*Oporto, June 28, N. S.*

**A**N English Privateer, called the Triumph, commanded by Capt. Coke, brought into this River a small Spanish Privateer, of four Carriage Guns and fifty Men, and the Vessel that sailed last from Ferrol for the Havanna with Guns and other Stores, which she took after a small Engagement, attended with no Loss:

*Rome, July 4.* On the 28th past, (the Eve of St. Peter's Festival) the Constable of Colonna, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Naples, presented to the Pope, at the Vatican, the White Horse and Cedula, the usual Tribute for the Kingdom of Naples. We have Advice this Week that the Sickness is again broke out at Reggio and in the Suburbs, and that from the 5th to the 11th of June; about 22 Persons died of it, and 19 were sent to the Lazzaretto.

*Florence, July 7.* Both the Spanish and Austrian Armies still remain in the same Situation; though it is judged by many Circumstances, that the former will soon decamp from Velletri to Sermonetta, a small Distance from thence. 500 Men have lately been sent there to guard the Entrenchments that have been marked out for a new Camp. The Motive for this Resolution is supposed to be the great Difficulty to get Water; on which Account the Troops are extremely sickly, and the Desertion greatly increased; the Horse particularly suffer very much in that dry Soil; great Numbers have died, and others are rendered unfit for Service. The Austrian Troops are likewise in a bad Situation, on Account of the Inconveniencies which the great Heats produce. The small Detachments which Prince Lobcowitz had sent to Abruzzo, under Mr. Sora and Gorani, have; on the Approach of a Body of the Enemy's Troops, been forced to abandon the City of Aquila; and when the Neapolitan Troops entered therein, it is asserted, that the Commander of them immediately ordered the Hand of the Person who had presented the Keys of the Town to the Austrians, to be cut off. This Morning a Party of fifteen De-

serters from the Spanish and Neapolitan Armies; arrived in this City.

*Stockholm, July 6, O. S.* We hear, that before M. de la Chetardie left Moscow, he was obliged to return the two Ribbons given him by the Empress of Russia, as also her Majesty's Picture.

*Lauterbourg, July 15.* After the French were retired upon the 7th of this Month, sixty Hussars took Possession of Weissenbourg, in which they found a Magazine. The same Night General Nadafti was sent with his Corps to Soultz, to observe the Enemy; and General Berenclau, who had passed the Rhine at Weissenau, joined us with his Corps that Day. Upon the 9th at Night, Prince Esterhási was detached with 1000 Horse to Seltz, where he was continually harrassed till the 12th; that General Berenclau was sent with the Avant Guard of the Army, consisting almost of 10,000 Men; to go to Benheim beyond Seltz, where he found a Detachment of the Enemy of 13 Squadrons of Horse, and 600 Foot. The Horse, upon his Arrival, retired with some Loss, but the 600 Men not being able to gain Fort Louis, were obliged to retreat to their Army, which continues to be encamped behind the Lines of Hagenau, between Druffenheim and Plaffenhofen, where they are Intrenching and Fortifying. To-morrow our Army will march to Drinbach, having its Right covered by General Nadafti, who is at Soultz, and its Left by General Berenclau, who is at Benheim. The Grenadiers marched Yesterday, under the Command of General Count Daun, to Bihel, so that they form the Avant Guard.

*P. S. 16 July from the Camp at Drinbach.*

This Day General Nadafti marched to Werth, and General Berenclau has taken Post in an Island near Fort Louis; on the Side of Strasbourg;

