Boats: The Baron was the first to leap into them, and so encouraged his Soldiers, that without losing a single Man, and without finding any Resistance, he gain'd the opposite Shore of the *Rhine*. The Militia of *Karelstadt*, and the Waradins, with 40 Hussars Vountcers, followed the Pandours with the like Success, under the Command of Major Count *de Strasoldo*.

General *Nadaſti* having given his Serene Highness Information thereof, with an Assurance that he believed he might depend upon the entire Execution of the Passage, and that he hoped to finish the Bridge very soon, having set People to work at it with all the Diligence possible, the Prince gave immediate Orders for the Troops that were posted from *Neudorff* to *Stockſtadt*, to advance, with all the Expedition possible, towards *Schreck*, to support the Attempt.

Whilst the Pandours and the other Militia were passing the *Rhine*, General *Nadaſti's* People had work'd with so much Success at the Bridge, that it was finished much sooner than was expected, and Yesterday, about Eleven in the Morning, the Troops under this General, consisting of about 6000 Men, had all passed over without the least Accident. The Regular Troops, which were encamped between *Roth* and *Reittingen*, under the Command of the Prince of *Waldeck*, at the same Time made so much Haste, that they arrived at *Schreck* before Eleven at Night, and without stopping, they filed off directly over the Bridge.

As soon as Lieutenant-Colonel Baron *Trenk* had landed his Men, he immediately push'd the advanced Posts of the Enemy with so much Vigour, that he pursued them to their Camp, which was half a League from the *Rhine*, where, having immediately attacked three Regiments of *Bavarian* Cavalry, viz. the Horse Grenadiers, the Prince of *Taxis's* Regiment, and the Regiment of *Ottingen*, he put them in like Manner to Flight, after having dislodged them from two Redouts and one Intrenchment. A great Number of the Enemy were killed and wounded, and the Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of Horse-Grenadiers, with 37 Troopers, were made Prisoners. They so little expected this sudden Attack, that without having Time to strike their Tents, they were forced to abandon their Camp to the Pandours, who pillaged it.

As soon as his Highness heard of this Advantage, he gave Orders for throwing another Bridge over the *Rhine* at *Schreck* immediately, and having marched with the whole Army upon the first of this Month at Night from *Ladenbourg*, he arrived with it here Yesterday about Nine o'Clock in the Morning, where he caused the Regiments to file off together over the first Bridge. The Second was finished about Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, partly by the Help of 13 Boats which were taken the Day before from the *French*.

In the mean while, his Serene Highness received Advice Yesterday Night from General *Bernclau*, that, notwithstanding some Opposition made by the Enemy, he had also succeeded in his Attempt to pass the *Rhine* upon the First of this Month at Night with his whole Corps below *Stockſtadt*, near *Weissenau*, Part in Barks, and Part over the two Bridges which he had caused to be laid there. The Enemy were repulsed there with so much Courage, that they
not

not only took to Flight, but abandoned the Town of *Oppenheim*, with the Loss of a great many Magazines, in order to get to *Worms*, towards which Place, according to later Advice, he is pursuing them with so much Diligence, that he has already driven them to the Neighbourhood of it.

Whilst General *Bernclau* was executing the Passage, the General Count *de Daun* being posted with all the Companies of Grenadiers, and 600 Militia of the *Theiss*, in the Island of *Maulber*, near *Stockstadt*, kept the Enemy at Bay by a continual Fire of Small Shot and Cannon, and by 13 little Barks which he had with him, without any other Loss than of two Grenadiers, and two of the Militia of the *Theiss* killed, and eleven others wounded.

This General having received Orders to repair hither in order to follow the Army, which is on the other Side of the *Rhine*, and having thereupon marched himself, and all his Grenadiers, he is expected at *Schreck* To-morrow, having left the 600 Militia, under the Command of their Major, in the Island of *Maulber*, to guard the Bridge.

Although General *Nadaſti* had encamped with his Hussars very advantageously on the other Side the *Rhine* near *Leimerſheim*, having placed the Pandours and other irregular Troops in a more advanced Post in a neighbouring Wood, in order to get near to, and fall upon the *Bavarian* Infantry, which is behind this Wood in a Camp intrenched amongst the Marshes, nevertheless, upon Advice that the Lines of *Lauterbourg* were but weakly provided, his Highness thought proper to order this General to march with the Hussars, Pandours, and other irregular Troops, reinforced with the *Hungarian* Regiments of *Forgatch* and *Joseph Esterhazy*, towards these Lines, in order to endeavour to make himself Master of them, whereof the Event is expected.

