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Petersbourg, April 14.

THE Day before Yesterday the Right Hon. the Lord Tyrawley, Ambassador Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Great Britain to the Empress of Russia, arrived here. Five and twenty Werst from Town his Excellency was met by an Officer sent by the Governor Prince Repnin, to conduct him to a Palace prepared for his Reception here by her Imperial Majesty's Order. The Gentlemen of the British Factory met his Excellency, in a Body, about twelve Werst from Town. Upon his Arrival, the Ambassador received Visits of Congratulation from the Governor Prince Repnin, the High Admiral Count Gollwin, and the other Officers and Persons of Distinction here. His Excellency proposes setting forward for Moscow in a few Days.

Lisbon, April 21. Count Harrach having finished his Commission from the Queen of Hungary to this Court, returns to England with this Packet-Boat.

Florence, April 28. An Express arrived here two Days ago from Prince Lobkowitz, with Notice to General Braitwitz, that he has received Orders from Vienna, by the Return of Count Colorado, to march into the Kingdom of Naples, for which he was making Preparations. By all Accounts, every Thing is in great Agitation in that Kingdom. The King of Naples has fixed his Head Quarters at Venatro, and has with him many of his principal Subjects, being distrustful of their Behaviour. The greatest Part of the Garrisons of Orbitello, and the Presidii of Tuscany, has been removed from thence to Gaeta. Eight large Transports, with Troops on board, passed by Civita Vecchia on the 21st Instant, and it is generally believed, that the Queen of Naples will retire from Gaeta to Rome. A very rich French Ship from Leghorn, laden with Silk and other Effects, amounting to a great Value, was lately taken by an English Man of War; and the Apprehension of Admiral Mathews's Squadron is so great, that the Trade of France with Italy is quite at a Stop.

Extract of a Letter from Munich, April 29.

The Queen's Army is in full March for the Rhine in five Columns; The First (which is already at Rain) is commanded by Felt Marshal Count Traun, the Second by General Hohenems, the Third by General Bernes, the Fourth by Count Leopold Daun, and the Fifth by Count Grime. They reckon to be all, the 17th of next Month, on the Necker. The Bavarian Army is at Philipsbourg. An Officer arrived from Hailbron met their Artillery composed of 10 Cannon three Pounders, 19 five Pounders, and 15 small Mortars. They were drawn by 360 Horses, and the Train of 280 Men, 100 of the Regiment of Royal Bavaria escorted them to Philipsbourg, where the French have a Bridge. The

Regiments of Seckendorf and Minuzi have taken Possession of that Fortres; the French are on the other Side: They left an Intendant with a Magazine of Flower, and Oats and Hay for the Subsistence of the rest of the Bavarian Corps, which are to arrive the 26th, and are to incamp with their Right supported by the Fortres, the Left extending to Reinhausen, having in their Front some Ditches and Morasses, and on their Left a little Wood, and the Rhine at their Back. The French are forming a Line, at which 5000 Men are at Work, from Landau to Philipsbourg: They fortify also Rheinhausen, round which they are digging a Canal, which the Rhine will fill.

Stockholm, May 1, O. S. Count Tessin was to set out Yesterday Evening, or this Morning, on his Ambassy to the Court of Berlin.

Dantzic, May 6. A Captain of General Fleming's Regiment, lately come from Kamini-eck, says, that General Lowendahl's Officers had been so successful in the upper Parts of Poland, as to have got together about 600 Men; but that the Crown General having Advice thereof, sent some Companies of Light Horse, who dispersed them. We hear that Count Maurice of Saxony having employed a Lieutenant Colonel, and advanced him 50,000 Dollars, to buy up Horses in Poland, Orders had been given to apprehend him, and that he was thereupon fled to the Borders of Hungary.

Vienna, May 13, N. S. The Queen of Hungary's Birth day was celebrated Yesterday with great Magnificence. Letters from Florence advise, that several of the French Levant Ships have been taken by his Majesty's Men of War: Other Letters from Italy suppose, that Prince Lobkowitz will have been, as on the 7th Instant,

at Fuligno, in the Way to San Germano, with the greatest Part of his Force, while General Brown, with a Body of about 8000 Men, remains upon the Tronto to observe the Spaniards. It is added, that a Body of Horse and Hussars, under the Command of Count Altham, has actually passed that River, in order to found the Inhabitants, and to disperse Manifestos. The Loss of the Piemontese, in the late Action near Villafranca, is said to be only about 1500 Men, and that of the Enemy between six and seven Thousand. M. Vincent, the French Secretary, has been ordered away from this Court. Twelve Neapolitan Tartans, laden with Corn, and designed for the Spanish Army, all passed, as is said, by Pescara, and are arrived at Fiume to deliver their Cargo for the Service of this Court.

