The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the Second Day of August next, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Twentieth Day of September next.

Moscow, June 14, O. S. The Empress returned hither from *Troitz* the 12th Instant in the Night.

Stockholm, June 26, O. S. General Keith is taking his Leave, and hopes to embark on board his Gallies, with all the Troops under his Command, towards the latter End of this Week. They go at first to *Hongoud* in *Finland*, and from thence propose to stretch over to *Revel*, *Riga*, &c.

Stockholm, June 29, O. S. The Russian Troops here are every where in Motion, but General Keith does not leave this Place till next Tuesday or Wednesday.

Stockholm, July 3, O. S. General Keith, Lieutenant General *Soltikoff*, and Major General *Lapuchin*, left this Place this Afternoon for *Ramansu*, nine Swedish Miles off, where is the General Rendezvous of the Muscovite Troops in this Kingdom; the Regiments quartered in the Inland Towns, who are on their March, will encamp there, till their Gallies, amounting in all to 30 whole Gallies, and 44 half Gallies, with the Remainder of the Troops, arrive at the above-mentioned Place, from whence they will proceed altogether on their Voyage to *Livonia*. His Swedish Majesty is expected back from his Progress to *Gottenbourg* some Time next Week.

Rome, July 4, N. S. Upon the 24th and 26th of last Month, ten or twelve Feluccas from *Naples* had the good Fortune to get into the Mouth of the little River *Baudino*, above *Terracina*, and to land some Provisions, of which the Neapolitan and Spanish Armies stood in great Need. It was not the Duke *Atrisco*, as was reported, but General *de la Vieuville*, who was detached upon the 24th of last Month with four or five thousand Men: He marched into *Abruzzo* to join Colonel *Vargas*, in order to stop Count *Soto's* Progress on that Side. It is certain that the Austrian Army does not ad-

vance, and Count *Gages* keeps firm and in good Order at *Velletri*. He is making great Works at *Sermeneta*, a Castle naturally strong, in the great Road to *Naples*, which commands the Defiles of *Sezze* and *Fondi*, and is not above two Posts from *Velletri*. To this Place it is thought he will retire, if he cannot maintain himself at *Velletri* for want of Provisions.

Turin, July 11, N. S. Admiral *Matthews* having received his new Supply of Cattle from hence, is actually under Sail towards the Coast of *Provence* with all the Ships. The said Admiral has detached Capt. *Long*, with three Fifty Gun Ships more, and the three Bomb Ketches, towards the *Roman* and *Neapolitan* Coast. Affairs on this Side seem to be drawing to a Crisis, the French having already appeared on *Mount Genevre*, and a Van-guard of nine or ten Battalions being come down and advanced to *Sezano* and *Oula*, while other Troops are marching thither, and Preparations making to bring over their Artillery, in order, as is not doubted, to besiege *Exiles*, which the Advices from *Dauphiné* leave no room to question is their Intention.

Copenhagen, July 11, N. S. The three Frigats, which were lately fitted out here, set sail for the *Baltick* about the Beginning of this Week, in order to make a Proof of their Working, and to exercise the Cadets; but there is no Appearance of any farther Equipment. There is a Reduction making of the extraordinary Augmentation, which took Place upon the late Prospect of War, both of Horse and Foot, the Men taken from the national Regiments, are restored to their former Corps, and the Horses are put up to Sale.

Berlin, July 14, N. S. The Duke and Dutches of *Brunswick-Wolfenbuttle*, and the Margravine of *Onesbach*, are arrived here, to assist at the Ceremony of the Marriage of the Princess *Ulrick*, which is to be performed on Friday next the 17th Instant; and on the 25th her Royal Highness sets out with the Ambassador and his whole Train for *Stralsund*, where they are to embark for *Stockholm*. Count *Rosenberg* sets out this Evening or Tomorrow Morning for *Moscow*; And General *Lubras*, the Russian Minister to the Court of *Sweden*, went from hence two Days ago for *Hambourg* and *Copenhagen*, in his Way to *Stockholm*.