The hasty Departure of the Count *de Roſieres* did not allow Time to enter into all the Particulars, but they will be related hereafter in a Journal. In the mean while, the good Dispositions, the indefatigable Care, and the great Valour of General *Nadaſti*, cannot be sufficiently commended, for to him the happy Passage at *Schreck* is principally owing. Nor can too much be said in Praise of Lieutenant Colonel *Trenck*, who contributed extremely to this Passage of the *Rhine*, and the fixing of the Bridges, by the Prudence and Courage with which he led on his Pandours, and repulsed the Enemy.

His Serene Highness will put every Thing in Practice to make the best Use of this first Success, and to push on with Vigour the further Operations of the Campaign, and so much the more, as by his Position all Communication between the *French* Army and *Alsace* is entirely cut off.

Posts where the Troops of Her Majesty the Queen of Hungary and Bohemia were placed before the Passage of the Rhine.

1. General *Bernclau*, with the Vanguard on the Side of *Stockstadt* upon the *Rhine*, ten Leagues from *Ladenbourg*.

2. The

2. The Troops of Grenadiers under the Command of General *Daun*, at *Hain*, a League from *Stockstadt*.
3. The Corps under General *Bernes* above *Lorsche*, four Leagues from the said Grenadiers.
4. At *Upper Lambert*, General *Schulembourg* with the Right Wing of the first Line of Infantry, half a League from the said Corps under General *Bernes*.
5. At *Ladenbourg*, the Infantry of the Center, under the Command of General *Grume*, three Quarters of a League from General *Schulembourg's* Post.
6. In the same Camp near *Ladenbourg* were also the Regiments of Dragoons of *Saxe-Gotha*.
7. Under the Walls of *Ladenbourg* was Lieutenant-Colonel *de Feverstein* with a Part of the Artillery.
8. Beyond the *Neckar*, near the Bridge of Boats, the General Count *de Konigsegg*, with the Right Wing of the Infantry of the second Line.
9. Before the Corps of Count *de Konigsegg*, the General *de Philibert* with two Regiments of Cuirassiers of the Right Wing of the first Line.
10. At *Neckerau*, Baron *Trenck* with his Pandours.
11. At the Bridge of *Ketsch*, two Leagues from *Neckerau*, General *Balayra*, with two Regiments of Dragoons.
12. At *Reittingen* and *Roth*, the two Lines of the Left Wing, as well of the Infantry as of the Cavalry, with the Body of the second Line.
13. At half a League from *Reittingen*, near the Village of *Calabria*, called *Neulosen*, the General *St. Ignon*, with two Regiments of Dragoons of the *Corps de Reserve*.
14. A League on this Side, near *Waghausel*, the Regiment of Hussars of *Festitz*.
15. Near *Neudorff*, General *Nadasti*, with some Regiments of Hussars, and the *Waradin* Infantry.

Moscow, June 6.

The following is a Translation of a Rescript sent by her Imperial Majesty to her Ministers at Foreign Courts.

Although the Marquis *de la Chetardie*, Brigadier of the French Armies, having resided here till the present Time, as a private Person, and without any publick Character, does not consequently deserve that Regard which is due, according to the Law of Nations, to the Ministers of Crowned Heads, in the Courts of *Europe*; nevertheless her Imperial Majesty of all the *Russias*, hath ordered, that Mr. *N. N.* should be acquainted in a proper Manner, that the said Marquis, after his Return to the Imperial Court of *Russia*, instead of making suitable Returns to the Distinctions, which have been shown him heretofore, and till this present Time, (of which the Foreign Ministers have all been Eyewitnesses) and for which his Sentiments of Respect towards her Imperial Majesty, ought to have been redoubled, has so far forgot

got himself, (certainly without the Orders of the King his Master) as not only to endeavour to corrupt the Fidelity of many Persons, and of the Clergy, to form a Party to himself, and to overthrow the Ministry, but has also gone so far as to have written from hence many unworthy Things, which not only cannot be permitted any where, but which also cannot be submitted to by any Sovereign, as many of his Dispatches in Original, which this Court is in Possession of, do incontestably prove.

