troops in Bavaria are in Motion, and the News we had had of Marshal Traun's being ill at Munich, is not The Emperor's Troops are to be postverified. ed at Philipsburg, and are fuppofed not to exceed 15,000 Men.

Roermunde, April 21, N.S. This Day two Squadrons of Hanoverian Horfe, of the Regiment of Schée, passed the Maeze at this Place, in their March to Flanders, and will be immediately followed by two other Squadrons of the Regment of Vreden. Amsterdam, April 28, N. S. We hear from Riga and Narva, that those Towns have fuffered inexpressible Damages by the late fudden Inundations that have happened in those Parts, and particularly in their Magazines of all Sorts of Naval Stores.

Hague, April 28, N. S. By Letters from Pa-ris there is Advice, that M. de Court was returned into Toulon Harbour without any Spanish Ships, and that Admiral Matthews had taken up his old Station off of the Islands of Hyeres. Other Letters mention, an Embarkation of 2000 Men for Monaco, having been forced by fome of his Britannick Majefty's Frigates, cruizing off Villa Franca, into St. Tropez, but add, that the Spaniards having made themfelves Mafters of a Poft called Sofpello, and of another Defile, were preparing every thing for attacking the King of Sardinia's Intrenchments upon the 14th Instant, fo that News from these Parts is expected here with the greatest Impatience. The same Letters add, that the French King was preparing to fet out immediately for his Army in Flanders. Letters from Madrid mention the King of Spain's being very much indifpofed. It is also written from Paris, that the Refolution was taken there to declare War immediately against the Queen of Hungary. M. Fenelon fet out from hence Yesterday for the Army by the Way of Liege.