Vienna, May 13, N. S. Copy of a Letter from a Spanish Officer at Nice, dated the 20th of April 1744.

The French and the Spaniards attacked the Intrenchments of the Piemontese with great Vigour, as also their Camp. The Fire lasted twelve Hours without Intermision. It was not so much a Battle as a downright Slaughter. We have taken from the Piemontese seven Colours, 50 Officers and 650 common Men. The whole Second Battalion of Fusileers were taken Prisoners. The Marquis de Suze was taken Prisoner this Day at Nine o'Clock. On our Side we have lost about 6000 common Men, killed and wounded, besides many Persons of Distinction killed. M. de Berwick, Colonel of the Regiment of Asturias, was wounded dangerously. Seven Colonels, Spanish and French, were killed. I repeat it, that it was not a Battle so much as a downright Butchery. We must have been very unfortunate (as we indeed were) not to have been able to beat about 5000 Men with 20,000, which we had upon that Service. Admiral Mathews's Fleet is at Anchor before this Town, which will render our Passage into Italy very difficult. There never was a Battle fought with so much Intrepidity on both Sides. Just now, at Twelve o'Clock, the Firing is ceased.

Vienna, May 13, N. S. Copy of a Letter from a French Officer at Nice, the 22d of April.

In the Night of the 19th we attacked the Intrenchments of Montalban, in six Lines with Ladders; without Doubt we should have carried them, if the Spaniards had supported us; but the greatest Part of them threw themselves flat upon the Ground, or minded nothing but stripping the dead Bodies, when they ought to have been supporting us. Twice we were at the very Top of their Intrenchments. We had even made ourselves Masters of two Batteries of Cannon; but we were obliged to abandon them, and to retire with the Loss of 400 Men killed, and as many wounded, besides two Companies of our Grenadiers made Prisoners. The Action lasted from One o'Clock after Midnight, till Eleven in the Morning. The Enemy defended themselves extremely well; but they had a good Game to play on Account of their Position and their formidable Intrenchments. Nevertheless it is said we shall take our Revenge this Night or the following. We have taken the Marquis de Suze Prisoner, with three Battalions reduced to 900 Men, and nine Colours. The Spaniards lost fewer Men than we on Account of their Cowardice; however some of their Regiments behaved very well.

Copenhagen, May 16, N. S. Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Denmark, removed into the Country on the 13th Instant.

They were to spend two or three Days with the Court at Hericholm, and to assist as Yesterday at the Opening of a new Palace or Pleasure-house, lately built by the Queen on the Sea Side near Ronstedt: After which, they are to take up their Summer's Residence at Jagerispreis.

Hague, May 19, N. S. The States have received this Morning an Account from M. Twickle, of his first Audience of the French King on the 16th Instant, at his Head Quarters in a Village called Cisoigne, between Lille and Tournay, and of that Prince's Answer, which was, as we hear, to the following Purport; "That the States Choice of M. Twickle was perfectly agreeable to him, on Account of his Knowledge of that Gentleman's personal Qualities: — That he had always endeavoured to convince the States of his Friendship for them, and of his Love of Peace: — That he had declined declaring War as long as possible, and could therefore now the less suspend pushing it effectually: That M. Twickle might open himself upon his particular Commission to his Ministers, who would make him a Report thereof, and acquaint M. Twickle with the Determination, which, after having consulted with his Allies, he should think fit to take upon it." The same Day the French Army entered the Queen of Hungary's Territories, and began the Operations by dislodging a small Detachment of the Garrison of Ypres from a Post called Warneton, and possessing itself of Harebeck and Courtray. By the last Letters from Paris we hear, that an Officer was arrived there from the Prince de Conti, with the News of the Surrender of the Citadel of Villafranca, and the Castle of Montalban.

Hague, May 22, N. S. The Flemish Post that came in this Morning, brought no other certain News from that Frontier, but those of a small Detachment's being sent, under Lieutenant-General Campbell's Command, to Ghent, and of the Motion of such of the Dutch and Austrian Troops as were at Braine le Comte, to Halle, in their Way to join Field Marshal Wade at Asch, where he lay encamped Yesterday. Duke d'Artemberg having thrown three Austrian Battalions into Mons, Count Maurice has drawn out five Dutch ones, and added a sixth from Aeth. The Flemish Post brought no Letters from the French Army, or Frontier, nor even from Menin, which gives Suspensions of the French having detained them, and invested that Place.

of Ireland, void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God Dr. Henry Maule, late Bishop thereof, to the Bishoprick of Meath.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Reverend Patrick Delany, Doctor in Divinity, the Place and Dignity of Dean of the Cathedral Church of Down, in the Kingdom of Ireland, vacant by the Promotion of Dr. Thomas Fletcher, late Dean thereof, to the Bishoprick of Dro-more.

