Florence, July 7, N. S.

E hear from Rome, that M. de Gages having had Advice that Count Gorani was at Avenzano with a small Detachment; had sent 300 Horse to attack him, who being arrived at Corzoli, the Peasants in the Austrian Interest gave immediate Advice thereof to Count Gorani, and jointly with him fet upon the Spaniards and beat them, killing 40 Men, taking 24 Prisoners, and 40 Horses, with two Hussars Deserters, who were conducted to the Army of Prince Lobkowitz, who is erecting a Magazine at Tivoli, with Design, as is supposed, to send a strong Reinforcement to M. Gorani, in order to enable him to make farther Progresses in the

Berleghem Camp, July 7, O. S. Three of the British Regiments who lately landed at Oftend have joined our Army; and four of the Dutch Regiments from England, together with that of the Scotch Highlanders from Ostend, are expected here in two or three Days. The foremost of the Dutch Troops lately ordered by the States General to march hither from the Side of Bredah, are got to Aloft, and it is expected that they will join us foon. The Eneexpected that they will join us foon. The Enemy by the best Accounts are filing off towards Lisle, and it is thought will plant themselves behind their Garrisons, they having sent their battering Train that Way. It is reported here, that Prince Charles had made himself Master of the Head of the Bridge at Fort Louis of the Rhine, and had cut to Pieces a Body of 800 French.

Brussels, July 22, N. S. Two Days ago arrived here two Squadrons of Dutch Horse. Yesterday arrived a Regiment of Dragoons and the Regiment of Foot of Utrecht; and this Day three Squadrons of Linden's Horse are arrived, all in very good Order and well mounted. Within this Week fix Regiments of Foot have marched hence to join the Army, which is making Dispositions to pass the Schelde. We hear that the French are fending large Detachments to Alface from their Army in Flanders, and that the Remainder are intrenching themselves between Ypres and Menin.
