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Wirfin, Nov. 11. Ur last Letters from Leopol give us an account of several fine sees which our Troops fent of trin parties, have already had over the Enemy, and that General Sobietsky was fo far advanced with the gross of the Army, that he had had an opportunity to give the Enemy batele, which, however he declined, because the Forces of Lythuania were not yet come up to him, which they are making all the hafte possible to do, and then we are confident our General will make some considerate attempt, in order to the recovering of those places which belong to this Crown, and are now in the possession of the Turks; and we have great reason to hope he will succeed in it, as well because of the number and good condition of our Forces, as the weakness and want of preparation of the Enemy to oppose us; our Army according to the general computation, confilling in near 50 thousand Men, most of them old experienced Soldiers, whilst on the other side, we do not hear that the Turks have any where together, a Body of 30 thoufand fighting Men. A party of our Troops have lately taken fastowid, a place of some importance; and to add to this good news, we have advice that the Czar of Moscowy has ordered his Forces to m 1ch, in order to their joyning with those of this Crown, to act together against their Common Enemy; it seems the King in his return from the Army was taken ill, and some thereupon reported, that there was danger obhis life, but we are now satisfied of the contrary by the last Letters we had from the Court, which affure us, that his Majesty is pretty well again.

Leghorn, Nov. 11. His Excellency Sir fohn Finch, continues as yet at Florence, having on all occasions been Treared by the Great Duke, with the greatest respect and kindness imaginable, and having as to the business he came about, received all possible satisfaction, so that now he is preparing for the continuance of his Vovage to Constantinople, in order whereunto, he will in four or five days at farthest, part from Florence. By a Bark artived this day fron Marseilles, we have advice, that the French are fitting out 14 Men of War at Thoulan, who are appointed to cruise in these Seas,

for the security of their Trade.

Venice, Nov. 11. This day we have received Letters from Constantinople, dated in September last, which inform us, of the present miserable condition of that City, by reason of the Plague, which hath raged there all the latter part of the Summer, and still continues with much violence. That the Captain Bassa has orders to Resinforce his Fleet, that he may be the better able to secure the Archipetaro, which is almost become innavigable for the Turkuh Ships, by reason of the Chair stian Gal'eys which Gausse there; and that they had news, that the Polea were ready to March with a great Army, which had very much surprised that Course, who had believed, that that Crown would rather have endeavored by amicable means, to have obtained a good Pe.ce.

Vienna, Nov. 12. Yesterday in the afternoon their

Imperial Majesties arrived here, withour any publick reception, or other folemnity, fave that all the great Guns about the Town were thrice discharged; their Majesties fince their arrival, have received the Complements of all the forreign Ministers and other persons of quality of this Court: It is faid here that the Emperor intends to raise several new Regiments, but that the Commissions will not be given out till towards Spring: From Hungary we have advice, that the Rebels continue to do much mischief, they having lately plundered and destroyed a place called Kernstur, and carried the Inhabitants away with them; we cannot but suspect that the Turks assist them under hand for otherwise they could not be able to maintain themselves as they do. The Poles it feems, instead of empecting a War from the Turks, are carrying it into their Territories, with likelihood of good fuccels. It is reported here that Count Montecuenti, General of the Emperors Forces is ordered to return hither, having first put them into their winter Quarters. We daily expect here the arrival of an Ambassador from the Great Duke of Tujcany, to complement their Imperial Majesties on their late Marriage.

Rucht fort, Nov. 16. The fixeh inflane; one of his Majesties Men of War, easied the Vigitant, Commanded by the Saur Gabares, being separated from the rest of her Squadron, happened to Rencounter a Spanish Man of War, Mounted with 36 Guns, with whom she had a dispute, which lasted four hours together; the Copusin and Lieutenant of the French were killed at the beginning of the Fight, which somewhat discouraged the Samen, however, with he assistance of their remaining Officers, they so well behaved themselves, that they sunk their Enemy, and brought their own Ship Casin here

Breft, Nov. 18. The 10 instant the Count d'Estrees-Vice-Admiral of France, came to an Ankor in this Bay, havin on y with him four Men of War, and one Fireshi, the rest of his Squadron having been separated from him in bad weather, be are all safely arrived here and at Rochefors.

Montecuculi parted from B neo Cobleniz, intending to pass on from thence to Vicnna, the Duke de Bournouville being leve in his absence o Command the Imperial Forces. The French have lately seised a Cassle which stands in the middle of the Rhyn, between M yence and Bin en, which will hinder the communication between the Imperialists that are in that place y and those above them on the Rhyn. The Consederate Troops lye still in this Neighborhood; Zons and Lichnits have received imperial Garrisons. The Bishop of Strasbourg is gone to Keyfernaert, to confer with the Duke of Lnaemburgh who is arrived there; The Forces which he hath drawn out of the Conquered places, together with those Commanded by Monsieur d'Humieres, make up in all about 20000 Foot, and 3000 Horse.