Frankfort, July 14, N. S. On the 12th arrived here Major General Bretlach, whom Prince Charles had sent with a Commission to the Elector of Mentz. He reports, that the Imperial and French Army abandoned Weissenburg again, the Day after they had made themselves Masters of it, and had posted themselves behind the Motter, two Leagues beyond Haguenau; that by the Dead found upon the Field of Battle, after the Action near Weissenburg, it appeared that they had lost about 3500 Men; and that a Letter from the Governor of Landau to Prince Charles, to desire a Passport for the Wounded, shews, that their Wounded, Part of whom they left at Weissenburg, having carried the other with them to Haguenau, amount to about the same Number: That the Austrian Detachment commanded by General Nadafti, consisting entirely of irregular Troops, had only lost 800 Men, and had about 300 wounded: That the said Detachment, after the French had abandoned Weissenburg, and were retired behind the Motter, as aforesaid, had possessed themselves of the Forest of Haguenau; but that the main Austrian Army being posted from Lauterbourg up the Rhine beyond Beinheim, and along the Lauter to beyond Weissenburg, the Enemy's Army is thereby cut off from all Communication with Landau and Fort Louis, and the Way into Lorraine lies entirely open to the Austrians. A few Days must shew, whether Prince Charles, who, according to Advices from his Army of the 11th Instant, was to break up from Lauterbourg the next Day, will take the Way of Lorraine, or go in Quest of the Enemies, who have begun to entrench themselves in a very advantageous Camp behind the Motter; and whether, in this latter Case, the Enemy will stand an Attack, considering their Army has been very much weakened, partly by the Detachments of 10 Battalions for reinforcing Landau, and of four others sent to Fort Louis, partly by the incredible Desertion, and partly by the great Losses they have sustained in the Action near Weissenburg, and on other Occasions. The Magistrates and civil Officers of Alsace repair from all Parts to the Austrian Army, to treat about the Contributions that have been demanded of the Country, where the Austrians, even their irregular Troops, if they meet with no Resistance, keep as strict Discipline as if they were not in an Enemy's Country. It is said, that in Fort Louis they want sufficient Provisions, and some are of Opinion, that if the Austrians are furnished with heavy Artillery, the said Place cannot hold out above ten Days after the Opening of the Trenches.

Vienna, July 15, N. S. M. de Morocz, Colonel Commandant of the Regiment of Hussars Ghylani, is arrived here with the Particulars of what passed between the French and Austrian Armies at Lauterbourg and Weissenbourg. He brought with him the Kettle Drums, Standards, and Pair of Colours, taken by our Army, which, as the Hungarians had the chief Share in the Actions, the Queen has commanded to be sent to Presburg, into which

Place the Officer is ordered to make the same Entry, preceded by Postillions, as he did here.

Rheinhausen, July 18. Prince Charles of Lorraine's Head Quarters were the Day before Yesterday at Drumbach, a Village about three Leagues above Lauterbourg, in the Neighbourhood of Fort Louis. Eight Hundred French, who had marched out of that Place upon the 13th, in order to surprize General Nadafti, who was busy in reconnoitring, were themselves surprized by the said General; for he being advised in Time of their Design, sent to the Prince for a speedy and sufficient Succour, in which he succeeded so well, that he took the 800 Men between to Fires, and put them all to the Sword. Besides this Advantage, the General is now in a Condition to make himself Master of the outward Fortifications, and the Head of the Bridge of Fort Louis, the Garrison by the Loss of these 800 Men being much weakened. They are now endeavouring to carry the Place itself, and from Two o' Clock in the Afternoon of Yesterday, great Firing of Cannon has been heard without Intermision till two Hours after Midnight. Thirteen Thousand French are arrived at Landau, with an Intention to join the Army of the Marshal de Coigny, but not being able to effect this Junction as yet, they remain under the Cannon of Landau. It is affirmed that the Austrians have made themselves Masters of the Lines of Haguenau, but the Circumstances are not mentioned. Twenty four Thousand Austrians are in March through Franconia and Suabia to join the Army of Prince Charles. Those in Franconia, to the Number of 12000, had already, upon the 14th, got as far as the Neighbourhood of Wurthbourg. Upon the Junction of all these Troops, the Army of Prince Charles will amount at least to 100,000 Men.

Oudenarde, July 17, N. S. The French have been busy from Three o'Clock this Morning to Seven, in detaching 10,000 Men to the Rhine; To-morrow a like Detachment is to be made, which is to be followed the Day after by another; they consist of Horse as well as Foot. The French King's Household Troops arrived at the Camp at Harlebeck this Day. They are encamped a Quarter of a League beyond the River. The Carabineers make the Left on the Side of Harlebeck. All the Regiments cast Lots which are to march to the Rhine. The Army which was encamped on this Side in two Lines, is to decamp To-morrow the 18th, and to repass the River Lys, in order to encamp beyond it. Their Camp will reach from Harlebeck to Courtrai. The French King is to be at Courtrai To-morrow or on Sunday, and great Preparations are making to receive him. The Remainder of the Troops employed in the Siege of Furnes, marched from thence on the 16th, and arrived the next Day in the Neighbourhood of Courtrai. Major General Guy's Regiment is expected to arrive here this Day, and the Day after To-morrow Major General Kinschot's and D'Eliars's Regiments are expected. The whole Reinforcement, which is c

ing up will incamp here by the Town, very near in a Line with the rest of the Army.