Whitehall, May 15.

Yesterday Morning his Grace the Duke of Montagu went, by the King's Order, to see the Swiss Battalion assembled at the Riding House belonging to the Horse Grenadier Guards, near Cavendish Square, and thank'd them, in the King's Name, for the Zeal they had shewn for his Majesty's Person and Government, on Occasion of the late intended Invasion, and at the same Time releas'd them from the military Oath they had taken to his Majesty, there being at present no Appearance of any Danger.

His Majesty's Ship the Dreadnought and Grampus Sloop arrived the 12th Instant at Spit-head, having taken and brought in thither a French Man of War called the Medea, of 26 Guns, and 240 Men, commanded by the Chevalier Hoquart. She failed from Brest the 24th of April, and falling in with Sir Charles Hardy's Squadron on the 27th, about 60 Leagues South West of the Lizard, was taken the 29th, after a Chace of 50 Hours.

Whereas it has been represented to his Majesty, That James Phillips, a Boatman in the Service of his Majesty's Customs, in the Port of Cardigan, South Wales, with several others his Assistants, did, on the 4th of April last, board a Smuggling Sloop, then lying in Cardigan Bay, of which Sloop William Owen (late of the Town of Cardigan, Mariner, but now an Inhabitant of the Isle of Man) was Commander, when the said William Owen fired off a Gun, or Musket, at the said James Phillips, and killed him on the Spot; and several Persons unknown, on board the said Sloop, discharged other Guns, whereby John Hughes, late of the Town of Cardigan, Sadler, and another of the Persons who went to the Assistance of the said James Phillips, were killed: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons who committed the said Murders, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any of them, who were on board the said Owen's Sloop, (except the Persons who actually committed the said Murders, or either of them) who shall discover his Accomplice, or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and War-rant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Cha-

riety, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st Day of May next: This is to give Notice thereof, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, by the 31st of next Month, the Affidavit required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.

Whereas it is the Intention and express Meaning of the Act now in Force, for the speedy and effectual recruiting his Majesty's Land Forces and Marines, that those Regiments should be the sooner compleated with able bodied Men, and such, as from their Age, Size and Strength, were fit to serve his Majesty and the Country as Soldiers;

Nevertheless several Colonels, and commanding Officers of Regiments, having represented to the Field-Marshal Earl of Stair, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Forces in South Britain, that the Commissioners, at some of their Meetings for putting that Act in Execution (mistaking the true Meaning and Intention of it) have insisted on Officers taking Men, that appeared, on Account of their Age, Size, and Infirmities, unfit for the Service, particularly at St. Alban's, where Colonel Cholmondeley, after a strict Inspection and Examination, in which he was attended and assisted by two Surgeons, discharged Six and thirty Men, turned over by the Commissioners, being absolutely unfit for the Service; the insisting such Men being an Evil, that if not immediately stop'd, must prove highly detrimental to his Majesty's Service, my Lord Stair finds it therefore absolutely necessary to order, and does hereby order the Officers employ'd in Recruiting, to refuse to accept of any Boy that is too weak to carry Arms, or Man turned over Forty Years, unless he is strong, active, and other Ways, fit for his Majesty's Service. They are likewise to refuse any Press Man for the Marines that does not measure full Five Foot four Inches high, or upwards.

And whereas the Regiments at Gibraltar, Minorca, the West Indies, and also those of Marines, are already near compleated, his Lordship orders, that in such Places where there are no Officers belonging to the Corps above-mentioned, attending the Meetings of the Commissioners, that the Officers of the other Corps employed in Recruiting, or inspecting Recruits, are not, for the future, to receive any Men, but what are Five Foot five Inches high, or upwards, and fit for the Regiments of Foot now in Great Britain.

Whatever extraordinary Expences may arise from subsisting the Men received, or other Incidents, the Field Officers, in their several Districts, are (notwithstanding any former Order) to grant Bills on the Agent of the Regiment of Foot or Marines to which they belong, who has Orders to pay the same.

His Lordship not doubting but every Commissioner for executing the Act now in Force for the speedy and effectual recruiting his Majesty's Land Forces and Marines, acting with Zeal for the Publick Service, will co-operate with the Officers employed in Recruiting, in such a Manner, that the Corps may be not only speedily, but also effectually recruited, with Men fit for the Service, according to the true Meaning and Intention of the Act.

His Lordship also gives this publick Assurance to the Commissioners, that he has ordered all the Officers who were appointed to recruit, and who were as many as could be spared from other Services, to attend their Meetings, as regularly and constantly as the Nature and Circumstances of the Service will at present admit of.
