

# The London Gazette.

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*Stockholm, July 17, O. S.*

**O**N Sunday Evening last the King of Sweden arrived unexpected at Carlsherg, from his Progress to Gottenbourg. Yesterday arrived an Express for General Keith from Moscow, which was immediately forwarded to him at Romanfoe; but as the Wind has been fair for two Days past, it is thought he will have been under Sail before that Courier could reach him.

*Stockholm, July 20, O. S.* On Wednesday last, the 28th Instant, there was a numerous Court at Carlsberg, to compliment his Swedish Majesty on his safe Return from his Progress to Gottenbourg. We hear that General Keith, with the Troops under his Command, sailed from Romanfoe two Days ago.

*Naples, July 15, N. S.* Upon the Arrival of a Detachment, commanded by M. de Vargas, in the Abruzzo, the Enemy retired to the Borders of the Tronto. The Cities of Aquila, Teramo, and other Towns, have again submitted to the King. The Tribunal of Teramo has been abolished, and the Ministers of Aquila ordered into Confinement in the Fortrefs of Pescara. Brigadier Litale, Governor of Castle del Ovo, has been appointed President of that Province, and a new Sett of Ministers is upon the Point of being nominated. M. Vargas has put the City of Aquila under Contribution for the Maintenance of the Troops. The Fiscal of Teramo has been ordered into Confinement at Civitella-del Tronto. There are none of the Enemy's Troops in any Parts of the Kingdom.

*Rome, July 18, N. S.* Many Skirmishes have happened within these few Days between the Avant-Guards of the two Armies, which reciprocally cannonade each other with little or no Damage on either Side. They continue in their usual Situations, and are put to great Inconveniences, the Neapolitans and Spaniards for Want of Provisions, and it is said that the Austrians have great Numbers sick from the Unwholomeness of the Air. The Austrians have removed their Hospitals from Monte Rotondo to Tivoli and Civita Castellana, for the Benefit of the Air; and as Magazines are forming at Tivoli, it is thought that Prince Lobcowitz designs to invade the Kingdom of Naples by the Abruzzo in three Divisions, by Way of Rieti, Ascoli, and Tivoli.

*Florence, July 21, N. S.* On the 15th the Queen of Naples was delivered of a Princess at Gaeta, where Cardinal Spinelli the Archbishop of Naples, and many of the Nobility were invited to assist. On this Account, upon the

17th, great Rejoicings were made in the Neapolitan and Spanish Camp at Velletri. On the 17th arrived at Pisa from the Romagna, about 300 Horses out of the King of Naples's Stud, which the Austrian Hussars had lately seized in the Province of Aquila. They are to remain at Pisa till further Orders. Some little Time ago, a Party of Hussars intercepted the French Weekly Courier at Monterone, near Civita Vecchia, on his Return to France, and conducted him, with his Portmanteau, to Prince Lobcowitz at Nemi. A few Days after, another Bag of Letters for the Spanish Camp at Velletri, was seized by the Hussars at a Place called Torre di St. Lorenzo, near Nettuno. M. de Gages lately ordered 6000 Bomb Shells to be brought to his Camp from the Presidii of Tuscany, finding that he could not annoy the Austrians with his Cannon, though by Accounts from the latter the Bombs do very little Harm. Nothing material has occurred in either Army. There is Advice here, of Commodore Long's being arrived, with the Squadron under his Command, off Civita Vecchia.

*Vienno, July 29, N. S.* Above 40 battering Cannons have been ordered, and are actually upon the Road from Fribourg, to Prince Charles's Army in Alsatia.

*Dantzick, August 1, N. S.* The Marquis de la Chetardie arrived here Yesterday with a numerous Retinue, and lodges in the Suburbs under the Name of Baron Dandrie; he keeps incognito, to the great Satisfaction of the Town; which is thereby exempted from paying him the usual Honours, and would be puzzled how to behave towards him. He has bespoken 18 Post Horses, and it is said will take his Way from hence towards Franckfort. About fourteen Days ago arrived here a Person, who stiles himself a Captain, and recruits Men for the Service of the Emperor: As yet he has met with very little Encouragement. By Advice from Marienwerder of the 30th past, the Prussians encamped there amount to 6800, and increase daily: It is said they have Artillery with them. All is quiet in Poland, and the King sets out next Month for Grodno.

*Copenhagen, Aug. 1, N. S.* We had Advice Yesterday of the 14th past, N. S. that a French Privateer from Calais, of 65 Tons, 80 Men, and 10 Guns, commanded by one Guillaume Denis, was then come into Bergen.

*Paris, August 3, N. S.* There is an Account from Nantes, of the 28th of last Month, that two English Men of War, with two Frigats and two Galliots, having appear'd, upon the 25th, off St. Nezaire, the People there had

been in the utmost Consternation. The Alarm-Bell was rung in all the Parishes along the Coast, and great Numbers assembled together; but the English disappeared that Night, without having made any Descent, or committed any Manner of Hostilities. We hear from Toulon, that the English Fleet, consisting of 28 Ships of the Line, besides Frigats, Bomb-Ketches, &c. is returned to the Islands of Hyeres, and keeps so good a Look-out upon the Coast of Provence, that none of our Trading Vessels dare venture out of Port. The Ships that were to have sailed from Toulon to meet Admiral Torres, were got into the outward Road, when the English Fleet returned; but thereupon they put back into the inner Road, where they are likely to continue, being in a Manner block'd up. They write from Brest of the 20th of last Month, that upon the 18th a Squadron of 16 Men of War sailed from thence, under the Command of Messrs. Rockambaut and Nesmond, but to what Latitude they were bound, is hitherto a Secret.

*Hambourg, Aug. 4, N. S.* Letters from Dresden bring Advice, that the Saxon Troops had received Orders to incamp, the several Regiments separately, by the 1st of this Month.

