Discovery of an intended Invasion of your Majesty's Dominions; an Invasion insolently projected, at the same Time to impose a popish Pretender on a Protestant People, and to over-

throw the Liberty of all Europe.

We should be altogether unworthy of the invaluable Bleffings which were restored to our Ancestors by the glorious Revolution, brought about by the Wisdom and Courage of that blessed Instrument of Providence King William of immortal Memory, and which were confirmed to us by the Accession of your illustrious and Royal Family to the Government of these Kingdoms, if we did not lay hold of every Opportunity to express our Abhorrence of Attempts made in Favour of a popish outlawed Pretender, whose Success we are truly sensible must be our Destruction; fince all our Religious and Civil Rights depend on the Continuance of your Majesty's Government over us; and our best Hopes for our Posterity center in an Expectation of their being governed to the End of Time, by Kings descended from your Majesty.

We therefore befeech your Majesty to accept of our most solemn and unseigned Assurances, that we will at all Times be ready to facrifice our Lives and Fortunes in Defence of your Majesty's lawful and rightful Title to the Crown of these Realms: And that we will for ever, with our utmost Power, oppose the Pretender and all his Adherents, and all other your Majesty's Enemies, Foreign and Domestick; and thereby endeavour to secure to our Posterity, an Assurance of being a free, flourishing and happy People, as we are, under your Majesty's

auspicious Government.

The following Address of the High Sherist, Grand Jury, Juffices of the Peace, and Freeholders of the County of Waterford, having been transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has by him been presented to his Majesty: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and Freeholders of the County of Waterford, at an Affizes held in and for the faid County, the Thirty first Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and forty four, take Leave to approach your facred Person, and to express our Detestation and Abhorrence of the late infolent Design, carried on by a Nation, notoriously perfidious, in Favour of a popish Pretender.

Your Majesty's Protestant Subjects of this Ningdom have deeply felt the fatal Effects of Popery, and (under God) confider your Majefty as the Guardian of their Holy Religion.

The Mildness of your Majefty's just Admi-

nistration is a Security for their civil Rights;

and they are truly fensible, that the Preservation of both depends on your Majesty, and on the Succession in your illustrious House.

Tho' we have the strongest Assurances of Success, in the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, and in the Force of your Arms, yet we resolve to exert our utmost Power to keep out that Destroyer, Popery; and to support your Majesty's undoubted Title to the Crown of this Realm, against all foreign Enemies, or inmate Foes.