Oudenarde, July 18. Yesterday Morning the Corps of Troops, which was encamped at Heule, and consisted of 15000 Men, marched to reinforce the Army under Marshal Coigny; and Orders were given Yesterday Night to another Corps of 15000 Men from the Army of the Count de Saxe, to set out this Morning for Alsace. Yesterday in the Afternoon at Four o'Clock, all the Artillery and Warlike Stores belonging to Count Saxe's Army were conducted into the Town of Courtrai.

Oudenarde, July 25. By Letters from Lille of the 19th, there is an Account, that the French King, who was to leave Dunkirk that Day, was to go into Alsace; that Part of his Equipage was set out; that his Apartments at Lille were unfurnished, and that he would go directly from Dunkirk to Rheims, in order to avoid the Austrian Hussars, and to join Marshal Coigny.

Berlegem Camp, July 24, N. S. A Lieutenant of our Hussars attacked Yesterday the grand Guard the French have on this Side of the Lys, within 200 Paces of the Swiss Regiment of La Cour au Chartre, and brought off the Captain that commanded it; they were 40 Hussars, and the Enemy's grand Guard consisted of 60 Dragoons. The Captain was wounded in three Places.

Brussels, July 20. The French are busy in fortifying Courtrai, and have 4000 Men at Work in forming Lines in the Neighbourhood of Menin. M. de Wassenauer passed through Ghent on his Way to the French Camp three Days ago.

Brussels, July 23, N. S. The Dutch Regiments of Smillart, Broeckhuysen, Van Dorth, Buddenbroeck, Kinschott, Bentinck, Elias, and Guy, with three Squadrons of Sandouville, three of Linden, and one of Hesse Hombourg, are marched through this Place to the Army, and will be immediately followed by other Troops, to the Number of 12550, the last of which will arrive here the 28th Instant, N. S. and on the 25th their Train of Artillery, Pontons, and Ammunition, with a Detachment of Gunners, will begin to march from Bredah, under a strong Escorte, for Antwerp and Brussels. It is said here, that the Troops under the Command of the Duke de Harcourt are to replace those under Marshal Belleisle upon the Upper Maeze, who is to march into Alsace with 15000 Men; that the French King is gone to Compeigne, from whence it is thought he will go to Metz. That all the Household Troops, and as many more as will make up the Number of 30000 Men, are detached from the Duke de Noailles's Army towards the Rhine. That the Count de Saxe, with the Remainder, is intrenching himself behind the new Lines which they have formed behind Menin and Ypres; and that General Bathiani is upon his March from Bavaria with 24000 Men, and the Train of heavy Artillery, to join Prince Charles.

Hague, July 21, N. S. There are good Letters from Ratisbon, which assure, that a Body of Austrian Troops, to the Number of 20000 Men, or upwards, has been detached for the Rhine from the Upper Palatinate; and others from Francfort mention such a Corps to be already arrived upon the Neckar. The late Rejoycings in the Netherlands, on Account of Prince Charles's Passage of the Rhine, have occasioned a Misfortune at Charleroy, where the Magazine of Powder, through the Carelessness, as is supposed, of some of the Gunners employed in loading Cartridges, blew up, and has done considerable Mischief both to the Inhabitants and Buildings of that Town.

Hague, July 24, N. S. The French King's Resolution of repairing in Person, attended by M. Noailles, and a Detachment from the Netherlands of near 30000 Men, to the Relief of Alsace, is confirmed from Dunkirk and other Places. The several Corps of which this Detachment is to be composed, are said to have been in Motion ever since the 20th Instant, and the French King himself is supposed to have set forwards as this Day from Arras for Metz, where he proposes to arrive by the 5th of next Month. We have no News of Prince Charles's Operations since the 13th Instant, but by Way of Francfort, which mention the French being driven from behind the Motter to Brumpt, within two Leagues of Strasbourg, and a considerable Corps of Austrians having invested Fort Louis, and entirely cut off 600 Men who had made a Sally out of that Garrison. Marshal Belleisle's Corps is said to be in March for Alsace, under the Command of his Brother, the Marshal being so ill that he cannot sit on Horseback.