*Hambourg, Aug. 7, N. S.* Yesterday M. Heinzon, the Russian Minister, received a Rescript from his Court, informing him, that the Great Duke had been betrothed to the young Princess of Zerbst, and that a Courier is upon his Way from Moscow with the Orders of St. Andrew for the young Prince of Zerbst and Prince George of Holstein, and that of St. Catharine for the Priores of Quedlimburgh and the Princess of Saxe Gotha, Aunts to her new Imperial Highness. The Motion of the Prussian Troops, the Uncertainty where they are to direct their March, and the Embargo laid by Order of the King of Prussia, upon the Vessels and Boats at Magdebourg on the Elbe, occasions much Speculation. Letters have been received here from the Marquis de la Chetardie from Dantzick, of the 30th past. He was arrived there under the Name of Baron D'Andrie, his Equipage consisting of six Carriages.

*Camp of Avelghem, Aug. 5, N. S.* Since our passing the Schelde on Friday last, we have been obstructed in our March by the great Number of Inclosures, being obliged to cut the Roads, and make Bridges for the March of the Lines and Columns before we can move from our Camp. This has retarded us one Day, but Orders are given for our marching To-morrow, and placing our Right at Espierre, and our Left to extend towards Estainbourg or Nechin, as the Situation of the Ground, or the Convenience of Water, shall make it advisable. Our Army consists of 69 Battalions, and 112 Squadrons, the Regiments from Mons, Tournay, and Oudenarde, having joined us the Day after we passed the Schelde.

*Brussels, August 6.* By a Letter from an Officer in the Austrian Army, dated at Hagenau the 31st of July, there is Advice, That by the Acquisition of Hagenau Prince Charles is become Master of all the Lower Alsatia, and in a Situation to prevent the Junction of the French Succours with Marshal Coigni, and that

both the Franche Comté, and Part of Burgundy; were open to the Incursions of the Austrian Hussars. Letters from Paris mention the taking of Chateau Dauphin by the French and Spaniards, with the Loss of 4000 Men and a great Number of Officers; but a more authentick Account is expected. On the 3d Instant the Center of the Allied Army in Flanders was encamped at Avelghem, between Courtrai and Tournay, and the Quarter Masters were to reconnoitre the next Morning in order to chuse another Camp. This Court has received Advice, that the Count de Saxe has ordered three Men out of each Company of the Army to Courtrai, and that they work hard in fortifying that Place.

*Brussels, August 10, N. S.* Since the 6th, the Allied Army has been marching towards Tournay, and the Austrian Hussars have, we hear, taken Post at Lannoy in the Territory of Lisle. Upon this Motion several Parties of French Troops, which lay at Cisoign, and other Villages about Lannoy, broke up immediately. Some of them marched to Lisle, and the rest rejoined Count de Saxe's Army. The French continue in their Lines behind the Lys, and fortify Courtrai with great Diligence; but if the Allied Army continues to advance, it is the general Opinion that the Count de Saxe must quit his Lines, in order to take Care of the French Frontier; and that thereupon a Battle must ensue. There are Letters in Town which say, that Prince Lobcowitz has been obliged to break up his Camp. We have no authentick Accounts of Prince Charles's Motions since his taking Possession of the Lines of Hagenau; but Yesterday private Letters came in from Mayence, which say M. Coigni has quitted Strasbourg, and marched towards Colmar, and that the Prince was advancing towards Schelstadt. General Prætorius arrived here the 7th at Night, and set out early the next Morning for Tournay.

*Hague, August 7, N. S.* The Letters that came in this Morning bring nothing new nor material from any of the Armies. That of Prince Charles was on the 31st past still at Hagenau, nor was it at that Time known there with Certainty, to what Place M. Coigni was retired with the Bulk of the Army. The King of Sardinia, after the Loss of the Post of Chateau Dauphin, seems by the freshest Advices from those Parts, to have assembled as many of his Forces as he could get together at St. Pierre in the Valley of Vrait, whilst M. Pallavicini, after the Entrance of the Enemy by the Barricades, and through the Valley of Stura, is said to have done the same with the rest of the Piedmontese Forces under the Cannon of Demont.

*Hague, August 8, N. S.* Her Royal Highness the Princess, and his most Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, set out this Day for Rotterdam in their Way to Breda.

*Hague, August 11.* The Confederate Army entered upon French Ground last Saturday, and extended its Left to the Abbey of Cisoign, where Count Maurice of Nassau occupies the same Quarters which were so lately honoured with the Residence of the French King. By the present Position of the Army, it is in the Center

of the French Fortresses, none of which are compleatly garrisoned. M. Twickle arrived here last Night. We hear that the greatest Part of the French Regiments, which upon the 19th of last Month forced the Intrenchments of la Tour du Pont and Bellino, near Chateau Dauphin, had entirely lost their Officers; that of the three Battalions of the Regiment of Poitou that were engaged, only 300 had escaped; that all the other Regiments had lost in Proportion, and that M. de Givri, who commanded them, had received a dangerous Wound in his left Knee. There are Letters from France which mention, that there has been a great Desertion and Sickness amongst the Troops detached from Flanders to Alsace.

*Admiralty Office, August 3, 1744.*

His Majesty's Sloops the Hound and Vulture, being in Sight of Goree on the 29th past, with the Trade under their Convoy bound to Rotterdam, the Hound, Captain Gordon, stood after a Snow, which proved to be a French Privateer, of ten Carriage Guns and nine Swivels, with eighty-one Men, which had been three Days out of Dunkirk; she engaged the Hound for an Hour and half, and then struck, having five Men killed, and several mortally wounded. Captain Gordon also retook a Ship which the Privateer had just taken.