*Vienna, July 18, N. S.* An Estafette and a Courier are arrived from Prince Charles's Army. Count Traun writes by the Estafette, that the Enemy could not have lost, since the 1st Instant; less than 9000 Men, by killed, wounded, Prisoners and Desertion. By the Courier we learn, that

that the Austrian Bridge had been mounted to Hagenbach; that Baron Trenck had repassed the Rhine, either to annoy Fort Louis on the German Side, or to favour the Construction of a Bridge to be brought from Fribourg, and to be placed between Fort Louis and Strasburg: That the Generals Berenclau and Nadafti were advanced three Leagues beyond the Lines of Lauterbourg: That a Party of Hussars had summoned Fort Louis: That Weissenbourg had been abandoned as soon as retaken by the French; who, after having sent back a Garrison into Landau, had pushed on to Hagenau, where they were repairing their Lines, though it was doubted whether they would defend them, or retire still higher up, to what are called the Canals or Islands of Strasburg; and lastly, that the whole Army was to advance on the 13th Instant. Prince Lobcowitz continues still at Nemi. The Operations of his and the Neapolitan Army consist principally in cannonading each other. In the mean while both the Detachments in the Abruzzo, the one under Gorani, the other under Sora, are said to have met with some Check, but the Particulars are not yet known.

*Copenhagen, July 21.* Yesterday Morning arrived in the Sound His Britannick Majesty's Ships the Anglesea and the Deptford's Prize, with between 50 and 60 Merchant Men for the Baltick. This is the second Convoy.

*Hambourg, July 24, N. S.* The Russian Troops were all to embark as last Tuesday the 21st Instant, N. S. at Romansoe. Twelve Men of War have put to Sea from the Port of Cronstadt, and Nine or Ten from Revel, in order to exercise the Seamen; and the Troops from Sweden are to proceed directly on their Voyage to Livonia, notwithstanding all Reports of any other Destination.

*Hambourg, July 28.* Count Rosenberg, according to Yesterday's Letters from Dantzick, is fallen ill there, in his Way to the Court of Russia. The Vice Admiral Mischoukow commands the Russian Squadron, consisting of twelve Men of War and a Frigate, which put to Sea the 23d of June, O. S. from Cronstadt; and the Rear Admiral Bars that from Revel, which sailed the 20th of the same Month, and was composed of nine Ships of 76, 66, and 54 Guns. Seven Ships are likewise sailed from Archangel.

*Brussels, July 28, N. S.* The last Division of the Dutch Forces is expected here Tomorrow. It is certain that the Count de Saxe and his whole Army are on the other Side the Lifs.

*Brussels, July 30, N. S.* By a Letter dated the 21st from the Head Quarters at Drinbach, three Leagues from Lauterbourg, there is Advice, that General Berenclau has invested Fort Louis, and suffers very little from the Cannon of the Place: That the French Army under

M. Coigny is distributed at Landau, Hagenau, Fort Louis and Strasburg: That several Persons of Distinction are already come in from Lorraine, to desire the Prince's Protection, and that King Stanislaus is retired to Metz, having sent on the 18th to desire Safe-Guards from the Prince, for his Furniture at Luneville. We hear from Tournay of the 25th, that the French King's Household Troops have passed the Scarpe at Douay, and the Schelde at Harleu: The rest of the Detachment sent towards the Rhine, passed the Scarpe at St. Amand and Marchiennes, and the Schelde at Valenciennes and Bouchair on the 21st Instant. Those who passed at Douay will pursue their Rout by way of Landrecie.

*Hague, July 28, N. S.* We hear from Dunkirk, that the French King set out for Bergues upon the 20th in the Morning, and that he proposes to be at Metz upon the 4th of August; but the Troops which are to follow the King, to the Number of 30,000, will not be able to get thither so soon. It is said that that Place is to be the Rendezvous of those Troops, and that they are to be reviewed there by his Majesty.

*Hague, July 31, N. S.* M. Twickle is not yet arrived here; but as the Flemish Post, that came in this Morning, brought no Letters from him, it is concluded he is upon the Road hither. Count Podewils sets out this Day for Berlin.

*Berlegem, July 30, N. S.* The Army will begin to pass the Schelde To-morrow Morning. Count Saxe continues in his Camp between Harlebeck and Menin, on the other Side of the Lifs, and is fortifying, intrenching, and throwing up Lines.

*Amelwall Camp, August 1, N. S.* This Morning the Allied Army passed the Schelde in several Columns, and is encamped the Right Wing near Singhen, and the Left at Morigehena; and as the Quarter Masters General are reconnoitring the Country towards Courtrai, it is thought we shall march that Way.