Her Imperial Majesty notwithstanding, according to her natural Magnanimity, would not proceed with him, the Marquis *de la Chetardie*, according to his Guilt, and after the Manner that his unexpected Behaviour deserved, and the Right it had given her over him; but generously forgetting her just Indignation, and that he is without any publick Character, and a private Person, hath ordered him to depart, without seeing any Body, in twenty-four Hours Time, from this Capital, and to quit the Empire as soon as possible.

As to the rest, her Imperial Majesty being persuaded, that it is without the Orders, and contrary to the Intensions of the King, that the Marquis *de la Chetardie* hath acted here in a Manner as rash as unusual for a Stranger, hath not any Intention to diminish, the least in the World, the Friendship which subsists between her and his Majesty the King of *France*, for the Fault which one of his Subjects hath committed; but, on the contrary, she will always take a Pleasure in cultivating that Friendship more and more.

Turin, June 20.

LAST Wednesday arrived a Messenger from *Garefio*, with Advice, that the *Spaniards* grew every Day stronger at *Oneglia*, *Diano*, and *Port Maurice*, having been join'd by 2500 *Spanish* Horse, which were incamp'd about *Oneglia*. They have suffer'd considerably in several Skirmishes upon the Mountains there, and are constantly harass'd by the Peasants of the Country.

On the 12th, 200 Miquelets and 300 Grenadiers, conducted by two *Genoese* Mountaineers, advanced under the Mill of *Grella*, to seize that Post, and to surprize a Body of Militia; but these last defended themselves so bravely, that after killing the two Guides and a great many of the Enemy, they repulsed and pursued them as far as *Ulcedo*.

The *Spaniards*, in order to have their Revenge, returned in greater Numbers, but were again repulsed with more Loss, having had 50 of their Company killed, and 200 wounded; whereas our Militia had only four killed, and eight wounded.

On Thursday arrived another Messenger from *Garefio*, with Advice, that the *Spaniards* seemed inclined to abandon *Oneglia*: And Yesterday Afternoon came in a Courier from *Savorgio*, with the News that they had actually abandon'd it, and were returning by the Road of *Nice*.

The same Courier added, that they had likewise abandon'd, with great Precipitation, *Dolce-Aqua*, *Peglia*, *Breglia*, and *Sospello*: This unexpected Revolution gives Cause to think, that the *Spaniards*, finding themselves too weak, have a Mind to rejoin the *French*, who are in *Dauphiné*, in order to the Execution of their

new Design of coming to attack us on the Sides of *Coni* and *Chateau Dauphin*.

This Morning we have farther Advice, that two *French* Battalions, who had joined the *Spaniards*, were hastening their March to pass the *Var* at the same Time.

Milan, June 21.

BY an extraordinary Courier arrived To-day from *Turin*, with a Letter from Marquis *d'Ormea* to General *Pallavicini*, we are informed of the Advantages gained over the *Spaniards* in their Retreat from *Oneglia*. The Marquis de *Sinsan*, Commander of six *Piedmontese* Battalions, who were at *Garesio* and at *Ormea*, and who was in March to take Possession of some Posts, hearing of the Retreat of the *Spaniards* from *Oneglia*, made forced Marches in Pursuit of them, and having come up with them, charged them with so much Bravery, that they finding themselves surprized, were soon put into Confusion; and 5000 Militia, who very opportunely guarded the *Piedmontese* Mountains along the Road thro' which the *Spaniards* were obliged to make their Retreat, having taken them in Flank, greatly increased their Disorder, so that being pursued by the Marquis de *Sinsan*, and taken in Flank by the Militia, the whole Body, composed of 12 Battalions, of one Regiment of Dragoons, and of a Battalion of Miquelets, was totally defeated, one Part having been killed, and the other taken, with the Baggage, and very few having the good Fortune to escape.

The *Piedmontese* have again enter'd *Oneglia* with their Booty, and are repossessing themselves of all the Posts in that Neighbourhood. The Enemy left in *Oneglia* and *Dolce-Aqua* 1800 Sacks of Flower, 400 Tents, 220 Barrils of Powder, and other Provisions and Ammunition. They have also abandoned at *Ulcedo* 237 of their Wounded.

Monday next the King will set out for *Demont* and *Exilles*. His heavy Baggage takes the Route of *Chateau-Dauphin*, and the Duke of *Savoy* will make two Months Campaign with the King.

Ten Thousand Militia, and a Brigade of Regular Troops, are going to join M. de *Corban*, who commands on the Side of *Savorgio*, in the County of *Nice*.
